


DEDICATION

The Fiscal Year 2011 Annual Town Report is dedicated to Harold Ostrowski for all his years of devoted service to the Town of Millbury.

Mr. Ostrowski served the Town of Millbury for 46 years beginning in 1965 with a 5-year term on the Finance Committee as a member and as chairman, and was the chairman of the Council on Aging at the time of his death. He was a former board member of the Millbury Society of District Nursing. He was a Selectman for 13 years from 1970 to 1983, including serving as Chairman, and was a Life member of the MA Selectmen's Association. He was a former member of the Municipal Swimming Pool Committee, the Rescue Truck Committee, the Fire Department Study Committee, and the Town Manager Screening Committee, and served on the Board of Registrars from 1983-1986.

Mr. Ostrowski was elected to the Millbury Board of Assessors and served from 1986-1994. He also served as co-chairman of the Worcester County Assessors Association Education Committee. He was a member of the Millbury Charter Commission in 1989-90 and also in 1999-2000. He was chairman of both the Water Study Committee and the Millbury Fiscal Responsibility Committee. He was a life member of the Millbury Historical Society.

In 2004 he received the Judith P. Wilkinson Humanitarian Award presented by the Millbury Democratic Town Committee. He served as Millbury's representative on the Central Mass. Resource Recovery Committee and served as Vice Chairman. He was also appointed to Millbury's Solid Waste Management Task Force in 2005. Mr. Ostrowski was instrumental in locating the Wheelabrator facility in Millbury. He was appointed by former Governor King to the Mass. Advisory Committee on Vocational Education in 1981.

Mr. Ostrowski was a charter member and past president of the Millbury Lions Club and had served on the board of directors. In 1988 he received the Melvin Jones Humanitarian Award, the highest award given by Lions International. He was named Millbury's Lion of the Year in 1995 and was also the first Millbury Lion to become a Life member of Lions Club International. He also received the Joseph J. Camarda Fellowship Award in 2002 and the Humanitarian Award from the Millbury Lioness Club in 2003.

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF SELECTMEN

The Board of Selectmen held 21 regular meetings and 4 special selectmen's meetings. Chairman E. Bernard Plante was absent for one meeting; Vice-Chairman Francis B. King was absent for two meeting; Clerk Kenneth I. Schold was present for all; Brian W. Stowell was absent for one meeting and Brian M. Ashmankas was present for all.

We had a very busy year with policies, committees, retirements and hiring. The Board adopted the Fuel Efficient Vehicle Policy written by Selectman Stowell and Town Planner Laurie Connors; a Regionalization Policy written by Selectman Ashmankas; a Fraud Protections Policy, an Investment Policy and a Free Cash Policy all written by Finance Director Brian Turbitt; and There was a Public Safety Building Sighting Committee and a Transfer Station Privatization Committee put together.

The Town saw many retirements this fiscal year including Office Kevin Woods, Principal Linda Swenson; Firefighter Michael "Captain Krunch" Krumsiek, Wiring Inspector Vincent "Joe" Cormier, Assistant Town Clerk Judy Brink, Board of Health Clerk Terrie O'Brien, DPW Director John McGarry and Clerk Diane Lewos, as well as many teachers. Our heartfelt thanks go out to each of these dedicated employees.

We had a lot of changes at the Municipal Office Building: Jayne Davolio became our Town Clerk, Christine Billington became our Assistant Town Clerk, Julie Ann Mitchell and Judy Bater now staff the Board of Health office, Robert D. McNeill, III became our DPW Director and Matthew Stencel became our newly formed Operations Manager. We also hired a new Police Officer, Matthew McGrath. There were also many new recruits for our fire department. We wish all of our new hires long and productive careers here in Millbury.

The Annual Town Election was held on Tuesday, April 26, 2011. Selectmen E. Bernard Plante ran unopposed and was re-elected to a three year term. The Town approved a ballot question for a debt exclusion for an aerial platform fire truck and several changes to the Town Charter which still have to pass Town Meeting to be permitted.

The Annual Town Meeting was held on Tuesday, June 7, 2011. This Town Meeting opened with the announcement of the retirement of Police Chief Richard Handfield after thirty-one years of service to this town, twenty as Chief of Police; Chief Handfield was an extremely dedicated and capable officer who will be greatly missed by all. The town approved a \$35 million budget, the aerial platform fire apparatus and the Charter Amendment changes. There was also approval for an additional all alcohol off premises license for the mall.

Moving toward our 'Green Community' with the acceptance of a Fuel Efficiency Policy, an Energy Reduction plan and the Stretch Energy Code, we are also in the process of erecting a wind turbine at the Butler Farm to utilize the wind for electricity at the town buildings.

Student Government Day was again a great success with the students who chose to be Selectmen for the day; they learned that our decisions are not easy, it takes great balance and much thought to do what is best for the whole Town and not just one area or citizen.

