BOARD OF SELECTMEN

The Board of Selectmen held 21 regular meetings and 6 special selectmen's meetings during fiscal 2008-2009. Selectman Coggans missed his first meeting in 11 years as he had heart surgery in March.

Some of the highlights of the year were: We appointed a new DPW Director, John McGarry, P.E. Selectman Michael O. Moore stepped down from the Board as he was elected as State Senator in the Second Worcester District - we are so very proud to have him as our Senator! Kevin Krassopoulos was appointed the full time Public Access Director, funded solely through the Public Access/Cable TV funds.

The Annual Town Election was held on Tuesday, April 28, 2009. Selectmen Kenneth Schold and Francis King ran unopposed and were re-elected to another three year term, Michael Moore's empty seat brought out many candidates: David Boudreau, Ronald Bourdeau, Anna Lewandowski, Brian Stowell and Jay Hanratty. Brian Stowell became our new Selectman. The budget season was a very tumultuous one as we found ourselves in the worst economic downturn since the great depression. With a lot of work and tightening of belts, the budget was pulled together. The Annual Town Meeting was held on Tuesday, May 5, 2009 and we needed a special town meeting on June 23, 2009 to close the budget.

During the year the Board of Selectmen had numerous opportunities to recognize citizens of Millbury such as Sgt. Richard O'Brien and Sgt. Stephen Webb retiring from the Police Department, Richard Plante retired from the Cemetery Commission, Walter Hagstrom retiring from the Board of Assessors, many teacher retirements, presentation to Gilberte Army for her 100th Birthday and other citizens for their many efforts in assisting the Town in providing services for our town.

On Thursday March 19th at the State House in Boston, Common Cause Massachusetts presented the 2009 e-Government Awards to 118 cities and towns from across the Commonwealth. BOSTON POST CANE





On August 2, 1909, Mr. Edwin A. Grozier, Publisher of the Boston Post, a newspaper, forwarded to the Board of Selectmen in 700 towns* (no cities included) in New England a goldheaded ebony cane with the request that it be presented with the compliments of the Boston Post to the oldest male citizen of the town, to be used by him as long as he lives (or moves from the town), and at his death handed down to the next oldest citizen of the town. The cane would belong to the town and not the man who received it. In 1930, after considerable controversy, eligibility for the cane was opened to women as well.

The recipient this year was **Helen Collette**, born March 31, 1906, she will retain this honor as long as she remains in Millbury even though another resident may become eligible. We will reassess the honor each November. She was presented a plaque with the depiction of the top of the cane by Chairman Plante and the Council on Aging Director Judith O'Connor at a ceremony at the Senior Center. The original Boston Post Cane remains locked in a showcase at the Municipal Office Building. The replica of the cane that was given out, we believe, in 1996 and has not been returned.

All public hearings and public meetings concerning the filing of a Notice of Intent (N.O.I.), an Abbreviated Notice of Resource Area Delineation (ANORAD) or a Request for Determination of Applicability (R.D.A.) continue to be advertised, generally, in the Millbury-Sutton Chronicle.

The Conservation Commission continues to encourage all to use the Town's Conservation areas for passive recreation such as hiking and bird watching. The Police Department should be notified if any hunting or use of A.T.V. vehicles is noticed on these lands. Civic groups and individuals volunteering to help maintain or establish new trails are always welcomed and greatly appreciated.

The Conservation Commission can be reached by dialing 508-865-5411 at the Municipal Office Building. If no one is available, you may leave a message on our answering machine. The Commission normally meets on the first and third Wednesday evening of each month beginning at 7:00 p.m. One meeting a month is generally scheduled in July and August. Comments and inquiries from the public are always welcome.

APPROVAL NOT REQUIRED PLANS

There were five (5) plans filed under Chapter 41, Section 81P of the General Laws, Approval Not Required, during Fiscal Year 2009. These plans represent perimeter surveys, division of land with adequate frontage on public streets as required by the Millbury Zoning Bylaws, easement descriptions, or lot-line modifications.

SPECIAL PERMITS

There are numerous situations and proposals that require a Special Permit, a process in which the Planning Board is charged with determining whether a particular development should be allowed to occur. The town's zoning bylaw lists the criteria for making these decisions, based on the Board's analysis of extensive technical and public input. Below is a summary of the various special permits applied for during the fiscal year, and the Board's decisions:

Multifamily Special Permits: Two (2) applications were filed under this section of the Zoning Bylaw. One application was approved, with conditions, for one additional dwelling unit on Grafton Road. One application was for 10 townhouse style units on Sycamore Street; after multiple public hearings, application was withdrawn by applicant.

Sign Special Permit: One (1) application was filed under this section of the Zoning Bylaw, 73 Elm Street, and was approved by the Planning Board.

Modifications to Special Permits: Six (6) applications for modifications were filed. Five were approved, with conditions, one was denied: (1) 130 Westborough Street, Site Plan Review and Post-Construction Stormwater Management Plan – 1,000 square foot addition to house a conference room rest room, lobby and stairwell, approved; (2) FIBA Technologies, 1535 Grafton Street – allowing more efficient water runoff treatment, approved; (3) Stratford Village, Burbank Street – an extension of time for completion was granted, as well as approval to eliminate the over 55 requirement, and the addition of a playground and bus shelter; (4) Gorettis Supermarket, Providence Road – revisions to receiving area, approved; (5) The Shoppes at Blackstone Valley – the addition of two outdoor seasonal market carts, approved; (6) Discover Marble & Granite, 4 Latti Farm Road – revisions to sidewalk and curbing, denied.

SUBDIVISIONS

There were two (2) new definitive subdivisions filed with the Planning Board, and approved, with conditions: Ladyslipper Lane, a three lot optional residential compound, property located off of Stowe Road; and Hilltop Estates, a three lot subdivision located off of Hilltop Drive.

- One modification to a definitive subdivision plan was approved: Longwood Farms, a 12 lot subdivision located off of McGrath Road request for an extension of time for completion.
- The Board held public hearings to consider rescinding two previously approved subdivisions: Autumn Gate Estates, property located off of Grafton Road the Planning Board voted not to rescind this project; McCracken Meadows, property located off of McCracken Road, at the request of the applicant, the Planning Board voted to rescind this project.

CURRENT ISSUES

At the Annual Town Meeting in May of 2009, the Town adopted numerous amendments to the Zoning Bylaws. Major revisions include the newly created Bramanville Village District, and updated requirements for a Small Wind Turbine Special Permit.

