We thank Joe Coggans for his many years of service to the townspeople of Millbury and wish Selectman Ashmankas the best. The budget season was again very tumultuous. With a lot of work and many meetings, the budget was pulled together. The Annual Town Meeting was held on Tuesday, May 4, 2010.

During the year the Board of Selectmen had numerous opportunities to recognize citizens of Millbury such as Deborah S. The Building Inspector, Robert J. Blackman, is appointed annually by the Millbury Town Manager (Millbury Town Charter) to administer and enforce the Massachusetts State Building Code, 780 CMR, under the provisions of Massachusetts General Laws, Chapter 30A.

The Building Inspector and his assistants administer and enforce Appendix D, Zoning, of the Millbury Town By-Laws (Appendix D, Articles 1 through 5, inclusive, of the Millbury Town By-Laws).

The Wiring Inspector, Vincent J. Cormier, is appointed annually, by the Millbury Town Manager(Millbury Town Charter) to administer and enforce the Massachusetts Electrical Code, 527 CMR 12.00 under the provisions of the Massachusetts General Laws, Chapter 143, Section 31, annotated.

The Plumbing/Gas Inspector, Gregory Gauthier assisted by Brian Gasco, is appointed by the Millbury Town Manager, (Millbury Town Charter) to administer and enforce the Massachusetts State Plumbing Code 248 CMR 2.00 and the Massachusetts Fuel Gas Code, 248 CMR 3.00 through 8.00 under the provisions of Massachusetts General Laws, Chapter 142, Section 13, annotated.

REPORT OF THE DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC WORKS

The Department of Public Works consists of Highway, Sewer, Parks, Transfer Station, Cemetery, and the Tree Division. The members of the Department of Public Works respectfully submit our Annual Town Report to the citizens of Millbury for the fiscal year ending June 30, 2010.

Highway Division

The Division is responsible for all public ways and infrastructure within the Town. Seasonal work consists of plowing snow, sweeping streets, cleaning catch basins, repairing drainage culverts, roadside mowing, street asphalt repair, grading of dirt roads, center line painting and performing drainage improvements. All this work is carried out under the leadership of Working Foreman Joe Kosiba and performed by Michael Murray, Bill Berthiume, Keith Caruso and Scott Elie. Richard Hamilton, our Town Mechanic, is responsible for the repair and maintenance of all DPW equipment, as well as all police cruisers and fire apparatus in town. Diane Lewos is the very capable and long serving Head Clerk of the Highway Division.

Snow and Ice

The Department responded to a 13 snow events for the winter season. Five were plowable storms and 8 required salting and sanding only. The Highway Department also removed snow from the center of Town.

REPORT OF THE DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC WORKS

Sewer Division

During the fiscal year, the Sewer Department invited residents to tie into new sewer expansion areas in East Millbury. This project provided sewer service to 232 additional homes. The Sewer Division also began a study to reduce the infiltration and inflow of groundwater and storm water runoff into the sewer lines.

The Millbury Sewer Department is led by our long serving and dedicated Sewer Superintendent Brad Lange. He is assisted by Lead Foreman James Piscitelli and sewer workers Frank Stachura and Eric LeClaire. Pat Davidson was our very capable Head Clerk during this period. This team is responsible for the maintenance and operation of over 50 miles of sewer lines and 15 pump stations which serve 3,352 customers. The average daily flow is approximately 1,000,000 gallons per day.

Transfer Station

This Division, which is visited many times by the residents of Millbury, is ably staffed by Lead Foreman Bob Roy and Norma Madore. All trash is collected and hauled to the Wheelabrator facility by the Transfer Station staff. This has resulted in a cost savings to the Town of approximately \$50,000.00 per year. The metal recyclable program continues to be a profit making venture for the town. The Department has been reimbursed several thousand dollars since July 2007. Recycling is encouraged and residents should be commended for their efforts to recycle.

<u>Parks</u>

The Parks Division, led by Lead Foreman Carl Ward, maintains the Washington Street Park, the Greenwood Street Park, the Jacques Park and the East Millbury Park, as well as the Tot Lot on Millbury Avenue. This consists of five ball fields and soccer fields. They also maintain the Senior Center, Town Common, Town Library and the Asa Waters grounds. The result of this Division's dedication and effort is several beautiful and useful areas for the residents to enjoy recreation, athletics and assembly.

Tree Division

The Tree Division is responsible for all public shade trees within the Town. The Division, which is led by Ron Depres, works very hard to maintain the tree canopy throughout the town which is beneficial to all residents. Identified dead and diseased trees are removed and stump grinding is completed.

Cemetery Division

The Cemetery Commission is responsible for the three town cemeteries - the Central Cemetery, which is located at the end of Waters Street, the historic Providence Street Cemetery on Providence Street and the historic Dwinell Family Cemetery on Dwinell Road. The Cemetery Division of the Department of Public Works maintains the three town cemeteries. The Division, led by Ray Ledoux, takes pride in maintaining these sacred properties with perpetual care. Cemetery duties include grass mowing, general clean-up, repair and maintenance and removal of

seasonal flowers. There were 65 burials at the Central Cemetery in fiscal year 2010. Forty four new lots were sold for a total revenue of \$ 22,000.00.

As a result of limited space within the cemetery, lots are sold on an as needed basis. The Cemetery Commission is always searching for additional grave sites and funding sources to expand and beautify our Millbury cemeteries. A cemetery expansion project was completed in the spring of 2010.

Assignment of Fields

The Parks Commission is responsible for the assignment of town fields for various sports leagues. A field assignment meeting for spring/summer use is held in late winter and is followed by the regularly scheduled meeting in March at which time the assignments are made. The field assignment meeting for the fall is normally held during a regularly scheduled summer meeting of the Parks Commission. This year the parks were home to baseball, softball, basketball and soccer teams.

July 4th Road Race

Every year on the 4th of July, the Parks Commission sponsors a road race for all age groups. The race begins at the High School and ends at Windle Field. The first 100 participants are given a free T-shirt and trophies are awarded for 1st place male and 1st place female in six age categories. This year the race had over 90 registered participants.

Millbury Town Common

Santa on the Common is an annual event enjoyed by the young and the young at heart. Polaroid photographs are taken and given to the visitors for free. **Thank you** to the Millbury Lions Club for donating funds for the purchase of the film each year and to David Zanauskas of Spencer who is a jolly addition to the SOTC team! The Millbury Town Common is also the home of the long-standing traditional manger scene.

The grand European copper beech tree which stood on the Common for more than 100 years stood about 80 feet tall and had a diameter of about 6 feet. Due to disease, it was removed in the spring of 2009. Warren Gardner of Matt's Tree Service and Selectmen Fran King and Brian Stowell led a fundraising drive to purchase and plant a new tree. Proceeds from Selectman King's chili cook-off along with donations from town residents and businesses allowed the men to purchase a larger tree than was first planned.

On April 15, 2010 the new 20 foot tall, 6 inch diameter European copper beech was planted by representatives of Cedar Lawn Tree Service of Ashland, Matt's Tree Service of Millbury and the town's Department of Public Works. The official tree dedication ceremony was held at 10 a.m. on Arbor Day, April 30th, and included local fourth grade students as well as members of the Board of Selectmen, the Town Manager and other citizens. The students all received a commemorative seedling.

APPROVAL NOT REQUIRED PLANS

There were four (4) plans filed under Chapter 41, Section 81P of the General Laws, Approval Not Required, during Fiscal Year 2010. These plans represent perimeter surveys, division of land with adequate frontage on public streets as required by the Millbury Zoning Bylaws, easement descriptions, or lot-line modifications.

