

During this fiscal year, the Board had the opportunity to honor several employees who retired or moved on from the town of Millbury, citizens, sports teams and organizations; we are grateful to do such tributes as part of our job. We began this fiscal year with saying goodbye to Town Manager Bob Spain. Our former Chairman, E. Bernard Plante agreed to be the Acting Town Manager; he was in this position for six months; we cannot thank him enough for stepping into this role and doing it so well. We worked with the Town Manager Search Committee and The Collins Center to obtain a new Town Manager for Millbury. In January of 2017 David J. Marciello, Esq., MPA started as Town Manager. He comes to us from Rehoboth and has a lot of municipal experience.

The Annual Town Election was held on Tuesday, April 25, 2017. Even though Jon Adams was elected in the Special Election of 2016 to fill the seat vacated by William Borowski, he needed to run again; this time it was uncontested and he retained his seat. Early voting was done for the first time in the Primary of 2017. This was a great accomplishment for our Town Clerk, Jayne M. Davolio and her staff who handled this new process with flying colors.

The town entered into a Municipal Aggregation contract with Good Energy and obtained a lower supply rate of electricity for the citizens of Millbury. The Ramshorn Dam project is wrapping up and looks beautiful. We voted to allow a feasibility study to rebuild or repair the Raymond E. Shaw School. The driveway to the Town Hall was dedicated as Bicentennial Way in June of 2017. Student Government Day was another success; as always, it is encouraging seeing young minds at work. We were honored to be part of the Fox25 morning shows Zip Trip in July of 2016. This was a great way to showcase just how special the Town of Millbury is and it was fun for all.

In closing, we wish to express our appreciation for the cooperation and assistance given to us by the various departments within town government. We particularly wish to thank the volunteers who contribute and help make Millbury a better community.

The Selectmen holds its regular meetings on the second and fourth Tuesdays of each month. These meetings are televised live on local access channel 191 Charter and channel 26 Verizon. Concerned citizens are encouraged to attend.

Thank you to the Board of Selectmen, the citizens of Millbury and all employees for the privilege of being your Town Manager for the past year and half.

The Fiscal Year 2017 budget has shown that, although there are signs of improvement in the economy, we still are recovering from the pains of the '08-'10 recession. State Aid only went up by \$134,000 in FY 17; which is still \$535,600 below FY 2009 and our revenues are slowly picking up, this makes it difficult to maintain current service levels. Nonetheless, the Town's auditors continue to praise the Town for their management and stewardship of the taxpayer's dollars and the Town continues to be awarded for its financial reporting. Millbury has been awarded five Comprehensive Annual Financial Reports and had our bond rating raised twice. This is a testament to our Finance Director, Katie Lavallee, Treasurer/Collector Denise Marlborough and their entire team.

I want to take this opportunity to express my sincere gratitude to the employees and volunteers of the Town for their commitment and dedication; their perseverance is essential to this Town. We welcome back our Director of Planning & Economic Development, Laurie Connors, who rejoined our team in February, 2017. She hit the ground running and immediately procured multiple grants for the Town, including the Community Compact which awarded us a \$25,000 grant to partially fund our Master Plan and another \$20,000 to update our server in Town Hall. A Children's Librarian, Ann Dallair, Asa Waters Director, John K. McElroy, Diane Green and Linda Donovan all joined our team in FY17.

In years prior, this report has detailed the importance of updating our Master Plan and our Master Plan Committee began its very important charge to this end. However, we likewise looked at trying some other methods of determining our needs and where we want to go / be as a Town currently as well as years to come. This past year we opened a dialog with Bridgewater State University and in particular their Masters in Public Administration program. This newly developed symbiotic partnership will assist us in our public outreach, our performance measurement and our benchmarking initiatives so that we can determine how we are performing, what the residents want, and how to achieve these goals on a consistent and continuing basis.

Energy improvements continued throughout the year and the LED streetlight project is well underway. The entire Town's inventory of streetlights will be converted to LED over the next year and we again received Green Community Funds to continue with this and similar green projects. Millbury continued working toward its Municipal Aggregation program which, once bid out, will reduce electrical rates for residents. The Ramshorn Dam project was initiated will be completed before the FY 19 Annual Town Meeting. The MASSDOT 146 Bridge project is well underway and is estimated to last for 3 more years. It will replace and expand the bridge on Route 146 and make coming off and going onto Route 146 smoother.

The Town continues to utilize the Town of Millbury Facebook Page and our web page at <u>www.millbury-ma.org</u> for getting communications out to the citizens.

Please feel free to contact me at anytime with questions or concerns you may have, otherwise I invite you to stop by the office for a visit or discussion regarding any issues you wish to discuss. My door is always open. As your Town Manager, I look forward to working with each of you, in serving the residents of Millbury.

The Wiring Inspector, Larry Morris and his assistant, George Duhamel are appointed annually by the Millbury Town Manager (Millbury Town Charter) to administer and enforce the Massachusetts Electrical Code, 527 CMR 12.00 under the provisions of the Massachusetts General Laws, Chapter 143, Section 31, annotated.

The Plumbing/Gas Inspector, Gregory Gauthier and his assistant, Brian Gasco are appointed by the Millbury Town Manager (Millbury Town Charter) to administer and enforce the Massachusetts State Plumbing Code 248 CMR 2.00 and the Massachusetts Fuel Gas Code, 248 CMR 3.00 through 8.00 under the provisions of Massachusetts General Laws, Chapter 142, Section 13, annotated.

Building, Wiring, and Plumbing permit applications can be obtained by contacting the Building Department which is located in the Municipal Office Building, 127 Elm Street, or on the Town's website. The office is open Monday through Friday 8:30 AM to 4:30 PM.

The Department of Public Works manages the following budgetary units:

Administration Division

From July 1, 2016 through early March 2017 Mr. Robert McNeil served as the Department's administrative connection to the general public, as well as various Commissions, Boards, and Associations that interact directly with public works. From April 10 through June 30, 2017, Ms. Patricia Arp took over and served as the Department's administrative connection. Ms. Arp is assisted by Operations Manager Robert Van Meter and two full-time office clerks; Andrea Paquette, the highway, cemetery and parks clerk and Amy Paquette-Riordan, the sewer department clerk.

Gas & Diesel Fuel Station

The current gas & diesel fuel station is located at 135 Providence Street and is an underground storage tank (UST) constructed in 2015 for fueling our town's vehicle fleet.

The Town has recently begun fueling the senior center vehicles.

Cemeteries Division

The Cemetery Commission is responsible for the three town cemeteries; Central Cemetery located at the end of Waters Street, County Bridge Cemetery located at the intersection of Riverlin and Providence Streets, and Dwinell Cemetery located on Dwinell Road. Seasonal labor maintains our cemetery grounds. Graves are dug by a private contractor. There were 43 burials at the Central Cemetery in fiscal year 2017. Burial rights to 31 lots were sold totaling \$14,475.00 in revenue. The trust fund balances as of June 30, 2017 are as follows:

Highway Division

The Division is responsible for all public ways and infrastructure within the Town. Seasonal work consists of salting streets and plowing snow, sweeping streets, cleaning catch basins, repairing, replacing, and mapping drainage infrastructure, dam operation & maintenance, roadside mowing, maintenance of Veterans monuments, asphalt repairs, repairing and replacing signs, line painting and various other tasks as assigned. Full-time staff includes Lead Joe Kosiba, Keith Caruso, Scott Elie, Dick Johnson, John Pedone, Brian Boughton and mechanic Robert Pelletier.

Parks & Playgrounds

The Parks Division, staffed by Lead Carl Ward and several seasonal employees, maintains the 29 Veteran's Monuments, Washington Street Park, the Greenwood Street Park, the Jacques Park and the East Millbury Park, as well as the Tot Lot on Millbury Avenue. This consists of five ball fields and soccer fields. They also maintain the Town Common, Town Library and the Asa Waters Mansion grounds. This year Millbury again graciously hosted State Little League Semi-Final games at our Washington Street Park facility. The result of this Division's dedication and effort is several beautiful areas for the residents to enjoy recreation, athletics, and assembly.

Sewer Division

The Sewer Division continues to study to reduce the infiltration and inflow of groundwater and storm water runoff into the sewer lines.

DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC WORKS

The Millbury Sewer Division was led this year by Lead Foreman James Piscitelli and sewer workers Frank Stachura and Eric LeClaire. This team is responsible for the maintenance and operation of over 50 miles of sewer lines and 15 pump stations which serve over 3,600 customers. The average daily flow is approximately 1,000,000 gallons per day.

Snow and Ice

The Department responded to multiple snow events and a seasonably cold winter with less than usual snowfall, and plowed and treated public and private roads around Town with a combination of Town staff and private contractors.

Solid Waste Management - Transfer Station

This Division is staffed by Lead Foreman Joe Lobas and Mark Ginese. All trash is collected and hauled to the Wheelabrator facility by the Transfer Station staff. The recycling program converted to the Zero-Sort system allowing residents to deliver unsorted recyclables to our facility that improved pedestrian safety and led to increased recycling participation. The metal recyclable program continues to be a profit making venture for the town with just over 94 tons of steel removed and over \$7,730 collected. Recycling is mandatory and residents also have clothing recycling vendors available to them onsite.

A total of 1,816 tons of trash was hauled to Wheelabrator by the Town Transfer Station in FY 2017, almost the same amount as FY 2016. This disposal of waste resulted in a rebate of \$108,290.77 back to the Town.

Our recycling program generated 839 tons of recyclables, up 14% from FY 2016. Thanks to all of our participants that contributed to these great changes! Keep up the great work.