In closing, we wish to express our appreciation for the cooperation and assistance given to us by the various departments within town government. We particularly wish to thank the unpaid and often unrecognized appointed officials who contribute to the mechanics of government and help make Millbury a better community.

The Selectmen holds its regular meetings on the second and fourth Tuesdays of each month. These meetings are televised live on local access channel 13 Charter and channel 26 Verizon. Concerned citizens are invited to attend.

REPORT OF THE BUILDING DEPARTMENT



The Building Inspector, Robert J. Blackman, is appointed annually by the Millbury Town Manager (Millbury Town Charter) to administer and enforce the Massachusetts State Building Code, 780 CMR, under the provisions of Massachusetts General Laws, Chapter 30A.

The Building Inspector and his assistants administer and enforce Appendix D, Zoning, of the Millbury Town By-Laws (Appendix D, Articles 1 through 5, inclusive, of the Millbury Town By-Laws).

The Wiring Inspector, Larry Morris and his assistant, Andy Waszkiewicz are appointed annually by the Millbury Town Manager (Millbury Town Charter) to administer and enforce the Massachusetts Electrical Code, 527 CMR 12.00 under the provisions of the Massachusetts General Laws, Chapter 143, Section 31, annotated.

The Plumbing/Gas Inspector, Gregory Gauthier and his assistant, Brian Gasco are appointed by the Millbury Town Manager (Millbury Town Charter) to administer and enforce the Massachusetts State Plumbing Code 248 CMR 2.00 and the Massachusetts Fuel Gas Code, 248 CMR 3.00 through 8.00 under the provisions of Massachusetts General Laws, Chapter 142, Section 13, annotated.

Administration Division

The Department experienced some significant staff changes this year as a new Director, Robert McNeil, joined our ranks while Head Clerk Diane Lewos retired after 35-years of service. Mr. McNeil serves as the Department's administrative connection to the general public, as well as various Commissions, Boards, and Associations that interact directly with public works. Mr. McNeil is assisted by Head Clerk Cindy Allard.

Cemeteries Division

The Cemetery Commission is responsible for the three town cemeteries; Central Cemetery located at the end of Waters Street, County Bridge Cemetery located at the intersection of Riverlin and Providence Streets, and Dwinell Cemetery located on Dwinell Road. Seasonal labor maintains the cemetery grounds. There were 37 burials at the Central Cemetery in fiscal year 2011. Burial rights to twenty-six lots were sold totaling \$7,250.00 in revenue. Gas & Diesel Fuel Station

The current gas & diesel fuel station is located at 137 Providence Street and is an underground storage tank (UST) scheduled for replacement with an aboveground storage tank (AST) for fueling our town's vehicle fleet. This project is forecasted for the spring/summer of 2012.

The Division is responsible for all public ways and infrastructure within the Town. Seasonal work consists of sanding streets and plowing snow, sweeping streets, cleaning catch basins, repairing, replacing, and mapping drainage infrastructure, dam operation & maintenance, roadside mowing, maintenance of Veterans monuments, asphalt repairs, repairing and replacing signs, line painting and various other tasks as assigned. Full-time staff includes Bill Berthiaume, Keith Caruso, Scott Elie, Joe Kosiba, and Michael Murray.

Maintenance & Operations - Chapter 90 Projects Completed

New drainage was installed on Stowe Road and an extension to this system is currently being designed. The Town replaced the culvert under McCracken Road at the low point. DPW resurfaced Wedgewood Circle and hired Central Mass Regional Planning Commission to perform a Pavement Management Study.

Parks & Playgrounds

The Parks Division, staffed by Lead Carl Ward and several seasonal employees, maintains the Washington Street Park, the Greenwood Street Park, the Jacques Park and the East Millbury Park, as well as the Tot Lot on Millbury Avenue. This consists of five ball fields and soccer fields. They also maintain the Town Common, Town Library and the Asa Waters Mansion grounds. The result of this Division's dedication and effort is several beautiful and useful areas for the residents to enjoy recreation, athletics and assembly.

Sewer Division

During the fiscal year, the Sewer Division invited residents to tie into new sewer expansion areas in East Millbury. The Sewer Division also began a study to reduce the infiltration and inflow of groundwater and storm water runoff into the sewer lines.

The Millbury Sewer Division was led again this year by our long serving and dedicated Sewer Superintendent Brad Lange. He was assisted by Lead Foreman James Piscitelli and sewer workers Frank Stachura and Eric LeClaire. This team is responsible for the maintenance and operation of over 50 miles of sewer lines and 15 pump stations which serve 3,352 customers. The average daily flow is approximately 1,000,000 gallons per day.

Snow and Ice

The Department responded to a very busy winter snow season by sanding, salting, plowing, and also removing snow from around Town with Town staff and private contractors.