SPECIAL PERMITS

There are numerous situations and proposals that require a Special Permit, a process in which the Planning Board is charged with determining whether a particular development should be allowed to occur. The town's zoning bylaw lists the criteria for making these decisions, based on the Board's analysis of extensive technical and public input. Below is a summary of the various special permits applied for during the fiscal year, and the Board's decisions:

Multifamily Special Permits: Two (2) applications were filed under this section of the Zoning Bylaw. One application was approved, with conditions, for one additional dwelling unit on Leslie Lane. One application, approved with conditions, was for a five unit condominium project on North Main Street that was previously approved by the Planning Board, however the permit had expired.

Site Plan Review/Stormwater Management Permit: One (1) application was approved, with conditions, for a landscaping business and additional commercial uses on Grafton Street.

Wireless Communications Facility Special Permits: Two (2) applications for co-location on existing cell towers, one at 93 Worcester Providence Pike and one at 428 Greenwood Street, were filed under this section of the Zoning Bylaw, both were approved, with conditions.

SUBDIVISIONS

There were five (5) requests for modification of an existing definitive subdivision filed with the Planning Board, to extend the time for completion. All five were approved by the Board: Cronin Brook Heights, off of Braney Road; Clearview Estates, off of Park Hill Avenue; Watson Estates, off of McCracken Road; Patriot Place Estates, off of Howe Avenue; and Overlook Estates, off of Overlook Avenue.

CURRENT ISSUES

At the Annual Town Meeting in May of 2010, the Town adopted numerous amendments to the Zoning Bylaws, including certain housekeeping items, pre-application review requirement as part of the site plan review process, regulation of real estate signs within multi-family developments, a by-right site plan approval process, revisions to the Wind Energy Systems bylaw, and adoption of a new Aquifer and Watershed Protection Overlay District bylaw to replace current bylaw and establish measures to protect Millbury's drinking water supply.

Subdivision Rules & Regulations: The Board adopted the following revisions to the current Subdivision Rules & Regulations Governing the Subdivision of Land: Approval with Bonds or Surety, or with Mortgage Agreement shall include a 25% minimum contingency factor; Applicant may request a partial release of Performance Guarantee; the Planning Board, on its own motion, shall have the authority to modify, amend or rescind its approval of a definitive subdivision; and the Board shall require that curb cut ramps contain detectable warnings.

The Town's application for \$85,000 to study the feasibility of installing an industrial-scale wind turbine at Butler Farm was successful. The Town engaged Weston & Sampson for that purpose.

In February 2010, the Conservation Commission's purchase of two parcels of land totaling 25 acres that abut the Brierly Conservation Area and historic Old Common Road was completed. This represented the culmination of a year-long effort by the Town Planner, Conservation Commission, Metacomet Land Trust, Millbury Improvement Initiative, and Friends of Millbury Open Spaces to raise the \$240,000 necessary to purchase the land. The project partners obtained grants from the MA Division of Conservation Services LAND Grant Program, an anonymous foundation, GWCF Water & Land Stewardship Fund, Fields Pond Foundation, and the Heritage Partnership Program. To supplement the grant monies, the project partners obtained nearly \$30,000 in donations from local businesses and residents. The Millbury Department of Public Works and a local contractor also donated materials and labor to construct a gravel parking area at the new trailhead off of Old Common Road. An interpretive sign containing history of the

area and the project was also installed at the trailhead. To celebrate the success and thank major donors, a "Happy Trails Celebration" took place at the VFW in May 2010.

Development of an updated computer mapping system of town-wide data continued to be a primary focus. Zoning-based assessor's maps are now available in the Assessors' Office and Department of Planning and Development.

The Planning Board continues to police issues at various residential, commercial and industrial developments that are under construction.

* * * * * * * * *

The Millbury Planning Board holds its regular meetings on the second and fourth Mondays of each month. These meetings are now televised on local access channel 13. Concerned citizens are invited to attend and anyone wishing to meet with the Board should call the Planning Department at the Municipal Office Building to make arrangements. The Planning Board encourages public participation in every element of the planning process. The Town Planner is available during regular business hours to meet with the public to address any planning issue.

The Millbury Conservation Commission is responsible for administering the Massachusetts Wetlands Protection Act, M.G.L. Chapter 131, Section 40, as it relates to issues in the Town of Millbury. All public hearings and public meetings concerning the filing of a Notice of Intent (N.O.I.), an Abbreviated Notice of Resource Area Delineation (ANORAD) or a Request for Determination of Applicability (R.D.A.) continue to be advertised, generally, in the Millbury-Sutton Chronicle.

In March 2010, the Conservation Commission completed the acquisition of a 15-acre, archeologically-sensitive, undeveloped parcel that, together with a non-contiguous 10-acre forested parcel, serve as the newest additions to the Brierly Pond Conservation Area. The conservation area now consists of nearly 100 contiguous acres of protected open space within walking distance of two of Millbury's oldest village neighborhoods, Old Common and Bramanville, and one of its newest, Brierly Pond Village. In order to raise the \$240,000 necessary to purchase the property, the Conservation Commission partnered with the Metacomet Land Trust, the Millbury Improvement Initiative and the Friends of Millbury Open Spaces, which is an ad-hoc group of volunteers who coordinated the fundraising campaign. Grant monies were received from the MA Division of Conservation Services LAND Grant Program, an anonymous foundation, GWCF Water

& Land Stewardship Fund, Fields Pond Foundation, and the Heritage Partnership Program. To supplement the grant monies, the project partners obtained nearly \$30,000 in donations from local businesses and residents. The Millbury Department of Public Works and a local contractor, Mike Benard, also donated materials and labor to construct a new gravel parking area at the new trailhead off of Old Common Road.

The Conservation Commission continues to encourage all to use the Town's Conservation areas for passive recreation such as hiking and bird watching. The Police Department should be notified if any hunting or use of A.T.V. vehicles is noticed on these lands. Civic groups and individuals volunteering to help maintain or establish new trails are always welcomed and greatly appreciated.

The Commission normally meets on the first and third Wednesday evening of each month beginning at 7:00 p.m. One meeting a month is generally scheduled in July and August. REPORT OF THE MILLBURY PUBLIC LIBRARY

The Millbury Public Library wishes to thank all our patrons, friends and the Town of Millbury for a very busy and successful year. Thanks also to the Friends of the Millbury Public Library, The Millbury Cultural Council, Mary B. Grogan Grant and those who have donated to the library financially and through books. It has been shown that when the economy slows down the Library use goes up. Our patrons are signing up for more library cards, taking out additional books, CDs, DVDs, audio books plus magazines. The magazine increase is due to people stopping their own subscriptions at home. They come in to read the newspapers and browse the shelves for fiction and nonfiction books.

Thanks to State Aid to Libraries the library received eight new computers for the library staff and the patrons. In the fall we will also be adding two new public computers. The Library computers are still in high demand because many patrons don't have their own computers or internet access in their homes. Many patrons are using the computers for job searching and filling out online applications. These computers sometimes are the only way for these patrons to continue their search for employment. Many students also come in to use the computers for homework and research projects.

The children's room has been a very busy place. We have a senior aid doing storytimes. She reads stories on topics likes cats, dogs and holidays with a craft. We also have "Messy Fingers" which is a science program for children three and up. The children had fun learning about bears, magnets and ice. Storytimes had between 10 to 15 children and parents per week. The "Messy Fingers" programs had 13 children plus parents sign up for the twice a month sessions. Both are very important to the younger children that need brain and hands-on stimulus to learn and grow.