Bramanville Village District: The intent of the new district is to enable the redevelopment and infill development of the central part of the historic Bramanville area, that is in keeping with the historic development pattern, and which creates a vibrant, pedestrian-friendly village center. The bylaw includes the type of uses allowed and describes the design standards for this new district.

Small Wind Turbine Special Permit: Authorizes the Planning Board to issue a special permit for the construction of a Small Wind Turbine and describes the application requirements, while providing a greater level of protection for Millbury's citizens than the bylaw previously in place.

Subdivision Rules & Regulations: The Board adopted two revisions to the current Subdivision Rules & Regulations Governing the Subdivision of Land. (1) Regarding

Environmental Analysis and Construction Plans, language was updated to require topography at one foot contour intervals and (2) Performance Guarantee/Approval with Bonds or Surety Modification now require a \$25,000 cash deposit to accompany a bond.

Open Space and Recreation Plan Update: The Open Space and Recreation Plan was successfully updated and has been conditionally approved by the Massachusetts Division of Conservation Services. Approval will enable Millbury to apply for a variety of State grants aimed at implementing Plan recommendations.

Development of an updated computer mapping system of town-wide data has continued to be a primary focal point. Parcelized maps depicting zoning districts are currently under review.

The Planning Board continues to police issues around the Braney Road/Diana Hill/Cronin Brook development, Oakes Circle development, as well as the Autumn Gate Estates development.

* * * * * * * * *

The Millbury Planning Board holds its regular meetings on the second and fourth Mondays of each month. These meetings are now televised on local access channels 11 and 26. Concerned citizens are invited to attend and anyone wishing to meet with the Board should call the Planning Department at the Municipal Office Building to make arrangements. The Planning Board encourages public participation in every element of the planning process. The Town Planner is available during regular business hours to meet with the public to address any planning issue.

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF HEALTH

TO THE HONORABLE BOARD OF SELECTMEN AND CITIZENS OF MILLBURY:

We hereby submit out annual report for the year ending June 30, 2009.

Public Health Preparedness

In 2003, the Public Health Emergency Preparedness Cooperative (CDC PHEP) grant of the US Centers for Disease Control and Prevention was announced, strengthening an emerging priority of health and medical preparedness for local Boards of Health across the nation. Since the inception of the CDC PHEP grant, the Region 2 Public Health Emergency Preparedness Coalition, a regional coalition of 74 communities in Central Massachusetts have been meeting twice per month to plan for major infectious disease events, such as an influenza pandemic. The Board has developed a plan in conjunction with Town Public Safety, Public Schools and Emergency Management officials, a system whereas local government has the ability to appropriately distribute/administer vaccines within 24 hours of a large scale infectious disease outbreak.

Regional Tobacco Control Collaborative

The RTCC is a collaborative of twenty-one Boards of Health in Central Massachusetts, of which Worcester is the lead Board. The Town of Millbury and the following communities are served: Ashland, Auburn, Boylston, Charlton, Dudley, Grafton, Holden, Hudson, Leicester, Marlborough, Northborough, Oxford, Shrewsbury, Spencer, Southborough, Southbridge, Sturbridge, West Boylston, Webster and Worcester. This collaborative maintains the integrity and autonomy of its Board of Health members while the city provides assistance and guidance in all tobacco related issues.

The RTCC is responsible for conducting youth access to tobacco compliance checks of all tobacco retail facilities in the twenty cities and towns in the collaborative. In addition, the RTCC conducts point of purchase audits for all communities within the collaborative and is also responsible for enforcing MGL 270, section 22, "Smoke Free Workplace Law." Nearly 600 fewer Massachusetts residents have died from heart attacks each year since legislators banned smoking in virtually all restaurants, bars and other workplaces.

Massachusetts law prohibits the sale of any tobacco products to those under the age of 18. Additionally, Massachusetts Attorney General's regulations require retailers to ask for photo identification from anyone attempting to purchase tobacco who appears to be under 27 years of age. The federal Synar Amendment requires all states to conduct random, unannounced compliance checks with local retailers where underage youth may attempt to purchase tobacco. There is a direct correlation between the rates of youth access and the funding of programs that educate retailers and enforce the law. The impact has been recognized on the local level. Illegal sales of tobacco to minors fell by fifty percent in Massachusetts in Fiscal Year 2007 after funding was restored to local programs responsible for preventing youth from buying tobacco.

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF HEALTH

Communicable Disease Surveillance

Infectious diseases constitute a continuing threat to the public's health. They cause illness, suffering, and death, and place an enormous financial burden on society. Although some infectious diseases have been controlled by modern technological advances, new diseases are still emerging. Under Massachusetts General Laws (MGL), Chapter 111, suspected and/or confirmed cases of diseases dangerous to the public's health are reportable to the local Board of Health and/or the Massachusetts Department of Public Health (MDPH). Reporting disease occurrences enables the public health staff to monitor trends, detect and control outbreaks, and evaluate prevention activities. The Millbury public health nurse regularly collects important information on all reported diseases as part of routine epidemiological disease investigations. The following is a summary of reported diseases in Millbury 2008-2009:

Environmental Health

The Board monitors food offered for consumption to ensure it is wholesome, free from adulteration, properly labeled, identifiable, and manufactured at an approved source. All food establishments receive mandated inspections to determine compliance with the provisions contained within the Massachusetts Sanitary Code. The Board of Health has investigated more than 137 housing and nuisance complaints, of which agents have had to respond at least twice to each complaint, for the initial and follow-up(s). There were 2 condemnations, and 20 cases were brought to court. These complaints require the enforcement of various Massachusetts Department of Public Health's Sanitary Codes, such as "Chapter 11 of Minimum Standards for Human Habitation", and Chapter X, of Minimum Sanitation Standards for Food Establishments, various Department of Environmental Protection Regulations as well as Town by-laws.

A total of 324 permits and licenses were issued.

REPORT BUTLER FARM RE-USE COMMITTEE

To the Honorable Board of Selectmen and the Citizens of the Town of Millbury, we respectfully submit our Annual Report for the fiscal year ending June 30, 2009.

Before we begin our Annual Report the Butler Farm Re-Use Committee would once again like to thank the many people who have supported us over the past year.