Street Lighting

The Department coordinates maintenance and repair of faulty street lights with NGRID around Millbury. DPW is coordinating the first Phase of LED street lighting through the Energy Advisory Committee. The application was submitted to NGRID and is awaiting approval. Street lights are expected to be replaced with LEDs in late summer 2017.

Tree Warden

Tree Warden Ron Despres is responsible for public shade trees and works very hard to maintain the tree canopy throughout the town which is beneficial to all residents. The Tree Warden identifies dead and diseased trees and coordinates their removal. Stump grinding is completed by outside contractors once a backlog has accumulated. This year, about 25 stumps were ground and another 30 are expected to be processed next year.

APPROVAL NOT REQUIRED PLANS

There were five (5) plans filed under Chapter 41, Section 81P of the General Laws, Approval Not Required (ANR), during Fiscal Year 2017, for 10 West Street, 104 McCracken Road, 40 Park Hill Avenue, 18 Wheelock Avenue and 31 Maplewood Road. These plans represent a division of land with adequate frontage on existing ways as required by the Millbury Zoning Bylaws.

SPECIAL PERMITS/SITE PLAN REVIEW/SUBDIVISIONS

There are numerous situations and proposals that require subdivision approval, Special Permit, Site Plan Review, or a Pre-construction Stormwater Management Permit. The town's zoning bylaw, general bylaw and the Planning Board's Rules and Regulations Governing the Subdivision of Land list the criteria for making these decisions, based on the Board's analysis of extensive technical materials and public input. Below is a summary of the various projects seeking approval during the fiscal year, and the Board's decisions.

Site Plan Review Approval and Post-Construction Stormwater Management Permits: Seven (7) applications were filed and granted under the Zoning Bylaw (Site Plan Review) and the General Bylaws (Post-Construction Stormwater Management Permit): 333A Southwest Cutoff (United Material Management of Millbury, LLC), 14 McCracken Road (F&D Trucking), 50 Howe Avenue (Spectrum Health Systems), 55 Sycamore Street (hobby kennel), 400 Southwest Cutoff/Lot A Latti Farm Road (build-to-suit commercial development), 60 McCracken Road (hobby kennel) and 221 Riverlin Street (build-to-suit industrial development).

Special Permits: The Planning Board granted Special Permits to 8 Broadmeadow Avenue for an accessory dwelling special permit, 15 A&B Howe Avenue for a multi-family special permit, Lot E Oakes Street for a multi-family special permit, and 110 Elm Street for a sign special permit.

Major/Minor Modifications to a Special Permit, Site Plan Review Approval or a Definitive Plan Approval: The Board extended construction deadlines for Autumn Gate Estates, Longwood Farm Estates, and Vassar Estates subdivisions. They approved a minor modification to a wireless special permit for replacement of equipment and antennas at a wireless communications tower located at 428 Greenwood Street and a major modification of the site plan review approval/stormwater management permit for 333A Southwest Cutoff (United Material Management).

Definitive Subdivision Certificate of Completion: The Board issued a Certificate of Completion for the Definitive Subdivision, Eastview Acres.

CURRENT ISSUES

The Planning Board continues to monitor various residential, commercial and industrial developments that are under construction.

The Millbury Planning Board holds its regular meetings on the second and fourth Mondays of each month. One meeting per month is generally scheduled in June, July and August. These meetings are televised live on Charter cable channel 11 and Verizon cable channel 26. The Planning Board encourages public participation in every element of the planning process. The Millbury Conservation Commission is responsible for administering the Massachusetts Wetlands Protection Act, M.G.L. Chapter 131, Section 40, as it relates to issues in the Town of Millbury. The Act set forth a public review and decision-making process by which activities affecting areas Subject to Protection are to be regulated in order to contribute to the following interests:

Public and private water supply, protection of ground water supply, flood control, storm damage prevention, prevention of pollution, protection of land containing shellfish, protection of fisheries and protection of wildlife habitat.

Areas that are subject for review under the Wetlands Protection Act include the first 200 feet from the edge of a perennial stream referred to as "riverfront area" as well as the first 100 feet from a vegetated wetland or bank stream referred to as "buffer zone". A permit must be obtained from the Conservation Commission before any work begins within the resource areas and the 200 or 100 foot buffer zones. Some projects that were reviewed by Conservation in fiscal 2016 included residential developments, solar arrays, construction of garages, additions and upgrades to properties along ponds and lakes.

There are over 520 acres of Conservation Land managed by the Conservation Commission in the Town of Millbury, some with accessible recreational trails. Land that is owned by the Town's Conservation Commission is considered protected. Its future as open space is assured. The protection of Millbury's open space resources is

crucial because these landscapes help define the character of Millbury and reflect its past, provide crucial habitat for a diversity of wildlife and recreation opportunities for people, preserve the quality and quantity of Millbury's water resources, and absorb stormwater to reduce flooding.

In addition, the Conservation Commission is interested in managing its lands to create healthier forests. By actively managing forests, the Conservation Commission is able to limit the spread of invasive species, create alternative habitats, construct a network of well-defined trails, and raise money to purchase additional conservation land and maintain existing resources.

Civic groups and volunteers willing to help maintain or establish new trails are always welcome and greatly appreciated. The Conservation Commission continues to encourage all to use the Town's Conservation areas for passive recreation such as hiking, biking and bird watching. The Police Department should be notified if the use of A.T.V. vehicles is noticed on these lands.

The Conservation Commission accepts both monetary donations as well as land donations in order to continue the preservation of our natural resources.

The Conservation Commission can be reached by dialing 508-865-5411 at the Municipal Office Building. The Clerk's hours are Monday through Friday 8:30 am -4:30 pm. You can also visit the Town of Millbury website under the Conservation Commission to access contact information as well as other important information, links and forms.

The Commission meets regularly on the first and third Wednesday evening of each month beginning at 7:00 p.m. One meeting per month is generally scheduled in June, July and August. Comments and inquiries from the public are always welcome.

Regional Public Health Services

The Worcester Division of Public Health (WDPH) is the lead agency for the Central Massachusetts Regional Public Health Alliance (CMRPHA), of which the Town of Millbury is a member. The regionalization of public health services is a cost-effective and capacity building model that is sustained through cost-sharing throughout seven contiguous communities. CMRPHA received national accreditation in March of 2016, and continues to be the first accredited health department in the Commonwealth and the first accredited multi-jurisdictional health department in the country. The WDPH provides enforcement, program initiatives and policy technical support in the areas of community health, environmental health and emergency preparedness. The Town also contracts separately with a nurse to provide nursing services which include communicable disease reporting and investigations and a Title V engineer to review plans, conduct percolation tests and inspections.

Public Health Preparedness

The Massachusetts Department of Public Health's (MDPH) Office of Preparedness and Emergency Management (OPEM) has developed Health and Medical Coordinating Coalitions (HMCC) in each of the six regions throughout the state. In each region, OPEM has chosen a Sponsoring Organization to oversee the fiscal, administrative, and programmatic aspects of the HMCC grant. In Region 2, the WDPH has served as the Sponsoring Organization for the past two years. Each HMCC is tasked with completing deliverables designed to foster a multi-disciplinary, regionalized approach during all phases of an emergency: preparedness, response, recovery, and mitigation. As a member of the Region 2 HMCC, the Town of Millbury has access to increased resources and is a part of regional planning efforts. As Sponsoring Organization, WDPH is considered the regional Emergency Support Function 8 (ESF-8); in an emergency, WDPH would coordinate resource requests and allocation, and provide situational awareness for all healthcare organizations and local public health departments in the seventy-four cities and towns that make up Region 2. Currently, six community members from the Town of Millbury are registered Medical Reserve Corps volunteers. With that said, as a member of the Worcester Regional Medical Reserve Corps (WRMRC), the Town would have access to all 424 registered volunteers within the WRMRC in the event of an emergency.

As with previous years, Emergency Preparedness staff worked in conjunction with the Millbury Board of Health to review and revise the Town's Emergency Dispensing Site (EDS) plan. In FY18, Emergency Preparedness staff will work with the BOH to develop and conduct a full-scale exercise testing the set-up of the EDS, in fulfillment of state and federal deliverables. The Millbury Board of Health was also in compliance with and participated in all quarterly WebEOC emergency reporting drills conducted by MDPH.

Community Health

Tobacco

The Town of Millbury is a member of the Worcester Regional Tobacco Control Collaborative which reduces the health and economic burden of tobacco use by preventing young people from starting to smoke, helping current smokers to quit, and protecting children and adults from secondhand smoke. This is accomplished through education and upholding both state and local laws. During this fiscal year, WDPH completed 12 inspections and 21 youth compliance checks at tobacco retailers.

An estimated 1,904 smokers live in Millbury (18.2% of adults, age 18+). The adult smoking rate is 17% higher in Millbury than statewide (18.2% in Millbury compared to 15.5% statewide). The rate of smoking during pregnancy in Millbury is 57% higher than statewide (10.7% in Millbury compared to 6.8% statewide). In Millbury, lung cancer incidence is 15% higher among males compared to the state of Massachusetts. Lung cancer incidence in Millbury is 34% higher among females compared to the state of Massachusetts. Mortality from lung cancer is 41% higher in Millbury compared to Massachusetts.