TO THE HONORABLE BOARD OF SELECTMEN AND CITIZENS OF MILLBURY:

We hereby submit out annual report for the year ending June 30, 2010.

Public Health Preparedness

In 2003, the Public Health Emergency Preparedness Cooperative (CDC PHEP) grant of the US Centers for Disease Control and Prevention was announced, strengthening an emerging priority of health and medical preparedness for local Boards of Health across the nation. Since the inception of the CDC PHEP grant, the Region 2 Public Health Emergency Preparedness Coalition, a regional coalition of 74 communities in Central Massachusetts have been meeting twice per month to plan for major infectious disease events, such as an influenza pandemic. The Board has developed a plan in conjunction with Town Public Safety, Public Schools and Emergency Management officials, a system whereas local government has the ability to appropriately distribute/administer vaccines within 24 hours of a large scale infectious disease outbreak.

These plans were tested this past Fall as the Board of Health working in partnership with the Millbury Public Schools, Emergency Management and many other Town departments responded to the H1N1 pandemic. During 2009-2010 influenza season the nation was challenged with having to administer two different formulations of the influenza vaccine, the first being the typical seasonal vaccine and the second being the H1N1 formulation. The H1N1 formulation was developed within months by the federal government due to an outbreak of H1N1 that began in Mexico in April 2009. This strain quickly made it's across the US border thus triggering the first pandemic in two generations. During the summer and fall months Town officials began to meet to plan for and respond to the pandemic by developing a targeted influenza vaccination campaign for school age children, pregnant women and people with chronic illness. Utilizing the basic principles of our public health preparedness program the Board of Health with its many partners was able to host 8 clinics while vaccinating 588 number of people. We had two seasonal flu clinics and vaccinated 22 people.

Tobacco Use

Cigarette Smoking

Mortality from lung cancer is 25 percent higher among males in Millbury compared to the state of Massachusetts. Mortality from lung cancer is 41 percent higher among females in Millbury compared to the state of Massachusetts. The rate of hospitalizations for lung cancer is 72 percent higher among females in Millbury compared to the state of Massachusetts. The rate of hospitalizations for lung cancer is not significantly different among males in Millbury compared to the state of Massachusetts. An estimated 1,898 smokers live in Millbury (19.3% of adults, age 18+). The adult smoking rate is 20 percent higher in Millbury than statewide (19.3% in Millbury compared to 16.1%statewide). The rate of smoking during pregnancy in Millbury is 35 percent higher than for the overall state of Massachusetts (10% in Millbury compared to 7.4% statewide).

MassHealth Tobacco Cessation Benefit

Since coverage of the tobacco cessation began in July 2006, 180 MassHealth smokers from Millbury have used the benefit - an estimated 62.5% of MassHealth smokers living in Millbury. Statewide, more than 75,000 MassHealth smokers (41%) have used the tobacco cessation benefit since July 2006.

QuitWorks

Health care providers referred 36 smokers living in Millbury to the QuitWorks program to help them quit smoking. In addition, 83 people from Millbury called the Massachusetts Smokers' Helpine to quit smoking (fiscal years 2004 to 2009).

Illegal Tobacco Sales to Minors

The rate of illegal sales to minors (those under age 18) is 35 percent higher in Millbury (12%) compared to the state of Massachusetts (8.9%) based on data from FY 2009.

Worcester Regional Tobacco Control Collaborative

Given these concerning statistics, the Millbury Board of Health entered into agreement with Worcester Regional Tobacco Control Collaborative (WRTCC) which is a collaborative of eighteen Boards of Health in Central Massachusetts, of which Worcester is the lead agency. The Town of Millbury and the following communities are served: Auburn, Boylston, Charlton, Dudley, Grafton, Holden, Leicester, Marlborough, Northborough, Oxford, Shrewsbury, Spencer, Southbridge, Sturbridge, West Boylston, Webster and Worcester. This collaborative maintains the integrity and autonomy of its Board of Health members while the city provides assistance and guidance in all tobacco related issues.

The WRTCC is responsible for conducting youth access to tobacco compliance checks of all tobacco retail facilities in the twenty cities and towns in the collaborative. In addition, the RTCC conducts point of purchase audits for all communities within the collaborative and is also responsible for enforcing MGL 270, section 22, "Smoke Free Workplace Law." Nearly 600 fewer Massachusetts residents have died from heart attacks each year since legislators banned smoking in virtually all restaurants, bars and other workplaces.

Massachusetts law prohibits the sale of any tobacco products to those under the age of 18. Additionally, Massachusetts Attorney General's regulations require retailers to ask for photo identification from anyone attempting to purchase tobacco who appears to be under 27 years of age. The federal Synar Amendment requires all states to conduct random, unannounced compliance checks with local retailers where underage youth may attempt to purchase tobacco. There is a direct correlation between the rates of youth access and the funding of programs that educate retailers and enforce the law. The impact has been recognized on the local level. Illegal sales of tobacco to minors fell by fifty percent in Massachusetts in Fiscal Year 2007 after funding was restored to local programs responsible for preventing youth from buying tobacco.

Communicable Disease Surveillance

Infectious diseases constitute a continuing threat to the public's health. They cause illness, suffering, and death, and place an enormous financial burden on society. Although some infectious diseases have been controlled by modern technological advances, new diseases are still emerging. Under Massachusetts General Laws (MGL), Chapter 111, suspected and/or confirmed cases of diseases dangerous to the public's health are reportable to the local Board of Health and/or the Massachusetts Department of Public Health (MDPH). Reporting disease occurrences enables the public health staff to monitor trends, detect and control outbreaks, and evaluate prevention activities. The Millbury public health nurse regularly collects important information on all reported diseases as part of routine epidemiological disease investigations. Environmental Health

The Board monitors food offered for consumption to ensure it is wholesome, free from adulteration, properly labeled, identifiable, and manufactured at an approved source. All food establishments receive mandated inspections to determine compliance with the provisions contained within the Chapter X, of Minimum Sanitation Standards for Food Establishments.

The Board must also uphold and achieve compliance with the Massachusetts Sanitary Code, Minimum Standards of Fitness for Human Habitation. This program consists of responding to complaints, issuance of orders or citing violations with a focus on unkempt property, housing violations, rodent control issues, as well as investigations of any public health nuisance. The Board of Health has investigated more than 120 housing and nuisance complaints, of which agents have had to respond at least twice to each complaint, for the initial and then follow-up(s). There were 4 condemnations, and 34 cases were brought to court.

Lastly, the Board is charged with enforcing various Massachusetts Department of Environmental Protection Regulations such as Title V and CMR 310 which includes septic plan review, air, water and noise nuisance control and hazardous materials control. Locally, there are numerous

REVENUE

Money collected from permits, fees, reimbursements, donations, and inspections totaled \$20,521.39 for the period of July 1, 2009 to June 30, 2010. This includes \$500.00 collected in fees for services rendered on the Massachusetts Turnpike and \$500 in false fire alarm fees. There were 356 open burning permits sold at \$10 each and 12 Agricultural Permits issued at no charge during the 2010 burning season. All fees are turned in weekly to the Treasurer's Office. The Fire Department received \$610 in donations.

DEPARTMENT TRAINING

There were 45 training sessions conducted this year. Training included but was not limited to the following: Special RIT training, Driver Training, Search & Rescue, Pump Operations, Foam

Training, Vehicle Extrication, Containment and Fire Suppression, Haz-Mat Training, Open Water and Ice Rescue Training, and tours of local businesses.