Solid Waste Management - Transfer Station

This Division, which is visited many times by the residents of Millbury, is staffed by Lead Bob Roy and Norma Madore. All trash is collected and hauled to the Wheelabrator facility by the Transfer Station staff. This has resulted in a cost savings to the Town of approximately \$50,000.00 per year. The metal recyclable program continues to be a profit making venture for the town with just over 80 tons of steel removed and over \$16,000.00 collected. Recycling is encouraged and residents should be commended for their efforts to recycle. A total of 2,909.44 tons of trash was hauled to Wheelabrator by the Town Transfer Station in FY 2011.

Street Lighting

The Department coordinates maintenance and repair of faulty street lights with NGRID around Millbury.

Tree Warden

Tree Warden Ron Depres is responsible for public shade trees and works very hard to maintain the tree canopy throughout the town which is beneficial to all residents. The Tree Warden identifies dead and diseased trees are coordinates the removal and stump grinding is completed.

APPROVAL NOT REQUIRED PLANS

There were six (6) plans filed under Chapter 41, Section 81P of the Massachusetts General Laws, Approval Not Required, during Fiscal Year 2011. These plans represent perimeter surveys, division of land with adequate frontage on public streets as required by the Millbury Zoning Bylaws, easement descriptions, or lot-line modifications.

SPECIAL PERMITS

There are numerous situations and proposals that require a Special Permit, a process in which the Planning Board is charged with determining whether a particular development should be allowed to occur. The town's zoning bylaw lists the criteria for making these decisions, based on the Board's analysis of extensive technical and public input. Below is a summary of the various special permits applied for during the fiscal year, and the Board's decisions:

Multifamily Special Permits: One application was filed under this section of the Zoning Bylaw, and was approved, with conditions, for one additional dwelling unit on Mayfair Drive. In addition, one application was approved with conditions for an accessory dwelling unit on Lake Street.

Site Plan Review/Stormwater Management Permit: Three applications were approved with conditions: an industrial facility for D. Murgo Trucking, Inc. located off of Route 20; a distribution facility for Bimbo Bakeries located on Latti Farm Road; and the re-development and expansion of the existing business at 54-56 Canal Street, which will include the construction of a new retail building. In addition, the Board approved a major modification to an existing Site Plan Review Special Permit for Herb Chambers located on Route 20/Latti Farm Road.

SUBDIVISIONS

There were two (2) applications approved for a Definitive Subdivision, under the Sequin process, which requires a frontage waiver from the Planning Board: Lincoln Ave. Ext. and S. Oxford Road, each creating one additional building lot.

CURRENT ISSUES

The Town Planner worked with the members of the Energy Advisory Committee to fulfill the prerequisites for designation of Millbury as a Green Community. To that end, the Town prepared and adopted a Fuel Efficient Vehicle Policy, Fuel Efficient Vehicle Replacement Plan, Energy Use Baseline & Energy Reduction Plan and adopted the Stretch Energy Code. The Town also modified its Zoning Bylaws to provide for the as-of-right siting of renewable or alternative energy research and development or manufacturing facilities in the Industrial I and Industrial II Districts. The Town achieved Green Community Designation during Summer 2011. The key benefit of this designation is that the Town is now eligible for grant monies necessary to fund energy efficiency activities.

At the Annual Town Meeting in June of 2011, the Town adopted an amendment to the Zoning Bylaws, Section 36, Floodplain District Requirements, to incorporate the revised boundaries shown on the FIRM, which were defined by the Worcester County Flood Insurance Study report date of July 4, 2011. The Town also agreed to accept a portion of Braney Road, Brian Circle and Jessica J. Drive as public ways. The Board of Selectmen has 120 days from the Town Meeting vote to execute the property transfer of these roadways. The Town Meeting did not approve the petition to make Cronin Brook Way, Diana Hill Drive and Taft Circle public.

The Planning Board continues to police issues at various residential, commercial and industrial developments that are under construction.

The Millbury Planning Board holds its regular meetings on the second and fourth Mondays of each month. These meetings are now televised on local access channel 13. Concerned citizens are invited to attend and anyone wishing to meet with the Board should call the Planning Department at the Municipal Office Building to make arrangements. The Town Planner is available during regular business hours to meet with the public to address any planning issue.

The Millbury Conservation Commission is responsible for administering the Massachusetts Wetlands Protection Act, M.G.L. Chapter 131, Section 40, as it relates to issues in the Town of Millbury. All public hearings and public meetings concerning the filing of a Notice of Intent (NOI), an Abbreviated Notice of Resource Area Delineation (ANORAD) or a Request for Determination of Applicability (RDA) continue to be advertised, generally, in the Millbury-Sutton Chronicle.