Substance Abuse Prevention

The CMRPHA, through the City of Worcester, received a seven year, \$100,000 per year Massachusetts Opioid Abuse Prevention Collaborative (MOAPC) grant, focused on opioid overdose prevention and reduction in the region. The town of Millbury's Board of Health, Public Schools and Police Department have been working together to prevent opioid abuse and reduce overdose in the town. WDPH staff attend monthly meetings of the Millbury Opioid Taskforce and provide technical support and resources to facilitate these efforts. In addition, staff attended the National Night Out event held by the Police Department along with members of the Taskforce on August 1st and gave out public health educational resources on substance abuse prevention.

Environmental Health

The Board monitors food offered for consumption to ensure it is wholesome, free from adulteration, properly labeled, identifiable, and manufactured at an approved source. All food establishments receive mandated inspections to determine compliance with the provisions contained within the Chapter X, of Minimum Sanitation Standards for Food Establishments.

The Board must also uphold and achieve compliance with the Massachusetts Sanitary Code, Minimum Standards of Fitness for Human Habitation. This program consists of responding to complaints, issuance of orders or citing violations with a focus on unkempt property, housing violations, rodent control issues, as well as investigations of any public health nuisance. The Board of Health has investigated more than 104 housing and nuisance complaints, of which agents have had to respond at least twice to each complaint, for the initial and then follow-up(s).

Communicable Disease Surveillance

Infectious diseases constitute a continuing threat to the public's health. They cause illness, suffering, and death, and place an enormous financial burden on society. Although some infectious diseases have been controlled by modern technological advances, new diseases are still emerging. Under Massachusetts General Laws (MGL), Chapter 111, suspected and/or confirmed cases of diseases dangerous to the public's health are reportable to the local Board of Health and/or the Massachusetts Department of Public Health (MDPH). Reporting disease occurrences enables the public health staff to monitor trends, detect and control outbreaks, and evaluate prevention activities. Our public health nurse regularly collects important information on all reported diseases as part of routine epidemiological disease investigations. The following is a summary of reported diseases in Millbury 2016-2017:

The Board of Health was able to host three seasonal flu clinics and vaccinated 250 people.

Title V

Lastly, the Board is charged with enforcing various Massachusetts Department of Environmental Protection Regulations such as Title V and CMR 310 which includes septic plan review, air, water and noise nuisance control and hazardous materials control. Locally, the Board of Health must ensure compliance with numerous Town by-laws and Board of Health Regulations.

The Board of Health upholds all code enforcements regarding TitleV.

The Finance Committee is charged with the consideration of all matters relating to the appropriation, borrowing and expenditure of money, the review of the Town budget and Warrant Articles, as well as other financial matters as they present themselves over the course of the year. The Committee also oversees the Reserve Fund, which is used as a supplement to approve budgets in the case of unforeseen, unbudgeted and unavoidable expenditures.

The Finance Committee holds numerous public meetings and hearings throughout the fiscal year with member terms running from July to June. Throughout the Fiscal Year ending June 30, 2017, the Finance Committee met a total of 14 times.

The Finance Committee makes recommendations on each warrant article to the voters at Town Meeting. These recommendations are the product of numerous hours of discussion and deliberation with Town officials and department heads. Members of the Committee attend meetings of the board of Selectmen and School Committee during the budget process to provide an overview of the Town's overall financial stability for the coming year.

The Millbury Public Library wishes to thank its patrons and The Town of Millbury for lending support. The Library has been very busy with storytimes, art shows, performances and serving the individual needs of wonderful patrons. Keeping up with new technology is a challenge but time well invested. The Library has a Nook, Kindle and iPad for use in the library. Patrons can use their own reading tablets to download books from the CW/MARS network at the Library or at home.

Ann Dallair is our Children's Librarian. She has created new programs, events, scavenger hunts, and coloring pages. The Library had an Easter Egg Hunt that was very popular. We had over sixty people attend. School age book clubs was another program that was offered at the Library. Ann has set up chess and checker boards in the Teen Room. She began a Teen Advisory Group as well. She serves many new families with storytime and programs. The children play with puppets, puzzles and games when no programs are being presented.

The Library provides storytime on Friday, thanks to Miss Rose, our Senior Aid. She does a wonderful job with storytime and seasonal crafts. The children have a great time exploring and learning.

"Build a Better World @ your Library" was the theme for the State-wide summer reading program. All these fun-filled programs were well attended. Nearly 155 children signed-up and 35 completed the program. The children read a large number of books over the summer.

The Library offered "Animals on Vacation" during school vacation weeks. This was funded by the Friends of the Millbury Public Library. "Creature Teacher" a brought bearded lizard, toucan, and "Animal Affair Petting Zoo" brought goats, chickens, ducklings, geese and bunnies. Even parents had a terrific time. The petting zoo was situated outside.

The Library received a grant from the Rosemary Davis Fund for the program "Animals around the World". We offer these programs in months when there are no school vacations. The patrons enjoy seeing the animals, some they can even touch. In January we had The Zoo in Forest Park with their "Forest in the Woods" program. They brought an armadillo, a macaw. In March "Animal World Experience" came with a three-banded armadillo, a sugar glider and a snake. In May "Audubon Ark" brought an owl, a quail, and a groundhog. Everyone was delighted with the programs.

The Library received a Millbury Cultural Council Grant for the summer reading programs. We had performances on Tuesday nights. There were Pumpernickel Puppets with "Peter Rabbit",

Big Ryan Storytelling, Ed Popielarczyk's "Flea Circus", Rick Goldin's Music and Songs and children and adults learned origami from Haruo Shiga.

The summer was busy on Thursdays with craft programs. We had Fourth of July Crafts, Sidewalk Chalk and Bubbles, which is always an enormous success. There was "Build a Better World" where children were able to challenge themselves and build a roller coaster out of marshmallows and toothpicks.

The Library started a variety of adult programs this past year due to gaining a Children's Librarian. Two of them were A Book Discussion and an Adult Coloring groups. Our first book was "1984" by George Orwell. There was a short discussion and then Professor Kyle Moody talked about "Fake News". The two programs went together so well. A knitting group meets here on Wednesday mornings and Saturday mornings.

The Worcester County Sheriffs' Department landscaped the Library grounds and painted areas inside the building. They provided the labor and the Library supplied lunch and materials. Due to this beneficial arrangement, a beautification effort succeeded with no effect upon budget.

The Library has eleven wonderful volunteers. They put in a total of 298 hours.

Millbury Redevelopment Authority Mission:

The Millbury Redevelopment Authority exists to create opportunities to attract and sustain economic development that will revitalize Millbury's economy and cultural growth. The end goal is to realize a community that is more attractive and self-sufficient.

What is the Millbury Redevelopment Authority?

The Millbury Redevelopment Authority is a volunteer board charged with helping to facilitate economic development opportunities for the town. Board members are elected at Town Meeting for five year terms. As an independent board, the Millbury Redevelopment Authority is in a unique position to bring the public and private sectors together. The Millbury Redevelopment Authority also has broad powers that enable it to encourage new development and promote sound growth. The board is not bound by daily processes of a local town department but works on special projects that can be run by the town or a business. The Millbury Redevelopment Authority can participate in development, issue bonds, borrow money and receive grants and gifts.

Projects that are undertaken by the Millbury Redevelopment Authority are not funded with tax payer dollars, solely funded by donations, gifts of money or property, fund raisers, and the generosity of Millbury citizens, business's, developers, and other organizations that take pride in our community. Urban Renewal Plan:

The Millbury Redevelopment Authority requires the development and approval of an Urban Renewal Plan to undertake specific projects. An Urban Renewal Plan is an approved redevelopment project by the state that grants the applicant that ability to pursue redevelopment and improvements of substandard, decadent or open blighted areas as well as plan for future land use. The stringent application and process also goes thru public review and comment.

Once approved by the state, the plan provides the Authority the ability to:

- Establish rehabilitation/design standards
- Demolish and/or rehabilitate substandard structures
- Participate in real estate development and commercial revitalization
- Issue bonds, borrow money and invest funds
- Receive grants and loans
- Accept gifts or requests

Current Projects:

The Millbury Redevelopment Authority is currently involved in the following projects in town:

- Millbury Redevelopment Authority State Appointed Member

- The Millbury Redevelopment Authority has been challenged by the lack of appointments made by the state to town Redevelopment Authorities as well as the lack of candidates willing to undergo the scrutiny a state appointment requires. To this end, the Millbury Redevelopment Authority has begun the process to establish a change to current state laws using home rule petition to change the Millbury Redevelopment Authorities 5th seat from a state appointment to a locally elected, 5 year seat. To that end the board has completed the following:
 - Submission of a Warrant Article 32 for the regular 2016 Town Meeting to require the selectman of Millbury to file the petition with the state legislature for this change.
 - This Article, passed by a majority at the annual town meeting and has then been submitted to the general court in Boston through Paul Frost for the final vote. At this time we are still waiting for a decision by the General Court in Boston.

- Social Media

• Established a Social Media presence to further educate the public on the mission of the Millbury Redevelopment Authority as well as to provide updates on various projects and fundraisers.

- Millbury Clock on the Common

• This project involves the purchase, installation and configuration of a Replica Howard 4-Dial post clock to be placed on the lower common in the center.

• The Millbury Redevelopment Authority has created an annual fund raising event for the clock and all future projects, this is the Millbury Food truck Festival &

Craft Fair, at this writing we have held two events, each event has grown and we are working on the third event for May 20, 2018

Approximately one hundred fifty guests are served.