Accomplishments of The Butler Farm Re-Use Committee during the fiscal year were:

- 1. The Fire Department Installed a Repeater Tower at the top of the hill. The Repeater is used by both Fire and Police Departments.
- 2. M.E.M.A. Millbury Emergency Management Association has set up an Emergency Command and Communications Office.
- 3. The Farm House has a complete exterior make over. The House has been a work in process for a few years. The farm house has a new roof, gutters, trim work and carpentry repairs.
- 4. The Farm House got one coat of primer and paint this past fall. The painting was done at no cost to the town.
- 5. The garage was done over as a result of a Boy Scout Eagle project by Tim Mazeika of Boy Scout Troop 109. The garage had carpentry repairs done, a window removed, 2 windows replaced, drainage installed around the foundation and was primed and painted. This make over was done at no cost to the Town. A new roof was installed when the Farm House was done.
- 6. A new Heating System was installed as a result of a donation from a local business.
- 7. The well has been repaired and tested and found to be usable. The farm now has running water and facilities
- 8. Insulation was installed in the entire attic.
- 9. Iron handrails were installed on the front cement stairs to the door.
- 10. The landscaping and lawn mowing is being done on a weekly basis by Norm Gonyea and Ernie Bernard. Many trees and bushes have been removed away from the house and around the grounds to clean up the area.
- 11. We offered a Community Garden to residents of the Town of Millbury. The Garden plots were 10'x20' and could be doubled to accommodate any resident. The Garden space is limited so we offer plots on a first come first serve basis.
- 12. The walking trails are groomed and are being used by residents to walk and exercise their dogs. We ask that residents be courteous and pick up after their pets. Thank You.
- 13. Boy Scouts are using The Butler Farm for overnight camp-outs.

MILLBURY PUBLIC LIBRARY

The Millbury Public Library wishes to thank all our patrons, friends and the Town of Millbury for a very busy and successful year. Thanks also to the Friends of the Millbury Public Library, The Millbury Cultural Council, Mary B. Grogan and those who have donated to the library financially and through books. It has been shown that when the economy slows down the Library use goes up. Our patrons are signing up for more library cards, taking out additional books, CDs, DVDs, audio books plus magazines. The magazine increase is due to people stopping their own subscriptions at home. They come in to read the newspapers and browse the shelves for fiction and nonfiction books.

The Library computers are in high demand because many patrons don't have their own computers or internet access in their homes. Many patrons are using the computers for job search and filling out online applications. These computers sometimes are the only way for these patrons to continue their search for employment. Many students also come in to use the computers for homework and research projects.

Irene Army, our 94 year old page, retired after over twenty years of dedicated service. She was a wonderful worker and a great friend to all. She put away books, helped in the children's room and enjoyed making examples for craft projects. Just give Irene an idea and she was on it or would find projects for a particular season. We wish her well and will miss her a lot.

The children's room has been a very busy place. We have a senior aid doing storytimes. She reads stories on topics likes cats, dogs and holidays with a craft. We also have "Messy Fingers" which is a science program for children three and up. The children had fun learning about dinosaurs, weather and bubbles. Storytimes had between 10 to 15 children and parents per week, while our "Messy Fingers" programs had 13 children plus parents sign up for the twice a month sessions. Both are very important to the younger children that need brain and hands-on stimulus to learn and grow.

The Mary B. Grogan Grant allowed us to have animal programs during school vacation weeks and March. We had the Tidal Pool exhibit from the New England Aquarium. The first hour saw over one hundred patron's young and old. Patrons could touch wildlife from our local Atlantic Ocean.

The Friends of the Millbury Public Library and the Millbury Cultural Council supported other programs for the children at the Library. This year's summer reading program was "Starship Adventure@your Library". The 159 children that signed up for the reading program did a fantastic job reading this summer. The children and patrons were treated to some wonderful Tuesday night programs of puppets, marionettes, music and a "Millbury has Talent" contest. The talent show was terrific with 12 contestants. Our judges had a hard time deciding but did a great job picking the winners. They were all winners for signing up. This town does have burgeoning talent.

The Library had ten volunteers last year who gave a total of 199.25 hours.


MILLBURY PUBLIC LIBRARY

The Council on Aging office, Senior Center and Drop in lounge are located at 1 River Street. We are in our 36^{th} year serving those 60 years and older.

The days and hours of operation are as follows: Monday through Friday 8:00 A.M. to 4:30 P.M., and Wednesday evening from 5:30 P.M. to 8:30 P.M. The Town's elder population is 2,672.

The following programs and services are being offered:

Intergenerational Programs (Helping Hands, M.O.V.E. Program), Socialization (cards, bingo & games) Information, Referral and Client Advocacy, Fuel Assistance Program, Legal Aid, AARP Free Tax Program, Periodical Informational/Educational Programs, Friendly Visitors Program, Day trips, Evening Activities, and I.D. Cards for Senior Citizens.

Nutrition Program: Through a grant from Elder Services of Worcester, we provide a hot lunch program at the Senior Center, Monday thru Friday at 12 noon. We delivered approximately 75 meals per day to the homebound. We provided a total of 13,067 Congregate meals and 15,728 home delivered meals. We also deliver holiday, snow days and evening meals to those who qualify. The sponsor for our MOW Drivers is the Millbury Savings Bank.

Our health services include: Podiatrist Clinic, Health Education Clinic, Hearing Aid Clinic; Osteoporosis Forums, Flu Shot Clinic, along with our weekly Stay Well Clinic, Exercise Classes, Yoga and Tai Chi.

REPORT OF COUNCIL ON AGING

Social Activities: There are many social activities that the Council on Aging provides: cards, bingo, crafts, walking club, sing-a-long, whist, craft store, movies, Wii bowling, bridge and monthly birthday parties. Summer concert were provided in the garden, and were co-sponsored by Mike and Lucille Maguire and Selectmen Bernie Plante, Fran King and Joe Coggans.

We also worked with the Blackstone Valley Tourism to encourage more events such as the "Chain of Lights". Our evening activities and weekend events are extremely successful and it gives the younger elder population some wonderful things to do and to keep them active.

We also provide day and overnight trips, and other miscellaneous activities that take place away from the Center.

Transportation: The Council on Aging runs five (5) vehicles. During the past year we provided *21,064* one way rides to the elderly and handicapped of Millbury. Our service also, provides rides for all ADA Clients (Americans with Disabilities). Our service area is one town out in each direction (Auburn, Grafton, Sutton and Worcester).