In March 2010, the Conservation Commission completed the acquisition of a 15-acre, archeologically-sensitive, undeveloped parcel that, together with a non-contiguous 10-acre forested parcel, serve as the newest additions to the Brierly Pond Conservation Area. The conservation area now consists of nearly 100 contiguous acres of protected open space within walking distance of two of Millbury's oldest village neighborhoods, Old Common and Bramanville, and one of its newest, Brierly Pond Village. In order to raise the \$240,000 necessary to purchase the property, the Conservation Commission partnered with the Metacomet Land Trust, the Millbury Improvement Initiative and the Friends of Millbury Open Spaces, which is an ad-hoc group of volunteers who coordinated the fundraising campaign. Grant monies were received from the MA Division of Conservation Services LAND Grant Program, an anonymous foundation, GWCF Water & Land Stewardship Fund, Fields Pond Foundation, and the Heritage Partnership Program. To supplement the grant monies, the project partners obtained nearly \$30,000

in donations from local businesses and residents. The Millbury Department of Public Works and a local contractor, Mike Bernard, also donated materials and labor to construct a new gravel parking area at the new trailhead off of Old Common Road.

The Conservation Commission continues to encourage all to use the Town's Conservation areas for passive recreation such as hiking and bird watching. The Police Department should be notified if any hunting or use of A.T.V. vehicles is noticed on these lands. Civic groups and individuals volunteering to help maintain or establish new trails are always welcomed and greatly appreciated.

The Conservation Commission can be reached by dialing 508-865-5411 at the Municipal Office Building. If no one is available, you may leave a message on our answering machine. The Commission normally meets on the first and third Wednesday evening of each month beginning at 7:00 p.m. One meeting a month is generally scheduled in July and August. Comments and inquiries from the public are always welcome.

The Millbury Public Library had a very busy and successful year. We added two

more public computers. The computers have been used 5,733. The Library finally has Wi-Fi. Unemployed patrons were writing resumes, seeking jobs and filling out job applications.

The Library has been repainted and landscaping has been done thanks to the Worcester County Sheriffs' Department. They provided labor and the Library supplied the materials and lunch. A new roof has been installed due to ice storm damage.

The Children's Department is always hopping. The Library presents storytimes on Wednesday and Thursday mornings, thanks to our senior aid, Rose Cathcart because we have no Children's Librarians. The children listen to stories, sing songs and create crafts. The crafts are learning projects involving cutting, stringing beads, gluing or using crayons.

The Children's Room received a grant from the Rosemary Davis Fund to present a series of animal programs during January, March and May. The patrons saw chickens, skunks, groundhogs and many more animals. They learned about their habitats, food and hibernation habits. School Vacation week programs offered animal and bug programs. These were supported by a grant from Mary B. Grogan. All these programs were well attended 302 patrons.

Messy Fingers is a science program for children age's three to six during the school year. The children have learned about sun and shade, gliders and planes, dinosaurs and have even made bread. The children love to learn in a fun and adventurous environment. By teaching children young they will become life long learners and get an appreciation and a love of reading.

The Library's "One World Many Stories" Summer Reading Program and associated programs are always well attended. Nearly 160 children signed-up to read a world full of books. It makes the little children feel very important to read or be read too. In all, children enjoyed reading, prizes, crafts and shows. "Millbury Has Talent" keeps expanding. This year eighteen Millbury children demonstrated that they can sing, perform magic, and play instruments. It is a fun time for all! Other Tuesday night programs involved Puppets, Storytelling and Music.

Many programs at the Library would not be possible without the help and support of the Friends of the Millbury Public Library. They provide funding for programs and the up-front payment for the grants we receive from the Millbury Cultural Council, Mary B. Grogan, Rosemary Davis and the YMCA/Beginnings Years Family Network. Without the Friends of the Library and the Millbury Cultural Council there may not be a summer reading program. With their support we have a wonderful Summer Reading Programs that entertains and teaches the children of Millbury and surrounding communities. The Friends of the Library also fund museum passes that patrons can reserve for different

venues in the area. The Friends support these programs at the Library through twice-yearly Books Sales. Please support the Friends and become a Friend of the Library.

The Library is an open book that can take patrons to new worlds and on new adventures. When was the last time you opened a book and was transported to a new place, time or dimension? The Library has items for everyone whether it is to read, listen or watch. The patrons have computers for writing resumes or filling out a job applications. Not everyone has a computer if they do have a computer they can't afford the Internet. The Internet is a very important tool for all ages. We are happy to provide this service at no cost to the patrons. The Library is a place of learning in the community. The library is open to everyone where they can learn and/or attend programs and events like baking, knitting or computers. They can travel to exotic places or their own state. History can come alive and biographies of people can become just like friends.