MILLBURY YOUTH POLICE ACADEMY

The Millbury Police Department sponsored its third annual Millbury Youth Police Academy. The Cadets were introduced to CPR / First Aid training, Patrol Procedures, Crime Scene Investigations, K-9 Demonstration, Impaired Driving Demonstration, Tour of the Worcester County House of Correction, Firearms Training and Marching Drills and Physical Training. This academy is offered to all Millbury residents who will be entering the 9th and 10th grades. Applications will become available online for the Millbury Youth Academy to be held in the summer, 2018.

COMMUNITY READING DAY

Members of the department volunteer their time reading to students at the Elmwood Street School during Community Reading Day. This gives the officers the opportunity to interact with the students in the school environment.

STUDENT MEET AND GREET

The Administrative staff of the Millbury Police Department greet the students at Millbury High School, Shaw School and Elmwood Street School on the first day of school.

HEROES AND HELPERS

The Millbury Police Department was awarded a grant from Target Corporation to provide the opportunity for fifteen Millbury youths to Christmas shop for family members. Each youth was assigned a uniformed Police Officer and they were allowed to shop at Target. All expenses were covered by the grant.

NATIONAL NIGHT OUT

The Millbury Police Department partnered with Target Corporation and participated with National Night Out. This program is held throughout the country on the first Tuesday in August. The purpose of this program is to help establish a bond between the police department and the citizens of the community. Approximately 150 Millbury residents participated and enjoyed demonstrations by the Millbury Fire Department, Millbury Police K-9 Unit, Massachusetts State Police Air Wing Unit, Med-Star Ambulance, Rock Climbing Wall and pony rides donated by Stowe Farms, music by Tim Cluett as well as free food and drinks. Plan on attending this event on a yearly basis on the first Tuesday in August.

ORGANIZATIONAL ACCOMPLISHMENTS

- The department continues to maintain the prescription pill box located in the lobby of the Police Department for the community to dispose of unwanted and old prescription pills; no questions asked. This is available to the public 24 hours a day, 7 days a week.
- The department has two Officers who are instructors in CPR and First Aid; we will continue to offer free CPR training to the community as staffing levels allow.
- Two Officers continue to monitor the sex offender registration.
- The department has designated an Infectious Control Officer for the purposes of, but not limited to (1) receiving notifications of exposures to infectious diseases dangerous to the public health from health care facilities, and (2) notifying the indicated care provider(s) of an exposure to an infectious disease dangerous to the public health.
- A Sergeant has continued to serve as a member of the Central Massachusetts Law Enforcement Council Special Weapons & Tactics team (CEMLEC), maintaining the rigorous specialized training required by the team.
- The department has three Narcan Instructors to provide training to the sworn personnel in the use and administration of Narcan. All full time Officers currently carry Narcan. There were thirteen saves from January 1, 2017 through June 30, 2017.
- A School Resource Officer has been assigned to the schools through a partnership between the Millbury Police Department and the Millbury Public Schools. The SRO interacts with students and faculty on a daily basis.

- Staff from all (3) public schools continue to be trained in the school safety concept of ALICE (Alert, Lockdown, Inform, Counter, Evacuate). This was done through presentation and scenario based training.
- Officer Daniel Daly and K-9 Kenzo continue to receive training in patrol and Narcotics Detection.

TRAINING

With the In-Service Training requirement returning to MPTC, this allowed the department the opportunity to continue with an aggressive effort to provide a wide range of training to its officers and sergeants:

- We have three (3) officers trained as instructors in administering <u>Narcan</u> and two (2) instructors in CPR/First Aid. All full time sworn officers now carry Narcan. From January 1, 2017 thru June 30, 2017, there have been 13 saves.
- There are presently two (2) Level 1 Firearms Instructors;

- All of the police dispatchers and many of the sworn personnel are certified in Emergency Medical Dispatch (EMD) procedures; our next focus in this area will be recertification.
- One (1) Officer is trained as a Taser instructor.
- One (1) Officer is a trained DRE (Drug Recognition Expert)

DEPARTMENT STATISTICS

The Department, through the computer dispatch and records system, compiles various data resulting from: arrests, accidents, citations, incidents/investigations, and summonses. The database contains both criminal and non-criminal statistics. Data related to criminal offenses or incidents is reported to the Massachusetts State Police and FBI under the National Incident-Based Reporting System (NIBRS). This category of crime statistics is more commonly known as Incident-Based Reporting (IBR) offenses and represents a general summary of crime data.

GENERAL ACTIVITY

Calls for Service

Calls for service are the calls generated which make up the daily police log. A call may come in by phone, E911, the radio, or someone walking into the lobby of police headquarters. Calls for service, even if it does not involve a crime, can be time consuming for both the officer and dispatcher, as citizens may have police or records related questions. The overall yearly calls (including the mall) have remained fairly consistent over the past few years.

Incident reports, commonly referred to as investigations, are generated for a variety of different activities. The activities range from, but are not limited to the following: documentation of a non-criminal event, an incident causing serious injury or death, suspicious activity, criminal activity with no suspect or where the victim chooses not to pursue charges or a crime with an identifiable suspect. If the investigation results in a crime with identifiable charges, and/or sufficient probable cause exist to substantiate the charge, officers can complete a criminal complaint/summons.

If charges are warranted as a result of an incident report, a criminal complaint/summons or arrest is the method used to present charges in court. Often the complaint method is the procedure used to charge a person with a crime, rather than an arrest. This may be due to a combination of factors including the charge not permitting an arrest by statute, officer discretion based on the person's record, and the present activity and staffing level during the shift at the time.

SUMMARY

The categories of criminal and non-criminal activity listed above are beneficial in identifying crime trends, the amount of resources utilized in different areas of town in response to crime, facilitates our tactical decision-making and strategic planning, and assists with maintaining situational awareness of how these activities may impact the community of Millbury.

To the Citizens of the Town of Millbury, Board of Selectmen and Town Manager: It is with great pleasure that I provide this annual report of the Millbury Fire Department for Fiscal Year 2017. The past year has been another busy one. In my second year as Chief, I would like to acknowledge the excellent cooperation and assistance of all those that make our department more effective.

We continue to apply for any grants we possibly can, unfortunately most were denied. However, the S.A.F.E. and Senior S.A.F.E. grants were successful. The programs, delivered by Asst. Chief Silver, retired Asst. Chief Dore, and several other volunteers, were well received. Partnering with school grant liaison Jen Bellville and Council on Aging Director Judy O'Connor, the funds were used for materials and giveaways to heighten awareness of hazards and safe practices for all age groups. This year we managed to spend some very quality time with the older population. The Senior S.A.F.E program was delivered by Asst. Chief Silver to each of the senior projects. It was very well received with much interaction after the presentation. A partnership with Papa Gino's allowed us to hold another successful open house. Attendees enjoyed the 50 pizzas donated by Papa Gino's along with drinks supplied by the Goretti's Supermarket. The Ladies Auxiliary served up the pizza slices and drinks that night. One of the highlights of the night is "Rescue" the Fire Dog. Thanks to our Town Clerk Jayne Marie Davolio, who is also a former Millbury Firefighter, her performance as Rescue entertained the young and not so young. The suit is property of the Millbury Fire Department thanks to it being donated by Debbie Plante, in memory of her husband Richie. Thanks to all our members that volunteered that night, along with the Fire Explorers that assisted in the event, making it all a team effort.

We continued with school exit drills. These are done several times during the year at all public and private schools along with daycare centers. With great cooperation from the Millbury Public School administration, principals and staff, and also the staff at all other facilities, the drills were all successes. We also assist with the A.L.I.C.E. drills at the school. We hope it will never be needed but we understand if something were to take place at a school, it will be "All-Hands on Deck".

The fire prevention program is very active. The fire department has increased inspections of businesses. With the amount of people that frequent the businesses, especially those unfamiliar with some stores, it becomes vitally important to maintain the safety features of these establishments. We have worked closely with Board of Health Agent Julie VanArsdalen and Building Inspector Bob Frederico to create a team approach to assure consistency in enforcement. We now have 7 inspectors; Captains Dave King and Keith Newlands, Firefighters Mike Breault, Tom LaVallee, Ryan King, Steve Kosiba and Brian Dalton. They handle all the home sale (smoke and carbon monoxide detectors) inspections, propane, oil burner, nursing homes and business inspections, along with other requested inspections.

We have started a multi-year initiative to update our fire hose. We are putting four inch hose on each engine to replace the three-inch hose, most of which is very old. In general, four-inch hose

delivers twice the water flow of three-inch. With the support of the finance committee and others, we are bringing a much stronger water supply into these hotter fires, to more effectively handle incidents.

Replacement of Fire Headquarters is a high priority for us. The building is not getting any better and locating all the specialized equipment in a central location would result in better coverage. We are asking the voters to support our proposal for a new building design and then for funding of a new building.

The training program has continued to be solid. Under the co-operative efforts of Asst. Chiefs Gasco and Silver, a weekly training schedule featured some back to the basics along with some training to stay up with current issues. A program developed and presented by Cross Street Associates really kicked it up a notch. Under the direction of Joe Nedder, a multi-night training was held which brought in the fire science of modern day firefighting and detailed the theories of why fires now burn hotter and faster, creating new dangers. We featured an intense RIT (Rapid Intervention Team) program. With the Sutton and Grafton Fire Departments, our members trained in a Tri-Town effort in order to be to able to mix and match members of a rescue team from any town and work as a consistent team. This training covered many self-rescue technics and also live scenarios to rescue our own trapped in a building fire. Some of the training took place in Killingly Connecticut, at their training facility. Monthly maintenance of equipment is performed to assure reliable performance. Sixty training sessions along with twelve monthly meetings were held. The pump training course that started last year by Walter Swenson continues to strive. The program brings the theories and practices of moving water into real life evolutions to better train for the actual environment that they will be expected to operate in. The driver's training program it still very successful. Tom LaVallee is the Driver Training Instructor and runs the program. It works very well in transforming someone that can drive a car into a safe operator of a piece of fire apparatus weighing twenty to thirty tons.