Grants Received: The Council on Aging was successful in obtaining several grants, this past year. They were \$16,705.00 from the Executive Office of Elder Affairs for program services for year 2008 at the Senior Center, \$25,000.00 from Millbury Savings Bank for a Fuel Assistance program, \$59,000.00 for a replacement vehicle from the Executive Office of Transportation and Construction and a New Freedom transportation grant in the amount of \$8,000 to provide services beyond ADA. Through the effort of our Friends of the Millbury Seniors, we were able to do the needed work and projects for the building. Repairs to the building in the amount of \$10,000 were received from fundraising efforts. They are also providing the funding for the plantings and upkeep of the Victorian Garden. We also utilized the Community Service Program from the Sheriff's Department to assist us with the Garden.

The COA is the Co-sponsor with the Board of Selectmen for the Elder Community Work Off Program. Currently we have 19 individuals working in 11 Town Departments. The warrant article was for \$20,000 allowing individuals to earn up to \$1,500 in credits on the property tax bill for a fiscal year.

To the staff: A sincere thanks for doing outstanding jobs and implementing the programs and services at the Senior Center. Special thanks to all the wonderful volunteers who do an outstanding job at a whole variety of different things, we are 110 strong.

The Council on Aging Board and I sincerely thank all Town Departments, Town Agencies, Churches, Merchants, Civic Groups and all the Townspeople for their continued support.

The Millbury Housing Authority hereby presents the annual report for the fiscal year ending September 30, 2009.

CHAPTER 200-1

The Chapter 200-1 Program consists of twenty-five Cape Cod houses located on Memorial Drive. These houses were originally built to house veterans after World War II. While veterans are given a preference under this program, the units also provide safe, decent, sanitary housing at affordable rents for families of low income regardless of veteran status. The units continue to be completely occupied.

The Housing Authority pays a designated fee "in lieu of taxes" on these properties and pays the ongoing rate designated for sewer usage.

CHAPTER 705

The Housing Authority currently houses eleven low-income families under this program. Five families are housed in the scattered site properties owned by the Housing Authority and six families live in a three duplex site located on Burbank Street.

The Housing Authority pays sewerage use and real estate taxes on all of its 705 properties.

MRVP PROGRAM

At the end of September 2009 there were three individuals or families participating in the Massachusetts Rental Voucher Program. Participants in this program are entitled to a fixed voucher payment, made directly to their landlord. The voucher payment is based on the household size, income, composition and the geographical location of the rental unit. These vouchers continue to be mobile allowing participants to use the vouchers anywhere in the state.

A **Transitional House** provides the necessary training for older adolescent girls to live independently. The Housing Authority has a contract with **YOU**, **INC**. to provide this training. The house can accommodate up to four girls. A subsidy under the **Massachusetts Rental Voucher Program (MRVP)** from the Department of Housing and Community Development provides the necessary funding.

CHAPTER 667-C

This program is made up of one hundred forty-six units of low income housing for the elderly and handicapped. Thirty-two of the units are located on Pearl Street, sixty units are located on Colonial Drive and another fifty- four units are located at 95 Elm Street. All units continue to be fully occupied.

CHAPTER 667-4

The Chapter 667-4, Congregate Housing Program, located on Colonial Drive, consists of five apartments with a total of twenty-three bedrooms. This program is designed to provide affordable housing together with supportive social and health services to help individuals maintain independent living and prevent early and unnecessary rest home or nursing home placement. It provides companionship yet offers privacy to its participants. At the end of September 2009 there were twenty-two residents living in the congregate facility.

A separate application must be filed for this program. Applicants must first meet the same financial and age requirements as our conventional housing programs to be eligible. For an application or program information, call the Millbury Housing Authority at 508-865-2660 or Lisa Bennes, Congregate Coordinator, at 508-865-2960.

The Millbury Housing Authority continues to act as sponsor for the Congregate Housing Program under a grant from the Executive Office of Elder Affairs.

Also located in the Congregate Building on Colonial Drive is the Adult Day Health Care Center. This program provides assistance on a daily basis, including meals, recreation, socialization, personal care and medication management for frail elders and disabled individuals. Janet Clawson, RN, directs the program, which is managed by the Auburn District Nursing Association, Inc.

MAINTENANCE

Our maintenance program involves maintenance of forty-four buildings that include one hundred eighty-nine apartments. Housing Authority maintenance personnel maintain the common areas, grounds and parking lots in our elderly developments. Families in single or duplex housing units maintain their own grounds.

Our maintenance staff consists of four full-time positions: Allen Marcell, Maintenance Coordinator, Thomas Austin, David Perkins and Michael Michalak, Sr., all Maintenance Mechanics 1. The dedication and excellent work performance of our maintenance department is reflected in the condition of the Housing Authority's properties.

ADMINISTRATION

Management and maintenance of all Housing Authority programs and properties is administered by the Executive Director and approved by the Board of Directors. Office hours are 8:30 A.M. to 4:00 P.M. Monday through Friday.

The administrative staff consists of one (1) part-time office clerk, Linda Vernon, and (3) full-time employees: Administrative Assistant/Program Coordinator, Judith Flynn; Congregate/Service Coordinator, Lisa Bennes; and Executive Director, Janet L. Cassidy.

REPORT OF THE ASA WATERS MANSION TASK FORCE

To the Honorable Board of Selectmen and the Citizens of Millbury:

We hereby submit our Annual Report for the fiscal year of July 1, 2008 through June 30, 2009.

During the course of this fiscal year we funded many interior improvements including electrical upgrades, enhancements to the security system, re-glazing of some third floor windows, modifications for ADA compliance including removing thresholds and replacing door knobs with latches on the first floor of the Mansion. A grant made it possible to install central AC in the Great Room, this will not only improve the comfort level of visitors but will also alleviate the degradation of original woodwork from window AC units. Period appropriate window treatments were added to the brides' dressing room. Verizon provided an underground connection so that a cable feed will now allow viewing of public programs held at the Mansion. Exterior improvements included painting on the third floor of the west side of the Mansion, replacing several exterior lighting fixtures, and removing the widows walk from the top of the Mansion to allow for greatly needed repairs and repainting.

We once again hosted numerous events in conjunction with the Friends of the Asa Waters Mansion, including a Historic Costume Social, our annual Christmas festival, along with many teas and group tours. We hosted "Abby Kelly Foster" in November, and organized a weekend-long living history event honoring the Bicentennial of Abraham Lincoln's birthday. Various themed teas where held during the year, with a special Children's Tea featuring a storybook read by Superintendent of Schools Susan Hitchcock. Through their efforts the Friends of the Asa Waters Mansion once again contributed to the beautification of the Mansion. The gardens around the Mansion are exceptional, and are enjoyed by countless visitors throughout the seasons. The flowers create outstanding backgrounds for those capturing pictures, truly evidenced in the spring when the Mansion and its grounds are set aside for Millbury High School prom pictures. We were pleased that once again a local second-grade class planted "Sara's Garden" in honor of a member of the original Waters family. The Friends of the Asa Waters Mansion also continued their long time commitment to their community by generously volunteering their time to staff bereavement receptions this year.