The Fire Department sent three recruits to the District 7 Recruit Training Program. Hank Allard, Jonathan Cuneo, and Brian Dalton graduated from this program in June 2010. They were appointed as regular members of the fire department effective July 1, 2010. The three recruits successfully completed a grueling 16-week course that consisted of every Tuesday and Thursday evenings for three hours and every Saturday for approximately four to six hours—sometimes as much as an eight-hour day. The three, as well as many previous recruits, completed this task with little or no compensation and with a smile and a great sense of professionalism. So with that being said, the Board of Fire Engineers and the membership of the Department welcome them to the Millbury Fire Department.

FIRE PREVENTION

We held our Field Day on Saturday, August 29, 2009 in the gym and cafeteria of the R. E. Shaw School. The day's activities included a performance by Ayla Brown, autographs from up & coming boxer Edwin Rodriquez, pictures with Wally the Green Monster and other local mascots, a firemen's muster, and the Mass. District 7 Smoke House. Smokey the Bear joined us for a celebration of his 65th birthday and many local businesses and groups set up booths. The Ladies Auxiliary helped to organize the event and provided a food table with Steve Nevalsky donating and cooking about 300 chicken dinners. Despite the heavy rain, this day was a huge success and I thank all who participated and supported us. Special thanks to School Superintendent Susan Hitchcock and the Shaw School custodial staff for their help.

Millbury's Fire Prevention Program will now be headed up by Asst. Chief Jeffrey Dore with assistance from the firefighters. Asst. Chief Dore intends to continue the classroom presentations started by Marc Auclair and will reinstate the fire truck visits to the schools during Fire Prevention Week.

We want to take this opportunity to thank FF. Marc Auclair for all that he has done for the S.A.F.E. Program, the Fire Prevention Program, and all the children Marc has reached out to over the many years that he ran these programs.

ACCOMPLISHMENTS

To our honorable Townspeople: I would like to take this opportunity to share with you a few of the Fire Department's accomplishments. Explorer Post #13 was re-established last year. At present, there are more than 20 young men and women involved in the Post. This program gives them the opportunity to gain insight as to what it takes to become a firefighter--the training, classroom lessons, hand's-on opportunities, and preparedness it takes to respond to any and all types of incidents. The Board of Fire Engineers offers its support and is impressed with the progress and abilities of the group.

The Board of Fire Engineers submitted grants for the replacement of our self-contained breathing apparatus (SCBA) and the installation of an exhaust removal system in Stations 2, 3, and 5. If awarded, the grants will allow the Fire Department to upgrade to a more modern version of SCBA's—what we have now is more than 10-years old. The exhaust removal systems will make our fire stations cleaner and "greener". We are waiting anxiously for a positive outcome from the Federal Government to both grants.

The Fire Department is continuing its Driver Training Program. This is based on the most current emergency driving program available and involves eight-hours of classroom instruction, on-road training, and a competency course. It is headed up by FF. Bob Lahair and FF. Steve Brock. Thank you to both individuals for all your hard work and dedication to this program.

The Board of Fire Engineers would also like to announce the completion of a much needed addition to Station 5 which is located in the Dorothy Pond section of Town. The membership of Station 5 now (finally) can have a meeting or do training without being crammed in. I would like to recognize the Carpenter's Training School for their invaluable efforts and say thank you to all the private organizations, town departments, and the members of the Millbury Fire Department-especially Station 5- for the hard work and patience during construction. In the end, we can all say this project was worthwhile.

I would also like to take this opportunity-on behalf of the Board of Fire Engineers and the members of the Millbury Fire Department-to say a big "thank you" to the voters and townspeople for their support during the Department's efforts to replace our aging Rescue Squad. Words cannot describe our appreciation of the overwhelming backing we received from you folks. From the entire membership of the Millbury Fire Department, we want to say thank you; stay safe; and God bless.

These are just a few of our Department's major accomplishments over the past year. We have and will continue to work extremely hard to move the Department forward now and in the foreseeable future.

Again, another year has come and gone and the Millbury Fire Department remains a very strong and vibrant department.

REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT

The 2009 – 2010 proved to be a productive year for the Millbury Public Schools. Although the state's fiscal challenges continued to diminish the state and local financial support for education, quality programs, new initiatives and an outstanding staff provided a wide-range of educational, social, career, artistic and athletic opportunities for the 1,900 students attending the public schools.

The school district secured federal and state grant funding in the amount of \$1,328,160 to support improving teacher quality, enhancing instructional technology use, providing additional direct instruction to special education students, strengthening English/Language Arts and Mathematics' services, transportation for field trips, full day kindergarten and before and after-school tutoring to struggling students in English/Language Arts and Mathematics. Of that amount, \$456,103 was provided by the federal government in the form of the American Recovery and Reinvestment Act. Although this funding was not competitive, federal guidelines for its expenditure were stringent and the highest levels of accountability implemented.

The district continued to focus on its primary goals; those being to improve the academic performance of all students at all grades levels in English/Language Arts and Mathematics, to provide a safe, secure and nurturing learning environment for students and to improve communication with families and the community.

The Elmwood Street School welcomed Mrs. Maryann Ablove as its new part-time Interim Assistant Principal. The position was reduced to part-time because of budgetary constraints, which resulted in the former Assistant Principal accepting a full-time position elsewhere. Mrs. Ablove's education and training as a licensed Speech and Language Pathologist and her previous experience as an Assistant Principal/Head Teacher for 9 years in the Wilmington Public Schools, served as a strong support to the Elmwood staff and its Principal, Ms. Sue Frederick.

The Elmwood Street School teachers and staff focused on assisting students in developing strong literacy skills. All students continued to receive an hour long block of reading and English/Language Arts. In addition, everyone participated in Walk to Read, additional literacy direct instruction for groups of students demonstrating similar skills. The goal of this additional time was to support struggling readers, helping them to achieve the skills, necessary for a complete literacy foundation and to provide the proficient and advanced readers with reading materials/activities to peak their interest and to continue to read at higher levels. Families were encouraged to engage in continuous rich discussion with their children which strengthens vocabulary and to read to them and with them daily. Additional small group instruction was provided in English/Language Arts and Mathematics before-school.

Under the leadership of former Principal, Carol Chiras, students in grade 2 continued to enjoy, as previous classes had, the History of Millbury. Students studied about the town in which they live and participated in field trips to the Asa Waters Mansion, Grass Hill Schoolhouse, the Old Common and a cemetery. The Millbury Parents' Club, once again, graciously supported this lesson with funding for the field trips. This commitment to the education of Millbury students has been greatly appreciated by parents, teachers, staff and the administration.

Community Service Learning grants funded a number of creative, community-based projects, such as the *Cultural Fair* with second and third graders and their families and a visit to a nursing home, led by the Art Teacher, Cheri Heino, to conduct a craft project with the elderly. In addition, the third grade chorus was busy performing at Millbury's *Chain of Lights*, the Sharks Hockey game and at their school concert.

For the first time, third grade students were provided a full day at Shaw at the end of the school year to aid in their transition to fourth grade. At the end of that Step-Up Day, parents were invited to a meeting at the Raymond E. Shaw School, where the newly appointed Principal, Ms. Jennifer Simanski, explained the program, discussed expectations and addressed any parent concerns. The comprehensive nature of this Step-Up-Day has become the new standard in the Millbury Public Schools.