Chief Desorcy and the Millbury Police Department have provided much support for our operations. The Dispatchers are our first line of defense and we can't thank them enough for all they do to keep us safe and coordinate our efforts. It sometimes amazes me the work the dispatchers accomplish and the assistance they render us, sometimes in the middle of some very hectic situations. Thank you to all the dispatchers for what you do every day to serve the town. Med-Star Ambulance and supervisor Eric Gordon have continued to serve us well. They partner with us during emergency calls and also at the school drills by assisting with medical drills. They have also helped at all our fire prevention events and the open house. Med-Star was very proactive throughout the year with health fairs at the Senior Center and assisting wherever they can.

I appreciate the support of all the town departments. The DPW has helped us many times in various capacities, including the Town Mechanic to help keep our fleet running efficiently. We

get assistance throughout the year from many departments and individuals, too many to list here, and we thank them all.

The Explorer Post has grown to be a vital part of our operations. Under the guidance of Asst. Chief Bob Silver, Chief Hamilton and Captain Keith Newlands, the program is going into its eight year. The program, which is supported through the Boy Scouts of America, succeeds in focusing the kids on valuable skills while keeping them involved in a group of their peers and teaching them ethical standards. The Explorers has proven to be a great help at incidents by changing out air bottles, packing hose and assisting the Ladies Auxiliary, along with many other functions.

Our presence on social media continues. We sometimes hear someone state that they didn't realize how busy we are because they only thought we went out when they heard the fire horn. Most of the calls are only dispatched by way of paging. Our activity is generally published through our Facebook page and also in the Millbury-Sutton Chronicle. We appreciate all the help from the Chronicle. We are not looking to be a breaking news service; we just want to let the citizens experience what our members are contributing to the community.

Edd Cote continues to assist us in many ways. He is the official Millbury Fire Department Photographer and does not receive compensation for anything he does. Edd comes out at all times, day or night, to photograph and preserve what has become such a vital record of what we do. He certainly is a valued member of our team.

The Ladies Auxiliary has been very active. With the increased number of fires and incidents we have had, they have been with us, supporting the firefighters supplying food and drinks. They serve pizza at the open house and step forward for any event going on. They also donate equipment to us that the fire department is unable to obtain. Thank you to all the ladies for the dedicated service you perform.

Student Government Day was a success this year. With student Fire Chief Mitchell Robbins, also a Fire Explorer, the overall function of the fire department and the role of public safety to the town was covered. It sometimes amazes, even those that have been involved, how many places the fire department plays a part in the operation of the town.

Assistant Chief Robert Silver has continued his studies in fire investigation. His advanced skills have been put to use in many of the fires recently and have become a great asset to both our department and also to the State Fire Marshal's office. He has really focused on succeeding in the field and I'm sure will continue with his studies.

Our Head Clerk, Regina Markey goes well above and beyond what would be expected of her. The Millbury Fire Department would not run as efficient as is does if it not for her. As the functions of the fire service have grown and every aspect of what is performed is required to be documented, this is done by Regina with precision. Whether it's keeping the board up to date

with information, supplying information to the State or retrieving records for insurance companies, she does it with amazing detail. She is an extremely dedicated person, I really can't thank her for all that she does and I am still amazed by her work ethics. She is *the Heart and Soul of the Millbury Fire Department*.

The five-man Board of Fire Engineers oversees the policies and procedures of the Millbury Fire Department. The board has continued with the team approach of problem solving. There are so many facets of running a proficient department and keeping current with standards, that it takes many members covering various areas of specialties. I appreciate the support and involvement of Dave, Brian, Steve and Bob; you guys are the best!

The most important fact that has allowed us to succeed is the extreme dedication of the men and women that comprise the Millbury Fire Department. Our Firefighters leave their family and friends at a moment's notice, not ever knowing if it will be a "routine" alarm that terminates quickly or a more involved situation which sometimes takes its toll physically, mentally or both. Your dedication and passion has not gone unnoticed and I thank each and every one of you. We are often referred to as the "best bang for the buck", which I believe we are, but I consider us to be "*the best in the business*" and I am privileged to lead this group.

The Council on Aging office, Senior Center and Drop in lounge are located at 1 River Street. We are in our *44th year* serving those 60 years and older.

The days and hours of operation are as follows: Monday through Friday 8:00 A.M. to 4:30 P.M., and Wednesday evening from 5:00 P.M. to 8:00 P.M. The Town's elder population is *3,166*.

The following programs and services are being offered:

Intergenerational Programs (Helping Hands, M.O.V.E. Program), Computer Classes, Socialization (cards, bingo, & games) Information, Referral and Client Advocacy, Fuel Assistance Program, Legal Aid, Free Tax Program, Periodical Informational/Educational Programs, Friendly Visitors Program, Day trips, and Evening Activities.

Nutrition Program: Through a grant from Elder Services of Worcester, we provide a hot lunch program at the Senior Center, Monday thru Friday at 12 noon. We delivered approximately 75 meals per day to the homebound. We provided a total of 10,626 congregate meals and 15,750 home delivered meals. We also deliver holiday, snow days and evening meals to those who qualify. Free breakfast was served every Tuesday from 9 to 10:30 am. The sponsor for our MOW Drivers is the Millbury Savings Bank.

Our health services include: Podiatrist Clinic, Health Education Clinic, Hearing Aid Clinic; Osteoporosis Forums, Flu Shot Clinic, along with our weekly Stay Well Clinic, Exercise Classes, Yoga, Tai Chi and Zumba Gold are also offered. Social Activities; There are many social activities that the Council on Aging provides: Cards, bingo, crafts, walking club, sing-a-long, whist, craft store, movies, and Wii bowling, Bridge and monthly birthday parties. Summer concerts were provided in the garden, by our major sponsors Mike and Lucille Maguire with Selectmen Fran King co-sponsoring one.

We also worked with the Blackstone Valley Tourism to encourage more events such as the "Chain of Lights". Our evening activities and weekend events are extremely successful and it gives the younger elder population some wonderful things to do and to keep them active.

We also provide day and over night trips, other miscellaneous activities that take place away from the Center. These are done through the efforts of the Friends of the Millbury Seniors Inc.

Transportation: Through the efforts of the Friends of the Millbury Seniors they provided during the past year *12,796* one way rides to the elderly and handicapped of Millbury. The service also, provides rides for all ADA Clients, (Americans with Disabilities). The service area is one town out in each direction (Auburn, Grafton, Sutton and Worcester), and have added a new service with Towns Without Borders, to Whitinsville, Northbridge, and Shrewsbury. The "Friends" hold the contract with the WRTA to supply the transportation services to the Town.

Grants Received: The Council on Aging was successful in obtaining several grants, this past year. They were \$28,940.00 from the Executive Office of Elder Affairs for program services for year 2016 at the Senior Center, \$25,000.00 from Millbury Savings Bank for a Fuel Assistance program and \$3,500 for the Meals on Wheels program. Through the effort of our Friends of the Millbury Seniors, they are also providing the funding for the plantings and upkeep of the Victorian Garden. The "Friends" group is the sole support of the Transportation Program that also maintains the mandatory ADA service which the Town is required to provide for the WRTA. They are the sponsor for the Millbury Food Pantry located at the Senior Center. The Friends Group received a Grant in the amount of \$1,500 for the Food Pantry from Fallon Community Health and a \$54,000 grant for a replacement vehicle. The State gives 80% and the "Friends" raises the 20% balance.

The COA is the Co-sponsor with the Board of Selectmen for the Elder Community Work Off Program. Currently we have 23 individuals working in 12 Town Departments. The warrant article was for \$20,000 allowing individuals to earn up to \$1,500 in credits on the property tax bill for a fiscal year.

To the staff: A sincere thanks for doing outstanding jobs and implementing the programs and services at the Senior Center. Special thanks to all the wonderful volunteers who do an outstanding job at a whole variety of different things, we are *104* strong.

The Council on Aging Board and I sincerely thank all Town Departments, Town Agencies, Churches, Merchants, Civic Groups and all the Townspeople for their continued support.

The Chair of the Millbury Board of Selectmen and the Director of the Council on Aging or his/her designee shall present Millbury's oldest resident with a plaque and lapel pin signifying the honor and shall cause the name of the honoree to be inscribed on a plaque to be displayed along with the original Boston Post Cane at the Millbury Town Hall, as well as a picture of the recipient and a brief biography. There shall also be certificates awarded honoring those residents who are 90 years old or older and meet the residency requirements.

The location of the presentation will be determined according to the circumstances of the honoree. A Committee consisting of the Town Clerk, the COA's Executive Director and the Selectmen Designee to review each year the status of the oldest resident. This would be done on the anniversary of the date given. Each year an announcement would appear in the paper and or on Cable TV stating who is the current oldest Millbury resident.

The recipient will retain this honor as long as he/she remains in Millbury even though another resident may become eligible. The Town Clerk's Office must be notified if the recipient of the Boston Post Cane dies, changes residency outside the Town of Millbury, is in rehabilitation for longer than 90 days or otherwise refuses or returns the honor. If the decision is made to no longer display the Boston Post Cane at the Town Hall, it would be placed in the custody of the Millbury Historical Society.