Our Director, Catherine Elliott, remains active in aggressively promoting the Mansion in new markets. She continues to serve on the Board of Directors for the Blackstone Valley Chamber of Commerce, and is a member of both the Blackstone Valley Tourism Steering Committee and the Blackstone Valley Tourism Association. The Mansion was showcased in a detailed article in Worcester Living Magazine, selected as a feature site in the "Massachusetts Beautiful" Tourism Guide, and was one of Massachusetts' historical sites to be considered for inclusion on a new coin.

Through all the growth and increased activity we continue to adhere to our unwavering goal of allowing Millbury Community Service Organizations to utilize the Mansion free of charge. We are pleased that at least one half of the Mansion's utilization continues to be gratis for town organizations. We are proud to have the Millbury Women's Club and the Millbury Historical Society utilize the Mansion as their headquarters.

REPORT OF THE ASA WATERS MANSION TASK FORCE

The year ended on a dire note as a severe hail storm hit the town of Millbury with brute force resulting in major damage to the Mansion both inside and out. Many broken windows, broken original shutters, damage to clapboards, and roofing damage resulted in creating many challenges for us. On a positive note, we are extremely grateful to the community for their continued financial donations, along with gifts of 19th century furnishings and collections to showcase throughout the Mansion.

The Asa Waters Task Force and the Friends of the Asa Waters Mansion collectively work together to keep the Mansion a treasure for the Town of Millbury. We thank the citizens and business community for their continued support of our endeavor in "watching an old building with care."

REPORT OF THE VETERANS AGENT



To the Honorable Board of Selectmen and the Citizens of Millbury:

I respectfully submit the annual report of the Millbury Veterans Service Department for fiscal year ending June 30, 2009.

This department averaged 16 clients being assisted financially and with medical expenses along with assisting them filing for other State and Federal benefits they may be entitled to. Assistance has been provided in enrolling numerous Veterans into the Veterans Affairs health care program allowing them to obtain their health care and prescriptions through the VA.

DIRECTOR OF PUBLIC WORKS

The Department of Public Works consists of Highway, Sewer, Parks, Transfer Station, Cemetery, and the Tree Division. The members of the Department of Public Works respectfully submit our Annual Town Report to the citizens of Millbury for the fiscal year ending June 30, 2009.

Highway Division

The Division is responsible for all public ways and infrastructure within the Town. Seasonal work consists of plowing snow, cleaning catch basins, repairing drainage culverts, roadside mowing, street asphalt repair, street sweeping, grading of dirt roads and line painting. All this work is carried out under the leadership of Working Foreman Joe Kosiba and performed by Bob Murray, Michael Murray, Lee Beaumier, Bill Berthiume and Keith Caruso. Richard Hamilton, our Town Mechanic, is responsible for the repair and maintenance of all DPW equipment, as well as all police cruisers and fire apparatus in town. Diane Lewos is the very capable and long serving Head Clerk of the Highway Division.

Snow and Ice

The Department responded to 45 snow events for the winter season. Twelve were plowable storms, 30 required salting and sanding, and 15 storms required spot sanding only. The Highway Department also removed snow from the center of Town.

Sewer Division

During the fiscal year, the Sewer Department completed sewer expansion into the Lake Singletary & Laurel Heights areas of town. The project included five miles of new sewer lines that provided sewer service to 229 homes. Construction of new sewers was also continued in the

Park Hill Avenue/ Martin Street and the East Millbury parts of town. This project will provide sewer service to 336 additional homes.

The Millbury Sewer Department is led by our long serving and dedicated Sewer Superintendent Brad Lange. He is assisted by Lead Foreman James Piscitelli and sewer workers Frank Stachura and Eric LeClaire. Fran Pearson is our very capable Head Clerk. This team is responsible for the maintenance and operation of over 50 miles of sewer lines and 12 pump stations which serve 3.172 customers.

Transfer Station

This Division, which is visited many times by the residents of Millbury, is ably staffed by Lead Foreman Bob Roy and Norma Madore. All trash is collected and hauled to the Wheelabrator facility by the Transfer Station staff. This has resulted in a cost savings to the Town of approximately \$50,000.00 per year. The metal recyclable program continues to be a profit making venture. The Department has been reimbursed several thousand dollars since July 2007. Recycling is encouraged and residents should be commended for their efforts to recycle.

Parks

The Parks Division, led by Lead Foreman Carl Ward, and assisted by Scott Elie, maintains the Washington Street Park, the Greenwood Street Park, the Jaques Park and the East Millbury Park, as well as the Tot Lot on Millbury Avenue. They also maintain the Senior Center, Town Common, Town Library and the Asa Waters grounds. The result of this Division's dedication and effort is several beautiful and useful areas for the residents to enjoy recreation, athletics and assembly.

Tree Division

The Tree Division is responsible for all public shade trees within the Town. The Division, which is led by Ron Depres, works very hard to maintain the tree canopy throughout the town which is beneficial to all residents. Identified dead and diseased trees are removed and stump grinding is completed. Ron also coordinated the extensive effort to remove all the danger trees that were damaged by the ice storm.

Cemetery Division

The Central Street Cemetery is a true Town asset. The Cemetery Division also maintains the Dwinell Cemetery and the Providence Street Cemetery. The Division, led by Ray Ledoux, takes pride in maintaining these sacred properties with perpetual care. Cemetery duties include mowing, general clean-up and removal of seasonal flowers. There were 51 burials at the Central Cemetery in fiscal year 2009. Forty seven graves were sold for a total of \$ 11,750.00.

As a result of limited space within the cemetery, lots are sold on an as needed basis. We continue to work within the cemetery to provide for additional grave sites. A cemetery expansion project was started in the fall of 2008 and will be completed by the end of 2009.

The Central Cemetery is a beautiful and tranquil resting place for our many loved ones thanks to Richie's years of dedication and tender care of the cemetery grounds.

REPORT OF THE SEWER COMMISSIONERS

To the Citizens of the Town of Millbury, we respectfully submit our Annual Town Report for the fiscal year ending June 30, 2009.