The Raymond E. Shaw School welcomed Ms. Simanski as its new Principal. Ms. Simanski was an Elementary Principal for a total of five years in New Braintree and West Brookfield, a third grade teacher in Spencer and has been a Reading Trainer throughout her five years as a Principal. She has an earned Masters' Degree in Special Education and a Bachelor's in Elementary Education and English. Her extensive knowledge in literacy instruction has been a tremendous support to the staff and students of the Shaw School.

The Shaw School implemented all of the recommendations from the year-long, schoolwide *Positive Behavioral Interventions and Supports Program* planning that occurred during the previous school year. The first few days at the beginning of the school year were devoted to students learning and understanding the goals of the program and actually being taught appropriate and respectful behavior in classrooms, in the lunch room, in hallways and throughout the school. Staff volunteered long hours during the summer to effectively deliver this system where students were "caught doing/performing good things." One of the primary goals of PBIS is to teach and encourage pro-social skills and behaviors. The program was implemented with full integrity and served to be highly effective, as the number of office referrals decreased by over 50 % during the school year. Not only was the goal of reducing the number of disciplinary office referrals met, but the implementation of this program contributed substantially to the increase in student achievement in English/Language Arts and Mathematics, as students did not have to contend with disruptive behavior in classrooms and teachers did not have to take time away from direct instruction.

The annual traditional and right-of-passage field trip for sixth graders continued as they attended Camp Bournedale in April 2009. This science education field trip involved exploring the habitats of various land creatures.

The Shaw Jazz Ensemble won another Gold Medal at the Central District Jazz Festival, under the direction of the very competent and talented Mr. James Rollins.

An unanticipated Eagle Scout Project by Tim Bickford, a senior at Millbury Memorial Junior/Senior High School, resulted in a beautiful, serene sitting and reading space for students in the courtyard area. Tim worked with local businesses to provide new greenery, wood for the reading benches and worked with the school district's Director of Facilities, Mr. Chester Hanratty, to develop the area into usable space to be enjoyed by all.

The Literature Night for parents and students and Community Reading Day supported the district's primary goal of improving academic achievement in literacy for all students. It is the belief of the school system that with the support of parents and families, together we can ensure that our children are not only reading to learn, but for enjoyment purposes, as well.

A highly effective new program, Classroom Imagine II, was created at the Shaw School as students were aging-out of Elmwood and wanting to be in classrooms with their peers in fourth grade. Classroom Imagine, at both Elmwood and now Shaw, has been designed for medically-fragile special education students. Not only do nurses, physical and occupational therapists and speech pathologists work with students in the classroom to support academics and functional living skills, students are also included with their peers in academic classrooms. Parents have spoken positively about the program and have served as important observers as the staff continues to refine components of the program.

The 2009 – 2010 year at **Millbury Memorial Junior-Senior High School** was certainly bittersweet, as Mrs. Linda Swenson, Principal, chose to retire in August 2010, after thirty-six years of educational service to the students, their families and the community of Millbury. The community and school district are very fortunate that Mrs. Swenson chose to focus her entire professional career in Millbury.

For the past four years, Mrs. Swenson has served as Principal of the Millbury School System's flagship, Millbury Memorial Junior-Senior High School. She served as the Assistant Principal for four years prior, was a Reading Specialist, teacher and tutor and was one of the few educators who worked in all three buildings. Most people are aware that she is a life-long resident of Millbury and graduated from Millbury High School in 1970. Throughout the past thirty-six years, Mrs. Swenson has been the school district's cheerleader, its visionary and the catalyst for new student programs that make the Millbury Public Schools unique, highly regarded and a system that meets the needs of all students.

Residents throughout Millbury speak about the positive impact she has had on their children. She has mentored, modeled, cajoled and nurtured; not only students, but staff, as well. Her love of Millbury and their love for her fostered a tremendous reliance on her which will continue for many years to come. The legion of educators who have worked for and with her have lost an exceptional educator in the day-to-day operation of the Millbury Public Schools!

A busy year was had by all at the Junior-Senior High School. One hundred and thirtyseven students received diplomas at Mechanics Hall on June 4, 2010 and another five graduated at the completion of the Millbury Summer School.

The music department competed in performing groups in Washington, D.C. The High School Jazz Band competed in the Central Mass District Festival and received the Silver Medal. The bands continued to dazzle the many audience members at football games, concerts and performing for plays at the high school.

The personal finance classes participated for the first time in the 2009 Economic Summit with other students in MA. The Summit was hosted by the Federal Reserve Bank. Along with the personal finance classes, the accounting classes participated in the Stock Market Challenge, again with other students in MA and one Millbury team placed 2nd out of 5000.

Three new courses, Journalism, Public Speaking and AP Biology were added to the high school curriculum.

The Advanced Placement I Sophomore U. S. History class created *Millbury: a Rich Historical Legacy*. This booklet chronicles some of the important historical people, events, and trends during Millbury's history in honor of the Bicentennial in 2013.

Student Government Day, an annual event, realized another successful year as dozens of students job-shadowed both town and school officials. The students took part in a luncheon at the Senior Center with town officials and school officials in attendance.

The Millbury High School Math Team finished first in their class in the Worcester County Math League for the 2009 – 2010 season. In addition, four teachers participated in Partnership in Math and Science Education with the WPI Computer Science Department, throughout the year.

The newly formed Robotics Team entered their first competition and made it to the semifinal round.

The Girls Soccer Team, coached by Mr. Andy Burnett, won their first SWCL East Conference title and the Girls Cross Country Team, coached by Mr. Mike DiGanghi, shared the conference title. The Boys Indoor Track team won the SWCL East Conference title for the 3rd consecutive year, the Boys Basketball Team won its first SWCL East Conference title in 18 years and the Girls Basketball Team progressed to the State Championship at the DCU Center.

Through the generosity of the Millbury residents and their support of the school budget, all students are presented with opportunities to acquire new skills, refine their abilities, challenge themselves to greater pursuits and succeed in many arenas.

Fiscal Year 2010 Annual Report

AVENUE TO THE FUTURE – POINTING THE WAY: Students find opportunity at Valley Tech, where their career path to a potentially bright future begins. The Blackstone Valley Vocational Regional School District, which receives continuing support from its thoughtful partners in households and workplaces, firmly believes today's youth can meet or exceed the expectations and demands this century will present. Valley Tech prides itself on being a system that, despite its successes, undergoes constant evaluation and demonstrates a willingness to adjust and improve.

Valley Tech students, staff, and administrators advanced their record of noteworthy accomplishments in Fiscal Year 2010 (July 1, 2009 – June 30, 2010) and this report highlights that value-added aspect of the Valley Tech experience.

As the nationwide economic recession continued to affect the Commonwealth of Massachusetts during FY10, Valley Tech officials reduced expenditures while protecting our hallmark high quality vocational-technical education for our increasing student population. In fact, Valley Tech's FY10 budget, unanimously approved by each of its 13 district member towns, reflected an overall increase of just 1.99 percent.

Your vocational-technical system is proud to hold your trust. Valley Tech provides a rigorous academic curriculum that integrates the competencies students gain from their sophisticated vocational-technical instruction.

LPN PROGRAM, STUDENT ACHIEVEMENT DRAW ATTENTION: Thinking ahead to ensure eligibility for as many funding sources as possible in the coming years, Valley Tech aggressively secured full approval of its post-secondary Licensed Practical Nurse program, which opened in the fall. The expedited application and approval process, achieved through impressive cooperation from officials of the Massachusetts Department of Elementary and Secondary Education (DESE), positioned Valley Tech for more state aid eligibility during Fiscal Year 2011.