The Library meeting rooms are well-used. On any giving day there is at least one meeting occurring on some days there are more meetings than rooms, but it all works out. The meetings enable patrons to signup for sports; learn about finances, business and meet with their scout troops. The rooms are also used to support employee/management meetings.

The Library really is a fun and worthwhile place. We provide for all. If a patron is looking for an item be it book, magazine or DVD and we don't have it, then we can obtain it from other CWMARS Libraries or even from another Library throughout the state or the country. Last year we received from other Libraries 6,434 and sent to other Libraries 3,920.

We are heading into a new chapter of Libraries. Patrons can now read a book on their computer or handheld device or Kindle, Nook or IPad. We are also introducing a new Open Source system that will allow patrons more access to items they are looking for. Three networks in the state are converting to the Evergreen Open Source Network. We will be able to see more items and place holds on these items. Millbury has one Library open and waiting to help anyone who needs help. We can be a place of learning and finding information. Find an item to learn new skills and write a resume. It can be used to study or meet. Our doors are open to the whole community and in a way the world.

Thank you to all our patron and supporters. They make the Staff at the Millbury Public Library want to try even harder to make this an even better place.

Public Health Preparedness

In 2003, the Public Health Emergency Preparedness Cooperative (CDC PHEP) grant of the US Centers for Disease Control and Prevention was announced, strengthening an emerging priority of health and medical preparedness for local Boards of Health across the nation. Since the inception of the CDC PHEP grant, the Region 2 Public Health Emergency Preparedness Coalition, a regional coalition of 74 communities in Central Massachusetts have been meeting twice per month to plan for major infectious disease events, such as an influenza pandemic. The Board has developed a plan in conjunction with Town Public Safety, Public Schools and Emergency Management officials, a system whereas local government has the ability to appropriately distribute/administer vaccines within 24 hours of a large scale infectious disease outbreak.

The Board of Health was able to host two seasonal flu clinics and vaccinated 333 people.

Tobacco Use

Cigarette Smoking

Mortality from lung cancer is 25 percent higher among males in Millbury compared to the state of Massachusetts. Mortality from lung cancer is 41 percent higher among females in Millbury compared to the state of Massachusetts. The rate of hospitalizations for lung cancer is 72 percent higher among females in Millbury compared to the state of Massachusetts. The rate of hospitalizations for lung cancer is not significantly different among males in Millbury compared to the state of Massachusetts. An estimated 1,898 smokers live in Millbury (19.3% of adults, age 18+). The adult smoking rate is 20 percent higher in Millbury than statewide (19.3% in Millbury compared to 16.1%statewide). The rate of smoking during pregnancy in Millbury is 35 percent higher than for the overall state of Massachusetts (10% in Millbury compared to 7.4% statewide).

MassHealth Tobacco Cessation Benefit

Since coverage of the tobacco cessation began in July 2006, 180 MassHealth smokers from Millbury have used the benefit - an estimated 62.5% of MassHealth smokers living in Millbury. Statewide, more than 75,000 MassHealth smokers (41%) have used the tobacco cessation benefit since July 2006.

QuitWorks

Health care providers referred 36 smokers living in Millbury to the QuitWorks program to help them quit smoking. In addition, 83 people from Millbury called the Massachusetts Smokers' Helpine to quit smoking (fiscal years 2004 to 2009).

Illegal Tobacco Sales to Minors

The rate of illegal sales to minors (those under age 18) is 35 percent higher in Millbury (12%) compared to the state of Massachusetts (8.9%) based on data from FY 2009.

Worcester Regional Tobacco Control Collaborative

Given these concerning statistics, the Millbury Board of Health entered into agreement with Worcester Regional Tobacco Control Collaborative (WRTCC) which is a collaborative of eighteen Boards of Health in Central Massachusetts, of which Worcester is the lead agency. The Town of Millbury and the following communities are served: Auburn, Boylston, Charlton, Dudley, Grafton, Holden, Leicester, Marlborough, Northborough, Oxford, Shrewsbury, Spencer, Southbridge, Sturbridge, West Boylston, Webster and Worcester. This collaborative maintains the integrity and autonomy of its Board of Health members while the city provides assistance and guidance in all tobacco related issues.

The WRTCC is responsible for conducting youth access to tobacco compliance checks of all tobacco retail facilities in the twenty cities and towns in the collaborative. In addition, the RTCC conducts point of purchase audits for all communities within the collaborative and is also responsible for enforcing MGL 270, section 22, "Smoke Free Workplace Law." Nearly 600 fewer Massachusetts residents have died from heart attacks each year since legislators banned smoking in virtually all restaurants, bars and other workplaces.