The Millbury Housing Authority hereby presents the annual report for the fiscal year ending September 30, 2017.

This report is dedicated in memory of Lorraine Hayes a long standing former member of the Board of Commissioners for the Millbury Housing Authority, who passed away on September 8, 2017. Gone, but never forgotten.

CHAPTER 200-1

The Chapter 200-1 Program consists of twenty-five Cape Cod houses located on Memorial Drive. These houses were originally built to house veterans after World War II. While veterans are given preference under this program, the units also provide safe, decent, sanitary housing at affordable rents for families of low income regardless of veteran status. The units continue to be completely occupied.

The Housing Authority pays a designated fee "in lieu of taxes" on these properties and pays the ongoing rate designated for sewer usage.

CHAPTER 705

The Housing Authority currently houses eleven low income families under this program. Five families are housed in the scattered site properties owned by the Housing Authority and six families live in a three duplex site located on Burbank Street.

The Housing Authority pays sewerage use and real estate taxes on all of its 705 properties.

MRVP PROGRAM

At the end of summer 2017 there were two individuals or families participating in the Massachusetts Rental Voucher Program. Participants in this program are entitled to a fixed voucher payment, made directly to their landlord. The voucher payment is based on the household size, income, composition and the geographical location of the rental unit. These vouchers continue to be mobile allowing participants to use the vouchers anywhere in the state.

CHAPTER 667-C

This program is made up of one hundred forty-six units of low income housing for the elderly and handicapped. Thirty-two of the units located on Pearl Street, sixty units are located on Colonial Drive and another fifty-four units are located at 95 Elm Street. All units continue to be fully occupied.

MILLBURY HOUSING AUTHORITY

CHAPTER 667-4

The Chapter 667-4, Congregate Housing Program, located on Colonial Drive, consists of five apartments with a total of twenty-three bedrooms. This program is designed to provide affordable housing together with supportive social and health services to help individuals maintain independent living and prevent early and unnecessary rest home or nursing home placement. It provides companionship, yet offers privacy to its participants.

A separate application must be filed for this program. Applicants must first meet the same financial and age requirements as our conventional housing programs to be eligible. For an application or program information, call the Millbury Housing Authority at 508-865-2660 or Lisa Bennes, Congregate Coordinator, at 508-865-2960.

The Millbury Housing Authority continues to act as a sponsor for the Congregate Housing Program under a grant from the Executive Office Elder Affairs.

MAINTENANCE

Our maintenance program involves maintenance of forty-four buildings that include two hundred nine units. Housing Authority maintenance personnel maintain common areas, grounds, and parking lots in our elderly developments. Families in single or duplex housing units maintain their own grounds.

Our maintenance staff consists of three full-time positions; Thomas Austin, Head of Maintenance, Michael Michalak, Sr., and Michael Murray. The dedication and excellent work performance of our maintenance department is reflected in the condition of the Housing Authority's properties.

ADMINISTRATION

Management and maintenance of all Housing Authority programs and properties is administered by the Executive Director and approved by the Board of Commissioners. The Housing Authority address is 89 Elm Street, Millbury, MA 01527. Office hours are 8:00am to 3:30pm, closing for lunch from 12:00pm to 1:00pm, Monday through Thursday. On Friday the office is closed to the public.

The administrative staff consists of four full time employees; Administrative Assistant, Judith Flynn, Congregate and Housing Service Manager, Lisa Bennes, Maintenance Program Manager, Carol Morse and Executive Director, Carol A. Smith.

Millbury Public Access is funded solely by grants from Charter and Verizon; we do not use tax money to fund our organization.

I hereby submit an annual report for the year ending June 30, 2017.

Since starting as Millbury's part time Energy Manager in August 2017, I have assisted the Energy Advisory Committee and the Town in achieving the goal of reducing our energy consumption by 20 percent through the Department of Energy Resources' Green Communities Program.

The last annual report specified proposed CY2016 energy reduction projects. This report identifies completed projects and proposed new projects. In CY2016, Millbury was awarded \$247,661 in grant funding from DOER. The funds were used for the following municipal projects:

Millbury High School: Lighting Retrofit

<u>Description</u>: The project was the upgrade of the gymnasium lights at the High School with LEDs. The upgrade was completed in November 2016.

<u>Projected Savings:</u> \$1,822 per year by decreasing electric use by 11,082 kilowatt-hours/year, or the equivalent of more than the annual electric use of a New England household.

<u>Budget:</u> The Town received \$15,352.18 from the Green Communities Grant to fund the project. Utility Incentives are \$5,250.00 and the total cost of the project is \$20,602.18. The Town contributed zero dollars to this project.

Elmwood School Transformers

<u>Description</u>: The project was the removal of ten transformers and replacement with four transformers that are smaller and more efficient at the Elmwood Elementary School. The modifications were complete in April 2017.

<u>Projected Savings:</u> \$2,758 per year by decreasing electric usage by 30,122 kilowatthours/year, or the equivalent of the annual electric use of three New England households.

<u>Budget:</u> The Town received \$9.344.00 from the Green Communities Grant to fund the project. Utility Incentives are \$9,036.60, the Town contributed \$4,634.40, and the total cost of the project is \$23,015.00.

Elmwood School Lighting Retrofit

<u>Description:</u> The project involved the conversion of existing lighting to LEDs consisting of nineteen (19) pole mounted flood lights and thirty-seven (37) building mounted exterior fixtures. This finished the town's effort to install outside LED lighting at all three (3) schools. All three schools now have LED lighting along their driveways and parking lots. The project was completed in October 2016.

<u>Projected Savings:</u> \$4,747.43 per year by decreasing electric usage by 13,421 kilowatthours/year, or the equivalent of the annual electric use of a New England household. **Budget:** The Town received \$30,017.21 from the Green Communities Grant to fund the project. Utility Incentives are \$4,635.00 and the total cost of the project is \$34,652.21. The Town contributed zero dollars to this project.

Millbury Municipal – Electric Vehicles and Charging Stations

<u>Description</u>: The project was the purchase of four electric cars, 2016 Nissan Leaf Model SV, and the installation of four charging stations. The project was completed in September 2016.

<u>Projected Savings:</u> \$3,941 per year by decreasing gasoline consumption and maintenance costs.

<u>Budget:</u> The Town received \$87,928.15 from the Green Communities Grant to fund the project. Other incentives were \$40,500.00 and the total cost of the project is \$128,428.15. The Town contributed zero dollars to this project.

Town of Millbury – LED Streetlights

<u>Description</u>: The project was Phase One of the streetlight conversion of all Town-owned lights from High-Pressure Sodium to LEDs. Specifically, the replacement of half of the streetlights with LEDs. As of June 30, 2017 the project had not been bid. However, the project was bid in the next fiscal year (bid October 2017 and completed in January 2018). The second phase of the project will consist of the last half of the streetlights, expected to be modified a year later with a subsequent round of Green Communities grant funds.

<u>Projected Savings:</u> From Phase 1, annual savings of \$14,047 by decreasing electric usage by 84,631 kilowatt-hours/year, or the equivalent of the annual electric use of eight New England households.

<u>Budget:</u> The Town is expected to receive \$84,442.75 from the Green Communities Grant to fund the project. Utility Incentives were \$26,314.25 and the total cost of the project is \$110,757.00. The Town contributed zero dollars to this project.

In addition to these grant projects, The Town has completed a residential electric aggregation plan which will begin in July 2017. We continue to do outreach and education through our website, public forums, and social media.

Shaw School feasibility study, as well as the support we received for the School department budget. Because of your continued and strong support, we are able to prepare our children with the skills and competencies they need to be successful far into the 21st century.

The Committee continues to support the reorganization of the District's playing fields. This process will bring our athletic facilities up to acceptable standards, reorganize the use of the available land we have for greater efficiency, and provide our student athletes with facilities they can take pride in as they perfect their skills and achieve success. Completion of both projects will benefit the greater community as the school buildings and athletic fields continue to be some of the most heavily used assets owned by the Town of Milbury.

Millbury Public Schools have made great strides under the superintendent's administration:

- As a district we are vertically aligned from pre-school through to the school committee.
- The level of communication from the schools has greatly increased using multiple digital platforms to keep all stakeholders informed.
- Safety preparation and protocol implementation for our students and the adults who care for them has become part of everyday routine.
- The High School has undergone an overhaul of its course offerings, graduation requirements, updated the bell schedule to allow longer class times and has increased the number of Advanced Placement courses offered.
- The Shaw school has introduced a co-teaching model to allow all students access to a rigorous curriculum in an uninterrupted classroom setting with a team of highly qualified teachers.
- The Elmwood Street School piloted the use of instructional coaches, a model that was adopted throughout the district.

The School Committee completed a comprehensive three-year review of the policies that govern and guide our school system. These policies are now available and fully searchable through the district website.

You can read in greater detail the efforts of the school district in the Report of the Superintendent following this report.

From the Superintendent

I am pleased to report on the many activities and accomplishments of the Millbury Public Schools, its faculty, staff, and students.

The year was very busy as the school district continued its work on both short-term and longrange instructional and capital improvement goals to meet the needs of all students. Chief among our instructional goals is the completion of a comprehensive curriculum review in grades PK-12. This review, based on rigorous state standards and local achievement data, will better

align instruction both within and among our schools. This effort will be especially effective with the support of our highly-qualified instructional coaches in each school, who ensure the use of best practices for making instructional improvements in response to achievement data.

continue Teachers and administrators to work implement collaboratively to the Department of Elementary and Secondary Education's evaluation process in a genuine and meaningful way, allowing all educators to focus on improving the quality of teaching and learning through ongoing feedback and reflection. The Millbury Teachers' Association has been especially collaborative in this effort, working with administrators to ensure consistent and high standards for all.