At the prestigious national SkillsUSA championships in Kansas City, Missouri, Valley Tech recorded podium finishes for the seventh time in eight years and the Community Service team successfully defended its gold medal finish. Valley Tech won three gold

medals as the Community Service team, under the direction of English and History Team Leader Rosemary Quirk, won the gold for its school year-long cancer awareness Service team, under the direction of English and History Team Leader Rosemary Quirk, won the gold for its school year-long cancer awareness campaign in memory of Valley Tech coach and teacher Edward Waters. The three-person team included Elizabeth Belanger of Northbridge, Lacey O'Neil of Milford and Erica Poirier of Blackstone. Alysa-Rae Mello of Northbridge won a silver medal in Food & Beverage Service. The other students from Valley Tech also finishing well were Haley Beaudoin (Northbridge), fourth in Technical Computer Applications; Christopher Delmore (Milford) and Joshua LaBonte (Milford) sixth in 3-D Visual Animation; Riley Jordan (Grafton) 14th in Cosmetology; Christopher Downing (Millville) 25th in Auto Service Technology, and Andrew Cardin (Sutton) 27th in Welding.

The results from the spring 2009 administration of the Massachusetts Comprehensive Assessment System tests to members of the Class of 2011 showed that for the ninth straight year Valley Tech students made noteworthy gains in reaching proficiency on the MCAS. Federal legislation requires all students to reach Advanced or Proficient in mathematics and English language arts by 2014. Eighty-four percent in math and 86 percent in English reached that level on the first attempt in Valley Tech's Class of 2011. The data reflected a six percent increase in math and seven percent increase in English proficiency over Valley Tech's Class of 2010. The percentage of students who scored at Advanced or Proficient levels are well above the state averages of 75 percent in math and 81 percent in English. On the science and technology/engineering test, which the DESE has made a third requirement to receive a high school diploma, Valley Tech's Class of 2011 reached a proficiency percentage of 75, well above the state average of 61.

NUMBERS REFLECT SUCCESS: The success of our student body continues to be measured by 100% competency determination, high career placement rates, and high college matriculation rates for our graduates. This in turn inspires confidence in our stakeholders that Valley Tech is succeeding in its mission to prepare the students of Blackstone Valley with a world class education. The District's FY10 total operating budget was \$18,455,211. Chapter 70 Aid contributed \$7,072,673 and Minimum Contributions from the 13 member towns totaled \$8,128,008.

In the operation portion of the budget, but outside DOE Net School Spending areas, the District budgeted \$466,894 for transportation costs, \$780,839 for retiree medical coverage while deferring the acquisition of capital assets. This was offset by \$552,557 in regional student transportation funds received from the Commonwealth. In addition to their state-required Minimum Contributions, the member towns unanimously supported the school's operating budget with shared assessments for operations, student transportation and retiree medical. This investment was designed with sensitivity to the financial challenges faced by our 13 member towns, but more importantly to provide the fiscal support to respond to the diverse learning needs of our student body which grew by 5.5 percent over FY09.

In response to continued weakening economy and lower than expected tax collections, the Commonwealth was forced to reduce the District's Chapter 70 & 71 allocations by \$325,331; however, those funds were completely restored with funding from the American Recovery & Reinvestment Act (State Fiscal Stabilization Funds). Given the

ongoing fiscal constraints and the likelihood of a continued economic slump, the District continues to search out greater efficiencies in its staffing patterns, supply purchases, technology, and other contractual services requirements. Bolstered by prudent budget management practices, the District utilized unreserved fund balance in the amount of \$287,500 to offset member town assessments. The District also secured an additional \$1.9 million in grants and private donations to fund educational investments and vocational instructional equipment.

The Council on Aging office, Senior Center and Drop in lounge are located at 1 River Street. We are in our 37^{th} year serving those 60 years and older.

The days and hours of operation are as follows: Monday through Friday 8:00 A.M. to 4:30 P.M., and Wednesday evening from 5:30 P.M. to 8:30 P.M. The Town's elder population is 2,783.

The following programs and services are being offered:

Intergenerational Programs (Helping Hands, M.O.V.E. Program), Socialization (cards, bingo, & games) Information, Referral and Client Advocacy, Fuel Assistance Program, Legal Aid, AARP Free Tax Program, Periodical Informational/Educational Programs, Friendly Visitors Program, Day trips, Evening Activities, and I.D. Cards for Senior Citizens.

Nutrition Program: Through a grant from Elder Services of Worcester, we provide a hot lunch program at the Senior Center, Monday thru Friday at 12 noon. We delivered approximately 75 meals per day to the homebound. We provided a total of 13,267

Congregate meals and 15,950 home delivered meals. We also deliver holiday, snow days and evening meals to those who qualify. The sponsor for our MOW Drivers is the Millbury Savings Bank.

Our health services include: Podiatrist Clinic, Health Education Clinic, Hearing Aid Clinic; Osteoporosis Forums, Flu Shot Clinic, along with our weekly Stay Well Clinic, Exercise Classes, Yoga and Tai Chi are also offered.

Social Activities; There are many social activities that the Council on Aging provides: Cards, bingo, crafts, walking club, sing-a-long, whist, craft store, movies, and Wii bowling, Bridge and

monthly birthday parties. Summer concert were provided in the garden, and were co-sponsored by Mike and Lucille Maguire and Selectmen Bernie Plante, Fran King and Joe Coggans.

We also worked with the Blackstone Valley Tourism to encourage more events such as the "Chain of Lights". Our evening activities and weekend events are extremely successful and it gives the younger elder population some wonderful things to do and to keep them active.

We also provide day and overnight trips, other miscellaneous activities that take place away from the Center.

Transportation: The Council on Aging runs five (5) vehicles. During the past year we provided 21,184 one way rides to the elderly and handicapped of Millbury. Our service also, provides rides for all ADA Clients, (Americans with Disabilities). Our service area is one town out in each direction (Auburn, Grafton, Sutton and Worcester).

Grants Received: The Council on Aging was successful in obtaining several grants, this past year. They were \$17,990.00 from the Executive Office of Elder Affairs for program services for year 2009 at the Senior Center, \$25,000.00 from Millbury Savings Bank for a Fuel Assistance program, \$59,000.00 for a replacement vehicle from the Executive Office of Transportation and Construction. A New Freedom transportation grant in the amount of \$8,000 to provide services beyond ADA. Through the effort of our Friends of the Millbury Seniors, are also providing the funding for the plantings and upkeep of the Victorian Garden. We also utilized the Community Service Program from the Sheriff's Dept. to assist us with the Garden.

The COA is the Co-sponsor with the Board of Selectmen for the Elder Community Work Off Program. Currently we have 22 individuals working in 11 Town Departments. The warrant article was for \$20,000 allowing individuals to earn up to \$1,500 in credits on the property tax bill for a fiscal year.

To the staff: A sincere thanks for doing outstanding jobs and implementing the programs and services at the Senior Center. Special thanks to all the wonderful volunteers who do an outstanding job at a whole variety of different things, we are *112* strong.

The Council on Aging Board and I sincerely thank all Town Departments, Town Agencies, Churches, Merchants, Civic Groups and all the Townspeople for their continued support.