Massachusetts law prohibits the sale of any tobacco products to those under the age of 18. Additionally, Massachusetts Attorney General's regulations require retailers to ask for photo identification from anyone attempting to purchase tobacco who appears to be under 27 years of age. The federal Synar Amendment requires all states to conduct random, unannounced compliance checks with local retailers where underage youth may attempt to purchase tobacco. There is a direct correlation between the rates of youth access and the funding of programs that educate retailers and enforce the law. The impact has been recognized on the local level. Illegal sales of tobacco to minors fell by fifty percent in Massachusetts in Fiscal Year 2007 after funding was restored to local programs responsible for preventing youth from buying tobacco.

Communicable Disease Surveillance

Infectious diseases constitute a continuing threat to the public's health. They cause illness, suffering, and death, and place an enormous financial burden on society. Although some infectious diseases have been controlled by modern technological advances, new diseases are still emerging. Under Massachusetts General Laws (MGL), Chapter 111, suspected and/or confirmed cases of diseases dangerous to the public's health are reportable to the local Board of Health and/or the Massachusetts Department of Public Health (MDPH). Reporting disease occurrences enables the public health staff to monitor trends, detect and control outbreaks, and evaluate prevention activities. The Millbury public health nurse regularly collects important information on all reported diseases as part of routine epidemiological disease investigations. The following is a summary of reported diseases in Millbury 2010-2011:

Environmental Health

The Board monitors food offered for consumption to ensure it is wholesome, free from adulteration, properly labeled, identifiable, and manufactured at an approved source. All food establishments receive mandated inspections to determine compliance with the provisions contained within the Chapter X, of Minimum Sanitation Standards for Food Establishments.

The Board must also uphold and achieve compliance with the Massachusetts Sanitary Code, Minimum Standards of Fitness for Human Habitation. This program consists of responding to complaints, issuance of orders or citing violations with a focus on unkempt property, housing violations, rodent control issues, as well as investigations of any public health nuisance. The Board of Health has investigated more than 109 housing and nuisance complaints, of which agents have had to respond at least twice to each complaint, for the initial and then follow-up(s). There were 2 condemnations, and 12 cases were brought to court.

Lastly, the Board is charged with enforcing various Massachusetts Department of Environmental Protection Regulations such as Title V and CMR 310 which includes septic plan review, air,

water and noise nuisance control and hazardous materials control. Locally, there are numerous Town by-laws and Board of Health Regulations that the Board must ensure compliance with such as body art and tanning facilities.

REPORT OF THE REDEVELOPMENT AUTHORITY

To the Honorable Board of Selectmen, Town Manager and the Citizens of Millbury:

The Millbury Redevelopment Authority was created at the annual Town Meeting, March 2, 1963, Article 34 and 36 and comprised of five members, four elected and one state appointed.

The Board held 6 meetings and the attendance was as follows:

State member, vacant at this time. Applicant was submitted to Governor's office on January 21, 2011 still no word at this writing.

WHAT IS A REDEVELOPMENT AUTHORITY?

Most of the Redevelopment Authorities operating in Massachusetts were originally created to take advantage of the federal Urban Renewal Program, serving as vehicles for carrying out the federal mandate to eliminate blight from inner cities. Although the federal program no longer exists, Redevelopment Authorities continue to play a role in the Commonwealth's revitalization under C.121B.

M.G.L. Chapter 121B allows municipalities, through their Redevelopment Authorities acting as urban renewal agencies, to eliminate and redevelop substandard, decadent or blighted open areas for industrial, commercial, business, residential, recreational, educational, hospital or other purposes. With the goals of revitalizing such land uses and encouraging new growth, Redevelopment Authorities have the power to:

- Establish rehabilitation and design standards;
- Assemble and dispose of land, including the taking of real estate through eminent domain;
- Relocate businesses and residents occupying urban renewal sites;
- Demolish and/or rehabilitate substandard structures;
- Participate in real estate development and commercial revitalization;
- Issue bonds, borrow money and invest funds;
- Receive grants and loans;
- Accept gifts or requests.

Redevelopment Authorities are particularly effective in large scale and complex redevelopment projects and in land assembly. Redevelopment Authorities are exempt from M.G.L. Chapter 30(b), the Uniform Procurement Act, when they are engaged in the development and disposition of real property in accordance with an urban renewal plan. This exemption, coupled with the ability to use eminent domain powers, makes Redevelopment Authorities powerful tools for commercial revitalization, industrial park development, infrastructure improvements, facilities renovation and brownfield site

remediation. The development and approval of an urban renewal plan is necessary for a Redevelopment Authority to undertake specific projects.

A Redevelopment Authority, as an independent body politic and corporate, is not an agency of a municipality and therefore, does not answer directly to the chief executive. This affords the Redevelopment Authority more autonomy in planning and implementing redevelopment and revitalization projects. A housing authority may undertake urban renewal projects if there is no Redevelopment Authority in the city or town.

John Fitzgerald, the Urban Development Coordinator of the Department of Housing and Community Development, Commonwealth of Massachusetts spoke to our board and explained our charge.