Accomplishments of the Commissioners during this fiscal year include:

- 1. The sewer system consists of 1 main pumping station, 11 supporting pump stations, two inverted siphons, and 50 miles of pipe. It also has 5 miles of force main piping to the Upper Blackstone Wastewater Treatment Plant and 12 air release manholes. This system services approximately 3,600 properties.
- 2. At this time, the Town of Millbury is undergoing a \$21 Million dollar sewer expansion project which will provide sewer service to an additional 700 homes. It will add an additional 3 pump stations and 12 miles of pipe.
- 3. In September, 2007 the first phase of the above listed expansion project was completed. Within this phase, 90 properties in the Greenwood Street area including Roger Street, Border Avenue, Chunis Avenue, Elmwood Avenue and Hawthorne Street received sewer service at a total cost of \$ 2,882,462. At this time, 53% of the serviced homes have connected.

The second phase of the project includes the Lake Singletary & Laurel Heights areas. This phase was completed in September, 2008. The total cost of this project was \$6,473,067.

The third and final phase of the project included Park Hill Avenue/ Martin Street and the East Millbury part of town. This project will be completed in the spring of 2010, with most streets obtaining sewer service in late 2009. The total cost of this project is now \$8,256,815.

- 4. Since January, 2005, Millbury's wastewater is pumped to the Upper Blackstone Water Pollution Abatement District (UBWPAD). Millbury's average daily flow is about one million gallons per day. The Millbury Sewer Department also takes wastewater from the Town of Sutton and pumps it to the (UBWPAD). The Town of Sutton reimburses Millbury for this service.
- 5. Next year the Sewer Department will embark upon a town wide infiltration and inflow study to locate and eliminate sources of groundwater leakage into our sewer pipes.

Buildings such as schools, nursing homes, residential complexes, and various business facilities are inspected by the fire department throughout the year.

REVENUE

Money collected from permits, fees, reimbursements, donations, and inspections totaled \$25,697.77 for the period of July 1, 2008 to June 30, 2009. This includes \$500.00 collected in fees for services rendered on the Massachusetts Turnpike and \$500 in false fire alarm fees. There were 404 seasonal permits sold at \$10 each and 13 Agricultural Permits issued at no charge during the 2009 burning season. All fees are turned in weekly to the Treasurer's Office. The Fire Department received \$2,300 in donations. I would like to extend a heartfelt thank-you to the Mong family for a generous donation to the Fire Department in memory of their son/brother David.

DEPARTMENT TRAINING

There were 67 training sessions conducted this year. Training included but was not limited to the following: Special RIT training, Driver Training, Search & Rescue, Pump Operations, Foam Training, Vehicle Extrication, Containment and Fire Suppression, First Responder & CPR Certification, Haz-Mat Training, and both Open Water and Ice Rescue Training.

The Fire Department had one recruit who attended the District 7 Recruit Training Program. Adam Roy graduated from this program in June 2009. He will be appointed as a regular member of the fire department effective July 1, 2009. Adam successfully completed a grueling 16-week course that consisted of every Tuesday and Thursday evenings for three hours and every Saturday for approximately four to six hours—sometimes as much as an eight-hour day. Adam,

as well as many previous recruits, completed this task with little or no compensation and with a smile and a great sense of professionalism. So with that being said, the Board of Fire Engineers, the membership of the Department, and of course Adam's parents, retired member Bob Roy and his wife Barbara, welcome Adam to our Fire Department.

FIRE PREVENTION

The Fire Prevention Program is headed up by Asst. Chief Marc T. Auclair. We held our Field Day on Saturday, September 27, 2008 on the grounds of the R.E. Shaw School. The day's activities included a firemen's muster, country singer Angela Marie, a demonstration of the use of the Jaws of Life at an accident scene by the Rescue Team, and a demonstration on chimney fires. The Worcester County Sheriff's Command Unit was on site for people to walk through. Station 3 created a water target game, and kids got a chance to spray water from a real fire hose to try to hit the target. Mass. District 7 supplied the Smoke House Training trailer that many people toured. There also was an information booth on smoke detectors and their proper placement in your home. Many local businesses participated as well. The Ladies Auxiliary helped to organize the event and provided a food table. This day was a huge success and I thank all who participated for a job well done. Special thanks to School Superintendent Susan Hitchcock and the Shaw School custodial staff for their support and help.

While the school district continues to implement strategies to increase student academic achievement in English/Language Arts and Mathematics; provide a safe, secure and engaging learning environment for all students; and further improve the communication with families and the community, the 2008 – 2009 year included a number of new and exciting initiatives and opportunities for students in preschool through grade 12.

The Elmwood Street School welcomed a new Principal, Ms. Sue Frederick. Ms Frederick's education and training as a School Psychologist in Pittsfield and as a Principal in Holyoke complimented the needs of the staff in the area of English Language Arts instruction and positive development and supervision of an early childhood population. The collaborative leadership style and decision-making that Ms. Frederick brought to the educational process at the Elmwood Street School has been welcomed by all.

After a comprehensive two-year long process, the Elmwood Street School preschool and kindergarten received full accreditation from the *National Association for the Education of Young Children (NAEYC)*. The purpose of the voluntary accreditation process is to raise the quality of early childhood programs by meeting national standards, through documentation and procedural review, the completion of a self-study and culminated in an onsite visitation by a team of early childhood professionals. The preschool and kindergarten teachers, led by Ms. Frederick, are to be complimented on the refinement and in some aspects, the development of quality components added to programs that continue to grow and meet the needs of typical and diverse learners, ages three through five.

Under the leadership of former Principal, Carol Chiras, students in grade 2 were once again introduced to the History of Millbury in May 2009. Students studied about the town in which they live and participated in field trips to the Asa Waters Mansion, Grass Hill Schoolhouse, the Old Common and a cemetery. The Millbury Parents Club, through its fundraising efforts and generosity, provided the funds for buses for this field trip and all other Elmwood trips, totaling \$10,000 for the year. This commitment to the education of Millbury students has been greatly appreciated by parents, teachers, staff and the administration. Without this support, field trips would be eliminated because of the cost of busing.

The Elmwood Street School also hosted the first *Cultural Fair* for the school. Students were dressed in the attire from their country, displayed artifacts and even offered ethnic foods for tasting. Grade one delighted the participants at the Senior Center with the play *How Does Your Garden Grow?* Both of these events were the creative ideas of students and staff and were funded by a Millbury Community Service Learning grant.