REPORT FOR THE BOSTON POST CANE





On August 2, 1909, Mr. Edwin A. Grozier, Publisher of the Boston Post, a newspaper, forwarded to the Board of Selectmen in 700 towns* (no cities included) in New England a gold-headed ebony cane with the request that it be presented with the compliments of the Boston Post to the oldest male citizen of the town, to be used by him as long as he lives (or moves from the town), and at his death handed down to the next oldest citizen of the town. The cane would belong to the town and not the man who received it. In 1930, after considerable controversy, eligibility for the cane was opened to women as well.

The recipient is still **Helen Collette**, born March 31, 1906. She will retain this honor as long as she remains in Millbury even though another resident may become eligible. We will reassess the honor each November. Mrs. Collette was at our 197th Bicentennial Celebration at Scales Restaurant and blew out the candles for the Town. The original Boston Post Cane remains locked in a showcase at the Municipal Office Building. The replica of the cane that was given out, we believe, in 1996 and has not been returned.



The Millbury Housing Authority hereby presents the annual report for the fiscal year ending September 30, 2010.

CHAPTER 200-1

The Chapter 200-1 Program consists of twenty-five Cape Cod houses located on Memorial Drive. These houses were originally built to house veterans after World War II. While veterans are given a preference under this program, the units also provide safe, decent, sanitary housing at affordable rents for families of low income regardless of veteran status. The units continue to be completely occupied.

The Housing Authority pays a designated fee "in lieu of taxes" on these properties and pays the ongoing rate designated for sewer usage.

CHAPTER 705

The Housing Authority currently houses eleven low-income families under this program. Five families are housed in the scattered site properties owned by the Housing Authority and six families live in a three duplex site located on Burbank Street.

The Housing Authority pays sewerage use and real estate taxes on all of its 705 properties.

MRVP PROGRAM

At the end of September 2010 there were three individuals or families participating in the Massachusetts Rental Voucher Program. Participants in this program are entitled to a fixed voucher payment, made directly to their landlord. The voucher payment is based on the household size, income, composition and the geographical location of the rental unit. These vouchers continue to be mobile allowing participants to use the vouchers anywhere in the state.

Since 1987 a subsidy under the **Massachusetts Rental Voucher Program (MRVP)** from the Department of Housing and Community Development has provided the funding for a **Transitional House** through which **YOU**, **INC**. provided training to help older adolescent girls live independently. Unfortunately, due to budget shortfalls this program was discontinued in June 2010. During those years we enjoyed a very rewarding relationship with Maurice Boisvert, President and CEO of You, Inc., and the staff and participants of the program and are happy we had the opportunity to provide assistance for this worthwhile endeavor.

CHAPTER 667-C

This program is made up of one hundred forty-six units of low income housing for the elderly and handicapped. Thirty-two of the units are located on Pearl Street, sixty units are located on Colonial Drive and another fifty- four units are located at 95 Elm Street. All units continue to be fully occupied.

CHAPTER 667-4

The Chapter 667-4, Congregate Housing Program, located on Colonial Drive, consists of five apartments with a total of twenty-three bedrooms. This program is designed to provide affordable housing together with supportive social and health services to help individuals maintain independent living and prevent early and unnecessary rest home or nursing home placement. It provides companionship yet offers privacy to its participants. At the end of September 2010 there were twenty-two residents living in the Congregate facility.

A separate application must be filed for this program. Applicants must first meet the same financial and age requirements as our conventional housing programs to be eligible. For an application or program information, call the Millbury Housing Authority at 508-865-2660 or Lisa Bennes, Congregate Coordinator, at 508-865-2960.

The Millbury Housing Authority continues to act as sponsor for the Congregate Housing Program under a grant from the Executive Office of Elder Affairs.

Also located in the Congregate Building on Colonial Drive is the Adult Day Health Care Center. This program provides assistance on a daily basis, including meals, recreation, socialization, personal care and medication management for frail elders and disabled individuals. Janet Clawson, RN, directs the program, which is managed by the Auburn District Nursing Association, Inc.

MAINTENANCE

Our maintenance program involves maintenance of forty-four buildings that include one hundred eighty-nine apartments. Housing Authority maintenance personnel maintain the common areas, grounds and parking lots in our elderly developments. Families in single or duplex housing units maintain their own grounds.

Our maintenance staff consists of three full-time positions: Allen Marcell, Maintenance Coordinator, Thomas Austin and Michael Michalak, Sr., all Maintenance Mechanics 1. The dedication and excellent work performance of our maintenance department is reflected in the condition of the Housing Authority's properties.

ADMINISTRATION

Management and maintenance of all Housing Authority programs and properties is administered by the Executive Director and approved by the Board of Directors. Office hours are 8:30 A.M. to 4:00 P.M. Monday through Friday.

The administrative staff consists of one (1) part-time office clerk, Linda Vernon, and (3) fulltime employees: Administrative Assistant/Program Coordinator, Judith Flynn; Congregate/Service Coordinator, Lisa Bennes; hhd Executive Director, Janet L. Cassidy.

REPORT OF THE ASA WATERS MANSION TASK FORCE

To the Honorable Board of Selectmen and the Citizens of Millbury:

We hereby submit our Annual Report for the fiscal year of July 1, 2009 through June 30, 2010.

The intense hail storm which hit the Town of Millbury on Memorial Day of 2009 caused major damage to the Asa Waters Mansion. A good deal of this fiscal year was devoted to completing storm related repairs on the Mansion's roof, gutters, original shutters, and a great deal of exterior painting was required on the western and northern facades of the building due to hail damage. Although the majority of the repair work was completed in this fiscal year there remained a few tasks that will need to be completed in FY 2011.

During the course of this fiscal year we funded many improvements to the Mansion including electrical upgrades, emergency light replacements, and re-glazing several third floor windows. In the spring we were awarded a grant through the John H. Chafee Blackstone River Valley National Heritage Corridor to fund repairs to the chimney and various exterior maintenance projects. This grant was made possible through matching funds provided by Millbury Savings Bank and the Friends of the Asa Waters Mansion. In the spring we started a capital campaign to fund the restoration of the Mansion's widow's walk and expect to be able to reinstall it atop the Mansion in FY 2011.

We once again hosted numerous events in conjunction with the Friends of the Asa Waters Mansion including our annual Christmas festival, along with many teas and group tours. In the spring we presented "From Slavery to the White House" in addition to numerous children's teas featuring story books with guest readers. Through their efforts the Friends of the Asa Waters Mansion once again contributed to the beautification of the Mansion including the grounds and gardens. The flowers create outstanding backgrounds for those capturing pictures, truly evidenced in the spring when the Mansion and its grounds are set aside for Millbury High School prom pictures. We were pleased that once again a local second-grade class planted "Sara's Garden" in honor of a member of the original Waters family; this project was supported in part by a Community Service-Learning Grant. As a service to our community The Friends of the Asa Waters Mansion continued their long time commitment generously volunteering their time to staff bereavement receptions this past year.

Our Director, Catherine Elliott, remains active in aggressively promoting the Mansion into new markets. She continues to serve on the Board of Directors for the Blackstone Valley Chamber of Commerce, and is a member the Blackstone Valley Tourism Association. The Mansion has become a primary area of interest for visitors to this region, and we were proud to see the Asa Waters Mansion included in "The Top 1000 Places to visit in Massachusetts" in 2010.

Through all the growth and increased activity we continue to adhere to our unwavering goal of allowing Millbury Community Service Organizations to utilize the Mansion free of charge. We are pleased that at least one half of the Mansion's utilization continues to be gratis for town organizations. We are proud to have the Millbury Women's Club and the Millbury Historical Society utilize the Mansion as their headquarters.