Steven H. Greenberg of the Ashland Redevelopment Authority addressed our board regarding future work of an Authority.

Millbury Redevelopment Authority is in the process of the planning of a revitalization project that will be a silent sentinel in the center of Millbury.

Projects undertaken by the Redevelopment Authority are not financed with tax payer dollars and funded solely by donations, gifts of money or property, fund raisers and the generosity of our citizens, business's, developers and organizations.

Buildings such as schools, nursing homes, residential complexes, and various business facilities are inspected by the fire department throughout the year.

REVENUE

Money collected from permits, fees, reimbursements, donations, and inspections totaled \$18,506.39 for the period of July 1, 2010 to June 30, 2011. This includes \$1,500 collected in fees for services rendered on the Massachusetts Turnpike and \$600 in false fire alarm fees. There were 310 open burning permits sold at \$10 each and 11 Agricultural Permits issued at no charge during the 2011 burning season. All fees are turned in weekly to the Treasurer's Office. The Fire Department received \$2,232 in donations.

DEPARTMENT TRAINING

There were 48 training sessions conducted this year. Training included but was not limited to the following: Special RIT training, Driver Training, Search & Rescue, Pump Operations, Foam Training, Vehicle Extrication, Containment and Fire Suppression, Haz-Mat Training, Open Water & Ice Rescue Training, and tours of local businesses.

The Fire Department sent six recruits to the District 7 Recruit Training Program. They successfully completed a grueling 16-week course that consisted of every Tuesday and Thursday evenings for three hours and every Saturday for approximately four to six hours and sometimes as much as eight hours. Troy Arcouette, Michael Breault, Jake Hamilton, Jeffrey Kosiba, Donald Lizotte and Nicholas Rinaldo graduated from this program in June, 2011. Asst. Chief Hamilton and FF. Steven Kosiba proudly presented their sons, Jake Hamilton and Jeffrey Kosiba, with their fire department badges at graduation. While Fire Chief Belsito proudly presented his nephew recruit Nicholas Rinaldo with his badges. All recruits will be appointed as regular members of the fire department effective July 1, 2011. The Board of Fire Engineers

commends them for their dedication to the program and welcomes them to the Millbury Fire Department.

FIRE PREVENTION

Asst. Chief Dore headed up the fire prevention program with assistance from Asst. Chief Richard Hamilton. Asst. Chief Dore visited the Elmwood Street School, R.E. Firefighter Michael Krumsiek retired from the department after 42 years of outstanding service. Mike usually appeared on the fireground with cigar in mouth-calling out orders or helping wherever needed. His experience will be missed but he is passing his knowledge on by being involved with the Explorer Post. Enjoy your retirement, Mike-you earned it.

Under the guidance of Lt. Robert Silver, our Explorer Post #13 has thrived. Numbers have increased to almost 30 and the members hold training sessions twice a month. The Explorers participated in the annual Boy Scout Jamboree held in Douglas. The group also went to Springfield to help with the tornado aftermath. They participate in the fireman's muster and assist with the many appearances and events that the fire department is involved with. The group also responds with the Ladies Auxiliary to help out at large fires or incidents. Asst. Chief Richard Hamilton and retired FF. Michael Krumsiek also help with the training and guidance of the young firefighters. The Explorers have become an asset to the Millbury Fire Department.

The Townspeople again supported us by voting to acquire a new tower truck to replace our 1977 Mack Aerialscope. This truck has served us well but it is overdue for replacement. Parts are harder to come by and it is becoming a safety issue every time the truck rolls. To everyone who supported this article-I truly thank you for your show of support. The new tower should serve the Town of Millbury for many years to come.

The Board of Fire Engineers submitted grants for the replacement of our self-contained breathing apparatus (SCBA). If awarded, the grant will allow the Fire Department to upgrade to a more modern version of SCBA's—what we have now is more than 11-years old.

Engine 3 was toned out on June 1, 2011 to respond to Springfield to assist with the tornado aftermath. Asst. Chief Jeff Dore and his crew responded and spent more than fourteen hours looking for victims and helping wherever they could. This experience will live vividly in the crew's memories for a long time to come.

The Fire Department is continuing its Driver Training Program. This is based on the most current emergency driving program available and involves eight-hours of classroom instruction,

on-road training, and a competency driving test. It is headed up by FF. Bob Lahair and FF. Steve Brock. Thank you to both individuals for all your hard work and dedication to this program.

After some urging, I applied for and received my Fire Chief's Accreditation in April, 2011. The Massachusetts Fire Service Commission established training, education, and experience criteria in order to qualify for accreditation. We look forward to the delivery of our new rescue truck sometime in July, 2011. This truck will be state of the art and will serve the Town of Millbury for years to come. The Council on Aging office, Senior Center and Drop in lounge are located at 1 River Street. We are in our 38^{th} year serving those 60 years and older.