An important tradition, the annual Halloween Parade, attracted not only many parents and siblings, but grandparents, aunts and uncles. Holiday concerts afforded the students an opportunity to demonstrate their choral and other musical skills. Those events also served to inform the community that the arts share equal importance in engaging students

in school, elevating their creative talents and providing students with the skills outlined in the Massachusetts Curriculum Frameworks.

The Raymond E. Shaw Elementary School began the design process to implement a *School-Wide Positive Behavioral Interventions and Supports* (PBIS) program. This national model is intended to improve student academic and behavioral outcomes by implementing the following six important principles:

- 1. developing a continuum of scientifically-based behavior and academic interventions and supports
- 2. using data to make decisions and solve problems
- 3. arranging the school environment to prevent the development and occurrence of problem behavior
- 4. teaching and encouraging pro-social skills and behaviors
- 5. Implementing evidence-based behavioral practices with fidelity and accountability
- 6. screening universally and monitoring student performance and progress continuously

Although the program will not be implemented until the 2009 – 2010 school year, almost one full year of planning has occurred, with the collaboration of administrators and staff, in order to roll out the program with success and enthusiasm. The result will be a more respectful, collaborative and positive environment in which all students will continue to achieve. This important initiative has been funded by a grant, and the Millbury Schools have been recognized as one of the lead supporters of this program and its philosophy.

The grade five and six Jazz Ensemble won a Gold medal at the Central District Jazz Festival and Elizabeth Jaeger, a grade six student, placed third in the *Young Artist Group* competition in Massachusetts, after being selected by the Millbury Women's Club to move on to the state level. In addition, Michael Morley, grade 6, became eligible because of his score to move on to the annual Massachusetts Geography Bee. Congratulations to our students for their accomplishments!

The annual traditional and right-of-passage field trip for sixth graders continued as they attended Camp Bournedale in April 2009. This science education field trip involved exploring the habitats of various land creatures.

The Shaw School received a Community Service-Learning grant that allowed Mr. James Rollins and Ms. Lorna Pezanelli to accompany students to the Radius Health Care Center to perform for the elderly and make Valentine cards for them.

The Millbury Memorial Junior/Senior High School hosted an Immigration Celebration as a culminating project of the Community Service-Learning Board. Community volunteers presented displays regarding their native culture. The evening was open to the public, with a special invitation extended to fourth graders and their parents who were given passports to have stamped at each country they visited. High school history students had

visited the grade four classes to talk about immigration, as an introduction to the evening of the Immigration Celebration.

A robotics component was incorporated into the engineering program. The program was partially funded through a grant from the *Mary B. Grogan Fund for Youth*.

Each of the athletic teams qualified for District level playoffs, with some teams competing at the State level. School records were broken by Cailin Bullet, Kirsten Orrell, and Andrew Piscitelli. In addition, Kirsten placed 2nd in New England with her shot put throw of 42-8; while Andrew Piscitelli placed 6th in New England, throwing the discus 155-7. State recognition was earned in music by Adam Mejeour; while Thomas Murray earned All State in track, adding to his State recognition in music from last year.

The Freshman Academy was initiated to provide a smoother transition and increased individual support to incoming high school students.

Julie Frankian was selected by the MIAA as one of fifteen students from Massachusetts to serve as a delegate at the National Student Leadership Conference in Indianapolis. Julie and Mrs. Stepien attended the conference in July.

Thanks to the generosity of Wheelabrator, nine Junior High students and five chaperones attended the Wheelabrator Symposium in Florida. The students presented the work they had done to install a wind turbine on the roof of the school that will be used to charge batteries and to provide power to multiple electrical devices.

Diplomas were awarded to 137 seniors on June 5, at Mechanics Hall. Eighty-eight percent of the graduating class will pursue further education, eight percent will seek full-time employment and four percent will enter the military. \$76,000 was granted in scholarships to the members of the Class of 2009 through the generosity of Millbury citizens and *Dollars for Scholars*.

A highlight of that evening was the keynote speaker, a 1973 graduate of Millbury Memorial Junior/Senior High School. Mr. James Keyes is currently CEO of Blockbuster and flew in from Dallas to share his time, not only with the graduates, but also to speak to the underclassmen during a morning assembly. We are grateful that members of our alumni are so generous with their time and wisdom.

Students took part in Millbury's Celebration of Lincoln's 200th Birthday, held at the Asa Waters Mansion in May 2009. Students from the Digital Design class created post cards and a framed poster of President Lincoln from one hundred tiny images of locations in Millbury. The images were repeated to create a 2,000 image poster.

The eroding of state and local support for the school budget became the district's number one concern. It was clearly recognized that the development of the 2010 school budget would become a protracted process throughout the winter and spring of 2009, as the state revenue figures continued to be less than the projections. The loss of \$ 731,592 from the

fourth quarter Chapter 70 funds (aid received annually from the state to support school budgets) for the remainder of the 2009 fiscal year originally created tremendous concern. Chapter 70 funds represented approximately \$ 7 million or 38.51 % of Millbury's \$18,062,318 FY '09 school budget. In order to maintain the commitment that Governor Patrick made to communities regarding school aid, the Chapter 70 gap (approximately 10 % of all communities' annual Chapter 70 funding) was backfilled with the Federal Stimulus Money. While this support offered a temporary measure of relief, it raised serious concerns about the level of Federal Stimulus money available to support the state and its schools during the FY 2011 budget.

Throughout the 2008 – 2009 school year, the Millbury Public Schools secured \$957,284 in Federal and State discretionary and entitlement grants to support services to special needs, Title I, English Language Learners and students who would benefit from additional academic support.

As the 2010 budget development process unfolded, the \$ 1.6 million deficit for the Town of Millbury involved numerous meetings and conversations between the Board of Selectmen and the School Committee. In the end, the Board of Selectmen determined that the school department would absorb 60 % of the deficit, a loss of \$971,479, and the Town's share would be 40 %. Ultimately, moving into the 2009 – 2010 school year, the Millbury Public Schools would need to reduce its budget by the following:

Elmwood Street School

½ Assistant Principal .5 FTE 1.0 FTE Teacher 1.0 FTE Clerical

Raymond E. Shaw Elementary School

3.2 FTE Teachers

Millbury Memorial Jr./Sr. High School

1.0 FTE Teachers

District-Wide

1.0 FTE Custodian

Due to the health insurance savings that would be realized by the Town and the School Department moving to a single health insurance provider, 3 teachers', 1 clerical and .5 custodial positions were restored for the 2010 school year.