REPORT OF THE ASA WATERS MANSION TASK FORCE

We are extremely grateful to the community for their continued financial donations, along with gifts of 19th century furnishings and collections to showcase throughout the Mansion.

The Asa Waters Task Force and the Friends of the Asa Waters Mansion collectively work together to keep the Mansion a treasure for the Town of Millbury. We thank the citizens and business community for their continued support of our endeavor in "watching an old building with care."

Before we begin our Annual Report The Butler Farm Re-Use Committee would once again like to thank the many people who have supported us over the past year.

Accomplishments of The Butler Farm Re-Use Committee during the fiscal year were:

1. The Butler Farm is now being studied for an installation of a wind turbine and bids are out for a cell tower incorporated with the towns' communications tower.

2. The Millbury Emergency Management Association has started to install a generator to be used in an emergency with a power outage to run the Communications equipment.

3. The Plumbing of the Farm House has been completely replaced. A new expansion tank for the well was also, replaced. Two point of source water heaters have been installed in the kitchen and bathroom.

4. Remodeling of the bathroom was completed this year. Complete with all new fixtures.

5. The Farm House interior has been painted and trim re varnished.

6. The Committee is working on researching the History of the Farm and will decorate the interior with pictures found of the Farm. A History will be published when it is completed.

7. The Farm has three new picnic tables. In the up coming months, three picnic areas will be constructed. These picnic areas will be located at scenic overlooks around the Farm House. Please come to the Farm, sit read a book and enjoy the view.

8. The landscaping and lawn mowing of 5 acres, is being done on a weekly basis by Norm Gonyea and Ernie Bernard. Many more trees and bushes have been removed away from the house and around the grounds.

9. We offered a Community Garden to residents of the Town of Millbury. The Garden plots were 10'x20' and could be doubled to accommodate any resident. The Garden space is limited so we offer plots on a first come first serve basis. This year was our biggest year. The Gardeners totaled 27 with 21 of 27 plots planted. The Committee will have the gardens tilled and limed before winter. In the spring the Committee will till and offer garden plots to the residents of Millbury. We will announce plots are available on a first come first serve basis giving last years gardeners first refusal.

10. The walking trails are being groomed and are being used by residents to walk and exercise their dogs. We ask that residents be courteous and pick up after their pets. Thank You.

11. A new updated accurate map of the trails is being created and will be available to the public upon arriving at the Farm. The maps will be located in the map box in front of the garage. This map box was installed by a Boy Scout from a past Eagle Project.

- 12. The Butler Farm Re-Use Committee has added two new members this year bringing our Committee up to 7. Ernie Bernard has been helping Norm Gonyea to mow the lawns and grounds keeping for a few years. Karen Bott is our other new member and is co garden chair with Fran King.
- 13. Various carpentry work has been done to the Farm House, including a new deck with stairs has been built at the rear entrance.

REPORT OF THE MILLBURY BICENTENNIAL COMMITTEE

During 2010 the Millbury Bicentennial Committee met seven times as it continued to plan and organize for the Bicentennial celebration planned for June, 2012 to July 4, 2013. The first full year of our existence (2009), we spent a great deal of time determining a framework for the celebration. Since 2010 the subcommittees have essentially become the planning agencies for the celebration. All decisions made through the four subcommittees are approved by the Millbury Bicentennial Committee and progress from there.

By far the most important initial steps have had to be made by the Finance/Fundraising Committee. Under the leadership of Rob Morton, chairperson for the committee, this committee has embarked on several fronts as it has made great strides in raising the \$300,000 we estimate will be needed to make our 200th birthday the success we envision. They initiated a Capital Fund Drive in early 2010 to solicit pledges from our many businesses and organizations in our community. To date, \$160,000 of the projected \$200,000 needed in this endeavor have been pledged. In addition, another \$100,000 will be raised through the efforts of our fundraising events and through pledges from the citizens of Millbury. We had our second annual Wine Tasting event at the Asa Waters Mansion on October 2, 2010. We have a growing number of promotional items that are becoming available, clothing items and Millbury memorabilia. These are all available at Ray's True Value for purchase. Also, a limited edition of a Vaillancourt Santa for the Millbury Bicentennial was released in October, 2010 (only 200 are available). Soon, in the 2011 year, a commemorative coin for our bicentennial will be available along with the coin from the U.S. bicentennial coins left over from the 1976 celebration. During 2011 a thermometer will be placed in the Millbury Common to show our progress in our fundraising efforts. There is a scheduled golf tournament for June of 2011 at the Blackstone National Golf Course. More info to come!

Another of our subcommittees is our Media Committee with Paul Raffa as its chair. A website is up and continues to be in the design stages (www.millbury2013.com), a facebook account has been established with already over 500 fans, an enewsletter will be available to all residents and Millbury connected individuals who supply us with their email addresses. The first enewsletter was published in May and we hope to keep everyone informed of the plans and the needs for our celebration activities as the years unfold. We continue to inform the community through the Millbury-Sutton Chronicle and the Worcester Telegram. We have brochures, flyers of our events, volunteer forms, all of which we promote at various events around town during the year such as the Town Meeting, Fireman's Muster, Block Party, Chain of Lights, to name a few. We can use more help on the technology end as we continue to inform everyone about our events and our future celebration.

The Events Committee has been organizing some of our most important events for our celebratory year. Each of the various events has its own committees and they have been meeting throughout the year and will continue to do so. For example, the Ball Committee has been active through the leadership of Armand White and Matt Mulhane. They have made arrangements with Mechanics Hall for our semi-formal ball on April 6, 2013. There are several subcommittees of this committee already at work planning the event and they meet every other month to get things done. The parade committee is fast at work getting ready for the parade scheduled for June 23, 2013. Other committees are the Symphony Orchestra and fireworks opening up our celebration, June 16, 2012,

Balloon Festival, Aug. 2012, Revolutionary War Reenactment, Oct. 2012, Birthday Party, June, 2013 and more. We expect to partner with many of our town organizations and groups and suggest that if you have any ideas and would like to pursue them with us, please contact us as soon as you can. We look forward to working with the many groups within our community. We are already working with the Millbury Improvement Initiative, Millbury Fire Department, the Millbury Historical Society and the Friends of the Asa Waters Mansion. Many, many more volunteers are needed to make these events successful. Let us know if you're interested by going to our website or by calling the Millbury Town Hall.

Our last committee, the History Committee, under the leadership of Carole Chiras and Frank Gagliardi has the important task of bringing forth our varied history for all of us. They are working on two books, one, a reproduction of the Millbury Centennial Book published in 1915 which Karen Gagliardi has spearheaded and the other is a pictorial history of Millbury which Chris Sinacola is working on. If any residents of Millbury or those connected to our past history have pictures that we might include in this book, please contact Carole Chiras or Chris Sinacola as soon as possible. We hope to have this in production during our celebratory year. The History Committee has held several Memory Days where we scan your pictures and return them to you right away. We have gotten many wonderful memories about Millbury already. There will be a few more in the coming year as well. We really want to have as comprehensive a look at Millbury as possible. So, go to your attics and cellars and uncover the Millbury treasures for all to see! The Committee is also working on collaborating with the schools on Millbury History curricula. They have many other projects in the works as well. The Millbury Historical Society will hold many open houses and events during the 2012 and 2013 year to display our memorabilia and history for everyone.

As you can see, we have a lot planned. We expect there will be a lot more for us to consider and get involved in. We hope that many residents will step forward to help us make this a great celebration. Consider joining our subcommittees and making this an event for everyone to remember for years and years to come!