The District's three-year strategy for improvement, which includes specific goals and objectives, was accepted by the Millbury School Committee at their October 14, 2015 meeting and guides the District's budgeting priorities, professional development offerings, educator and evaluator goals, and each school's improvement plan. Each of the plan's four key objectives (Student Learning, Staff Development and Support, Family and Community Engagement, and Student and Staff Safety) will be achieved through three to four specific and strategic initiatives. This



strategy document is available on the Millbury Public School District's website at millburyschools.org.

We are very pleased to report that our schools now offer greater access to a wide range of 21st Century technology than ever before. It is our mission to prepare

our students to be successful and responsible digital citizens, and recent improvements, including the installation of interactive SmartBoards[©] and projectors, new desktop computers, and mobile laptop carts, has already made a significant difference for our students and their teachers. We are

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committed to maintaining technology that is sufficient to not only deliver an increasingly rigorous and varied curriculum, but to enhance and expand high-quality teaching and deeper learning throughout our District. Indeed, in this day and age, ensuring that our students have equal access to technology is no longer a luxury, it has become a minimal and non-negotiable standard. To that end, the District is investigating opportunities to provide students in grades 7-12 with access to a device on a 24/7 basis. This initiative, which is often referred to as "1-to-1" or "1:1," will provide students with access to technology not only during school hours, but also at home. Many of our neighbors have already transitioned to a 1:1 environment and see it as an opportunity to level the technology playing field in their communities and develop critical skills that all students need in the 21st century.



There is nothing more important than the safety of our students and the adults who care for them. The District continues to conduct an ongoing and extensive review of its safety procedures under the direction of a standing Safety Committee and continues to implement a wide range of safety protocols to address critical needs.

• All three schools in the District have conducted successful relocation drills, which provide for student safety in the event that a school building must be vacated unexpectedly.

• The School District continues to work very closely with the Millbury Police Department to provide ongoing ALICE training to all staff. The ALICE

protocol (Alert, Lockdown, Inform, Counter, and Evacuate) has been widely embraced as a best practice in schools throughout the Commonwealth and represents a significant and positive improvement to our school safety.

- In collaboration with the Millbury Police Department, each school conducts at least one "unauthorized visitor" drill annually to assess our responsiveness to the presence of an unidentified / unauthorized person in the building.
- Special shatter-proof glass film has been installed in certain areas of the District to provide greater security against an unauthorized intruder.

We are especially proud of the District's strong partnership with the Millbury Fire Department and the Millbury Police Department and the incredibly successful School Resource Officer program instituted in each of our schools two years ago. Officer Nikki Oliveri, who is assigned full-time to the schools and as a member of our District's faculty, serves as a resource for students and school employees alike. Her work represents a significant step forward in a community-policing model that has been used across the Commonwealth to improve school safety, strengthen community partnerships, and deliver resources to the school community.

Through its partnership with Mass Insight Education,



Millbury Jr./Sr. High School continues to enhance and expand Advanced Placement (AP) opportunities for Millbury students. Most recently, AP Computer Programming was added to the Program of Studies, offering high school students access to the rigors of a college-level programming curriculum. Since Mass Insight Education began partnering with schools in 2008, students across 60 high schools have seen expanded access to AP math, science, and English courses, increased performance on AP exams, and increased college success (more students matriculating to and graduating from college).

This opportunity would not be possible without the generous support of our community sponsors. Thanks to the support of Millbury Federal Credit Union, Wheelabrator Millbury, Inc., AA Transportation, Millbury Savings Bank, and Fidelity Bank, our students will have greater access to a varied and rigorous AP curriculum and our teachers will receive world-class professional development and training.



All students in grades 3-9 participated in *Next Generation* MCAS testing, the Commonwealth's new assessment (replacing PARCC: Partnership for Assessment of Readiness for College and Careers), in the spring. Students in grades 3 through 5 were assessed using a paper-based version of the test while students in grades 7 and 8 took an electronic version. All students in grades 9, 10 and 11 took the paper-based MCAS test for English, mathematics, and science.

It is my pleasure to congratulate Angelina DiDominca for receiving the 2017 Superintendent's Scholar Award. Angie, who was ranked first in her class with a GPA of 4.3, was recognized in January for her scholarly achievements at the Worcester County Superintendents Association Scholars' Luncheon at Clark University. Congratulations Angie!

We are happy to report that the Raymond E. Shaw Elementary School, built in 1975, has been accepted into the Massachusetts School Building Authority's (MSBA) School Project Program, which provides significant financial support to cities and towns for critical school capital projects. We are especially grateful that the community strongly supported a special warrant article to allow the School District to fund the Feasibility Study. While the faculty and staff have gone above and beyond to maintain a safe and supportive learning environment that meets the needs of students, the building's physical condition has become a key challenge. The District looks forward to using the feasibility study to determine the building's structural and operational condition in the coming year. Ultimately, a full renovation to the existing structure or a new elementary school building project

Elmwood Street Elementary School

The 2016-2017 school was definitely a busy one at the Elmwood Street Elementary School! Our overarching focus for the year was reviewing and refining our learning targets for all students at each grade level and restructuring our existing curricula to meet the changing needs of our students in light of school-wide assessment data. Ongoing data analysis also led us to other critical initiatives for the year. For example, we engaged in Learning Walks with staff;



organized our curriculum using the online curriculum mapping tool, ATLAS Rubicon; trained staff in Professional Learning Communities; and worked in teams to develop common assessments as a school. In addition, we continued our school culture discussion from the following year and made significant changes to how we recognize positive behaviors through our DREAM initiative, modeled after the work at the Shaw School. Finally, school safety will always be a critical focus as we strive to keep our students and the adults who care for them as safe as possible.

During the 2015-2016 school year, our Assistant Principal, Mr. Corey Burke, led a committee of teachers to review our discipline data and develop solutions to better support our students. The committee collaboratively reviewed and revised our Discipline Plan and Excellent Effort assemblies and focused on reinforcing positive behaviors and teaching clear

expectations. Building on our previous work with Social Thinking, we also purchased additional classroom resources to provide more options for teaching expected behaviors. The committee developed monthly themes to highlight and reinforce key skills and competencies throughout the school community (i.e. "Respect," "Independence," and "Problem Solving," just to name a few). Led by Mrs. Lizz Trahan, students learned about *Growth Mindset* and how important it is to treat our minds like a muscle: we need to exercise it regularly to make it grow stronger. Finally, students explored personal improvement goals for the year and learned how the "Power of Yet" could help them realize their goals.

I am proud to report that Elmwood has adopted the Shaw School's DREAM pledge, which has already begun to positively affect our school culture and better prepare our students for the upper grades. We revamped our Excellent Effort assemblies, expanding student recognitions and making the experience more engaging and exciting. Our monthly DREAM assemblies recognized students with Excellent Effort awards for their hard work in class and DREAM awards for modeling the theme of the month. We also invited the entire school community to attend our ceremonies, which allowed students' relatives to proudly celebrate each award recipient. These improvements have resulted increased excitement and renewed attention to proactively addressing our students' needs while creating a strong culture of positive growth.

School safety continues to be an ongoing point of emphasis within our school. We regularly conduct safety drills, including "stay in place" and "lock down" drills and school evacuation drills using our primary and secondary rally points (Shaw School and Elmwood Terrace). Many thanks to Officer Nikki Olivieri for all of her efforts to improve our safety procedures!

Our curriculum review and mapping initiative, which focuses on ways we can better support our students, is well underway. For the 2016-2017 school year, we began using ATLAS Rubicon software to streamline and support our efforts. As part of Phase One, teachers identified and mapped curriculum timelines, developed learning targets, wrote essential questions, and connected their lessons to the Common Core State Standards. Groups of grade-level teams spent the year completing



Phase One of the project and incorporating new units and sequences. Part of this process included the development of our writing program that started the year before with *Empowering Writers*.

As a school community, we value collaboration and teacher leadership as keys to improving teaching and learning. As a result, we strongly support our Professional Learning Communities (PLCs). PLCs are opportunities for teachers to meet regularly to review achievement data, current research, and best practices as they develop strategies to better meet the needs of students. We are very excited to see the many positive outcomes of our PLC groups and how they will impact the culture of our school and the educational experience of our students.

Our school-wide STEAM initiative (Science, Technology, Engineering, Arts, and Math) continued to strengthen this year as each grade added STEAM-focused activities to their units of study and incorporated them across curriculum areas. Our STEAM initiative received very strong financial support from an anonymous and very generous donor throughout the school year. A donation of \$50,000 was used to upgrade technology across the building, including the purchase of a laptop cart for 3rd grade and additional interactive whiteboards for grades K-2. A second donation of \$15,000 was used to support specialists as they integrate STEAM into their curricula. We are incredibly grateful for these very generous and thoughtful donations! Because of this support and the continued support of our entire community, we are better able to enhance our educational programs for our district's youngest learners.

Raymond E. Shaw School

The Shaw School had an eventful 2016-2017 year. The staff not only made student safety and learning a daily priority, but they continued work in the area of curriculum development as well as researching best practices and teaching methods for the 2017-2018 school year with Mrs. Friedman and Mr. Tuccio.