The school community is eternally grateful to the residents for approving two Warrant Articles at the May 2008 Annual Town Meeting. For all who have been to the Raymond E. Shaw School during the past year, you must have noticed the newly paved parking lot without its numerous ruts, hills and valleys. Walking is much less of a challenge, now that the voters approved \$185,000 to perform the repairs and repaving. In addition, the

voters also recognized the need and responded to the school district's request for new outside basketball courts and ADA compliant playgrounds at both Elmwood and Shaw. Students and parents have commented about the joy their children are experiencing because of the generosity of this community. The school department thanks you greatly.

Numerous exceptional academic, musical, artistic and athletic events afforded the Millbury students an opportunity to perfect and display their skills. Despite the ongoing fiscal challenges, the Millbury School Committee, the school district's Leadership Team, its teachers and staff, the families, community members, businesses and the students themselves, continued to collaborate in a desire to move the system forward, showcase its successes and ensure that the Millbury Public Schools provided a rich teaching and learning environment in which all students can and will learn.

Fiscal Year 2009 Annual Report

STUDENTS PREPARE FOR SUCCESS IN GLOBAL MARKETPLACE: As high school students face the challenges of a complex global workforce environment, they must learn and understand complex academic concepts and sophisticated life skills. A recognized leader in educational innovation, the Blackstone Valley Vocational Regional School District, generously supported by its citizenry, prepares students for success in career and college or other advanced training.

Creating more motivated and high achieving students, career technical education has garnered tremendous attention recently – especially as practiced at Valley Tech – because the vocational education system links academic learning with practical, real world applications.

Valley Tech students, staff and administrators accomplished many noteworthy deeds during Fiscal Year 2009 (July 1, 2008 – June 30, 2009). Your vocational technical system, serving 13 contiguous towns, by embracing change rather than clinging to the past, constantly seeks curricular and facilities improvement to provide expanded learning opportunities.

Mindful of the uncertain economic climate, Valley Tech held its FY09 total member town assessment increase to 3.93 percent. Throughout the 2008-09 school year, officials reduced expenditures, resulting in a FY10 budget, which was unanimously approved by all district member towns, reflecting an overall increase of just 1.99 percent.

The total student enrollment at Valley Tech continues its expansion, to more than 1,100 students in school year 2009-10 and in September 2009, the system launched a postsecondary Licensed Practical Nurse program. In addition to updating and reconfiguring learning laboratories to reflect industry and employment trends, Valley Tech looks toward the development, for additional athletic space, of nearly 30 acres of donated local land.

VALLEY TECH STUDENTS IN THE SPOTLIGHT: On the national stage, Valley Tech won four gold medals – one individual plus a three-person team – competing in the prestigious SkillsUSA National Leadership and Skills Conference. Katelyn Christiansen

of Uxbridge won a gold medal in Dental Assisting, while the Community Service Team of Lindsay Melanson (Milford), Nicole Onanian (Uxbridge) and Jacob Elliott (Uxbridge) captured the top prize for their Community Service Team project and presentation. The Valley Tech Entrepreneurship Team of Brooke Bibeault (Uxbridge), Robert Caouette (Blackstone), Amanda Small (Uxbridge) and Courtney Soter (Sutton) secured bronze medals. At the state championships, additional students won gold medals and earned national qualifying berths: Scott LeBlanc (Grafton) in Automotive Refinishing Technology; Jason Lewis (Mendon), Diesel Equipment Technology; Anna O'Donnell (Douglas), Food and Beverage Service; Rebecca Tober (Millville), Office Computer Applications; and Maria Cassidy (Uxbridge), Related Technical Math.

Other Valley Tech stars, the Valley Tech Team 61 Shifters, were nearly perfect in capturing first place at the U.S. FIRST Robotics Boston Regional Competition. The team went on to compete success in the Connecticut Regional, and finished in the top-20 at the national championships in Atlanta.

The Valley Tech Class of 2010 registered impressive results on the state-mandated Massachusetts Comprehensive Assessment System (MCAS) tests. Results from the spring 2008 first administration of the test indicated that 99.6 percent of the class passed the English language arts portion, 96.7 passed the math and 96.2 passed the science/technology engineering part of the assessment on their first attempt. As for attaining advanced or proficient skill levels, 78 percent were in that range in math and 79 percent in English. By Federal statute all students must reach proficiency by 2014. The Class of 2009 was the sixth straight from Valley Tech to have 100 percent of its membership achieve competency determination on the MCAS.

Valley Tech also tied for seventh among Massachusetts district high schools for the highest graduation rate (97.2%). Valley Tech's dropout rate of 0.9 percent tied for 13th best in the state.

NUMBERS PROVE SUCCESS: In an atmosphere of 21st Century rigor, the success of our student body is measured by 100% competency determination, high career placement rates and high college matriculation rates for our graduates. This in turn justifies our stakeholders' confidence that Valley Tech is succeeding in its mission to prepare the students of Blackstone Valley with a world class education.

The District's FY09 total operating budget was \$18,094,750. Chapter 70 Aid contributed \$6,462,753 and Minimum Contributions from the 13 member towns totaled \$7,306,124. In the operating budget outside state-mandated net school spending areas, the District budgeted \$273,452 for transportation costs, \$154,600 for acquisition of fixed assets and \$691,760 for retiree medical coverage. This was offset by \$783,849 in regional student transportation funds received from the Commonwealth. In addition to their state-required Minimum Contributions, the member towns unanimously supported the school's operating budget with shared assessments for operations, student transportation, asset acquisition, and retiree medical costs. This investment provided the fiscal support to respond to the diverse learning needs of a student population that grew by five percent over FY08 and again in FY09 and FY10.

In response to weakening economic forecasts and lower than expected tax collections, the Commonwealth was forced to reduce the District's Chapter 70 allocation by \$759,526; however, those funds were completely restored with funding from ARRA (American Recovery & Reinvestment Act), also known as stimulus funds. Given the ongoing fiscal constraints and the likelihood of a continued economic slump, the District continues to search out greater efficiencies in its staffing patterns, supply purchases, technology upgrades, and contractual service requirements. Bolstered by prudent budget management practices, the District utilized an unreserved fund balance of \$250,000 to offset the towns' actual assessments. Additionally, the District secured funds to purchase vocational equipment and other fixed assets through private donations of \$8,300.