Data meetings changed over the course of the year as the coaches began implementing more components of the *Data into Action* model. This approach brought about positive rewards as the staff used the "Notice and Wonder" protocol to reflect on instructional practices. The fall data meetings were extremely refreshing as teams identified instructional areas they wanted to improve, worked with coaches to do so, adjusted their curriculum maps as needed, and began creating common formative assessments so they would be better able to triangulate data for the following school year. The following data meetings were spent reflecting on student progress. Having the coaches throughout this process was crucial as they provided much needed support and research based guidance.



Using the platform of *Atlas Rubicon*, the staff spent several extended days and professional development days analyzing the standards and reflecting on practices. The teachers are to be highly commended for their commitment to their willingness to pull apart what they have been doing to improve their instructional practices. They will use Atlas Rubicon as a living document to adjust and improve as they dive into all standards in the upcoming year.

Shaw's tradition of community service continued this year. We are very proud that a group of seven 6th graders wrote, implemented, and then reflected on three community service learning grants in support of the Millbury Police Department, the Care One center, and the Senior Center.



Additionally, there were four other community service learning grants completed by Shaw staff members with students.

The Shaw administration conducted a great deal of research on co-teaching over the course of the school year to determine whether the implementation of this model would improve students' academic growth.

Research showed that co-teaching would address these concerns of student growth and grant funding was used to provide a skilled consultant to train teachers and support their implementation of an effective co-teaching team model at each grade level for the 2017-2018 school year.

The school year ended with the staff reflection as well as discussion of the upcoming School Improvement Plan. We look forward to a rigorous and successful 2017-2018 school year!

Millbury Memorial Junior/Senior High School

The Woolies saw many exciting changes over the 2016-2017 school year! Millbury Jr./Sr. High School welcomed Mr. Christopher Lowe as the new Assistant Principal of the high school. Mr. Lowe joins the Woolie family with experience as an Assistant Principal, department leader, and classroom teacher.

The 2016-2017 school year included the implementation of a new daily schedule, which was adopted following intensive research and committee deliberations during the fall of 2015. The new schedule, which is a "7 drop 2" period rotating schedule, allows students to attend five of their seven classes each day, providing for longer class periods and more opportunities for

innovative experiences. The schedule also includes a morning Professional Learning Community period for teachers, allowing for curriculum collaboration within and between departments and professional development. The schedule also provides students with a common directed study (CDS) each morning, allowing time for additional support from teachers. The schedule gives seniors the privilege to arrive to school at the end of the CDS if they are in good academic standing. Overall, the new schedule received favorable reviews from both students and staff.

Our *Program of Studies* was reviewed extensively and updated to increase learning opportunities for all of our students. Health and wellness, computer technology, ensemble, and a variety of new orbital offerings were



added to the junior high school schedule. The Commonwealth's recommended MassCore program, which gives students a rigorous program of study designed to develop and prepare them for college and career options, was adopted at the high school. Expansion of the foreign language and fine arts requirements is one highlight of MassCore. Also included in the updated program of study were new offerings in English, physical education, performing arts, foreign

language, and a new alignment for our science courses to better support the Next Generation Science Standards.

Our strong community partnerships continue to grow. The Blackstone Valley Education Foundation, which fosters opportunities for students and staff in STEM-related experiences, leadership training, and internships, has been an incredible partner in our students' education. We completed our second year in the MassInsight Education (MIE) cohort, a grant-funded program to expand and enhance our Advanced Placement (AP) courses, as well as provide teachers with professional development and resources in math, science, and English AP offerings. Our partnership with MIE was made possible thanks to generous sponsorships from Millbury Federal Credit Union, Wheelabrator, Millbury Savings Bank, Fidelity Bank, and AA Transportation.



A group of forty-two students and staff traveled to Costa Rica during April vacation and experienced the country's culture and beauty, creating amazing and life-lasting memories. Thank you to social studies teacher Mr. Besian Kodra for organizing this wonderful trip!

The first 8th grade promotion ceremony celebrated over 130 junior woolies for their successful completion of middle school. This well-attended celeb ration marked a very exciting milestone in the lives of our students. Congratulations class of 2021!

Our 8th grade ELA classes studied the theme of "The Hero's Journey" and explored how certain characteristics are exemplified in the modern day hero. As part of this unit of study, students incorporated a community service learning project to design opportunities to become heroes within our own community. In conjunction with the United States Marine Corps, students ran a "Toys for Tots" drive to help local families during the holiday season. After their

collection, student representatives (who secured a grant for transportation) as well as 18 other students who won an essay contest were able to go to the Toys for Tots warehouse located in Worcester to help Marines sort and package toys.

In early April, the freshman class went to a special performance of Shakespeare & Company's *Romeo and Juliet* at Regis College in Weston, MA. The event would not have been possible without the efforts of Mr. Thomas Reilly, who received a grant for the play last fall, and the Millbury Parents Club, who generously helped pay for transportation costs. A moment of silence was observed in honor of Mr. Reilly before the start of the play.

This year's Senior Project Exhibition was a testament to the many varied interests that our students hold. When given the opportunity to research, create, and present on a topic of their choosing, students found inspiration in the ability to personalize their education. Topics ranged

from planning to travel the world to the realities of addiction rehabilitation. Along the way, students were responsible for crafting a proposal, working with experts in a given field, understanding time management, and presenting a finished product.

Eighth grade students travelled to Boston in the spring to see the Lodz Ghetto Exhibit at the Museum of Fine Arts. After studying the Holocaust extensively along with *The Diary of Anne*

Frank and *Schindler's List*, it was very rewarding to see the powerful photographs taken by Henry Ross. Our students were also able to enjoy the Art of the Ancient World exhibit as part of their work in Social Studies.

With 2016 being an election year, the department organized a student election committee to register eligible students to vote and held a mock presidential election for the entire high school in concert with the Town Clerk. In addition, many students had opportunities to experience history at their fingertips, including AP US History students who participated in the "We The People" mock



hearing in Boston and students who took part in the annual state-wide Student Government Day at the State House.

The Business Club hosted its annual National Enterprise Day as well as a trip to visit the JFK Presidential Library as part of the JFK 100th birthday anniversary. The club awarded \$1,150 in scholarships to graduating seniors, while five graduating seniors met the business concentration requirement to receive a certificate at graduation. Students were exposed to authentic business learning including the accounting class visiting Webster 1st Credit Union as part of a grant from



the Blackstone Valley Educational Foundation; computer application class had a guest speaker from Black and Decker to show how excel can be used in business; and accounting students attended the Massachusetts Society of CPAs conference at Babson.

Our performing arts department continued to display the musical talents of our Woolies at the annual Winter Concert, Percussion Night, Spring Concert, and Jazz Night, where students from Sutton and Grafton combined with Millbury to perform. Our Marching Band earned a bronze medal at MICCA finals and Winter Guard took 3rd place at NESBA

finals. Kudos to senior Tyler Whiterell who made central district jazz ensemble and to 8^a graders Keegan Gleason, Perry Drugan, Katheryn Mimo, and Lillian Reves who made Jr. High School chorus districts.

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Our drama program provided a fall play, musical competition in early spring and ended their year with the Spring Musical Sister Act. The Jr. High drama production had a very successful performance of *Beauty and the Beast*. Our visual arts department boasted two 3rd place awards in the James P. McGovern Congressional Art Show (65 high schools participated with over 175 submitted art pieces) and 1st place in the Lions Club local international peace poster competition. Our senior art students received college acceptance letters from a variety of art schools, including Pratt, Chicago Institute of Design, South Carolina University, Becker Gaming Program, Fitchburg & Salem State University, St. Augustine University, Anna Maria, and Mass Art!

The Woolie athletic department had over 720 student athletes participate in over 30 athletic opportunities. This number represents an increase of over 75 student-athletes from previous years. Opportunities for our 7th and 8th graders continue to grow. To develop student leaders, the department sent several student-athletes to multiple MIAA sponsored workshops. There is continued work on a master plan development to improve our athletic complex and the facilities for our student-athletes to participate in and on. Additionally, collaboration with the Booster Club provided our student-athletes with much needed equipment and supplies. Many Woolie student-athletes set personal bests, achieved school records and were recognized for individual accomplishments. The Woolies won multiple SWCL championships and were recognized with sportsmanship awards, evidence of the athletic skill and citizenship of our school community.

During the 2016-2017 school year, a total of 409 AP course exams were given to 262 students in English Language & Composition, English Literature & Composition, U.S. History, Calculus AB, Computer Science A, Biology, Chemistry, Physics 1, and Spanish Language & Culture. On the Massachusetts Comprehensive Assessment System (MCAS) Spring 2016 English Language Arts test, 100% of BVT students scored Advanced or Proficient, compared to the statewide average of 91%. In Math, 95% of students scored Advanced or Proficient, compared to the statewide average of 78%. On the Science and Technology/Engineering exam, an impressive 95% of BVT students scored Advanced or Proficient, compared to 73% statewide. In Spring 2016, 174 freshmen took the High School Science MCAS and 100% scored in the Advanced and Proficient categories.

Valley Tech Budget Connects Skills, Workforce, and Post-Secondary Training

As the BVT School Committee advanced the District's FY17 budget, they developed a blueprint that was responsive to Governor Charlie Baker's concerns of the looming skills shortage. The District's FY17 operating budget of \$21,956,739 represented a modest 3.00% increase and was funded primarily by \$8,840,232 in Chapter 70 & 71 State Aid and \$12,718,507 in Member Assessments. As a dedicated partner of our District towns, we remain committed to further assisting their fiscal management, austerity, and planning by presenting a single, consolidated

annual request. Valley Tech operates within the dollars requested regardless of any unforeseen variables within anticipated revenue streams.