The days and hours of operation are as follows: Monday through Friday 8:00 A.M. to 4:30 P.M., and Wednesday evening from 5:30 P.M. to 8:30 P.M. The Town's elder population is 2,783. This year a major adjustment was achieved at the Senior Center with automatic electric doors being installed for the handicap. The cost of \$5,000 was paid by the Friends of the Millbury Seniors, Inc.

The following programs and services are being offered:

Intergenerational Programs (Helping Hands, M.O.V.E. Program), Socialization (cards, bingo, & games) Information, Referral and Client Advocacy, Fuel Assistance Program, Legal Aid, AARP Free Tax Program, Periodical Informational/Educational Programs, Friendly Visitors Program, Day trips, Evening Activities, and I.D. Cards for Senior Citizens.

Nutrition Program: Through a grant from Elder Services of Worcester, we provide a hot lunch program at the Senior Center, Monday thru Friday at 12 noon. We delivered approximately 75 meals per day to the homebound. We provided a total of 13,368 congregate meals and 15,411 home delivered meals. We also deliver holidays, snow days and evening meals to those who qualify. The sponsor for our MOW Drivers is the Millbury Savings Bank.

Our health services include: Podiatrist Clinic, Health Education Clinic, Hearing Aid Clinic, Osteoporosis Forums, Flu Shot Clinic, along with our weekly Stay Well Clinic, Exercise Classes, Yoga and Tai Chi are also offered.

Social Activities: There are many social activities that the Council on Aging provides: Cards, bingo, crafts, walking club, sing-a-long, whist, craft store, movies, and Wii bowling, bridge and monthly birthday parties. Summer concerts were provided in the garden, and were co-sponsored by Mike and Lucille Maguire and Selectmen Bernie Plante, Fran King.

We also worked with the Blackstone Valley Tourism to encourage more events such as the "Chain of Lights". Our evening activities and weekend events are extremely successful and it gives the younger elder population some wonderful things to do and to keep them active.

We also provide day and overnight trips, other miscellaneous activities that take place away from the Center.

Transportation: The Council on Aging runs five (5) vehicles. During the past year we provided 17,937 one way rides to the elderly and handicapped of Millbury. Our service also provides rides for all ADA Clients, (Americans with Disabilities). Our service area is one town out in each direction (Auburn, Grafton, Sutton and Worcester).

Grants Received: The Council on Aging was successful in obtaining several grants this past year. They were \$17,990.00 from the Executive Office of Elder Affairs for program services for year 2010 at the Senior Center, \$25,000.00 from Millbury Savings Bank for a Fuel Assistance program, \$59,000.00 for a replacement vehicle from the Executive Office of Transportation and Construction. A New Freedom transportation grant in the amount of \$8,000 to provide services beyond ADA. The Friends of the Millbury Seniors are also providing the funding for the plantings and upkeep of the Victorian Garden. We also utilized the Community Service Program from the Sheriff's Department to assist us with the garden. The Friends group purchased a riding mower for \$2,000 and a shed to house it for \$3,000. This group is the sole support of the Transportation Program.

The COA is the co-sponsor with the Board of Selectmen for the Elder Community Work Off Program. Currently we have 24 individuals working in 12 Town Departments. The warrant article was for \$15,000 allowing individuals to earn up to \$1,500 in credits on the property tax bill for a fiscal year. An additional \$5,000 was required from the reserve account to continue. This was due to a large request from Town departments as there were cuts to their staff.

To the staff: A sincere thanks for doing outstanding jobs and implementing the programs and services at the Senior Center. Special thanks to all the wonderful volunteers who do an outstanding job at a whole variety of different things, we are 126 strong.

The Council on Aging Board and I sincerely thank all Town Departments, Town Agencies, Churches, Merchants, Civic Groups and all the Townspeople for their continued support.

REPORT FOR THE BOSTON POST CANE



On August 2, 1909, Mr. Edwin A. Grozier, Publisher of the Boston Post, a newspaper, forwarded to the Board of Selectmen in 700 towns* (no cities included) in New England a goldheaded ebony cane with the request that it be presented with the compliments of the Boston Post to the oldest male citizen of the town, to be used by him as long as he lives (or moves from the town), and at his death handed down to the next oldest citizen of the town. The cane would belong to the town and not the man who received it. In 1930, after considerable controversy, eligibility for the cane was opened to women as well.

The recipient is still **Helen Collette**, born March 31, 1906. She will retain this honor as long as she remains in Millbury even though another resident may become eligible. We will reassess the honor each November. Mrs. Collette was at our 197th Bicentennial Celebration at Scales Restaurant and blew out the candles for the Town. The original Boston Post Cane remains locked in a showcase at the Municipal Office Building. The replica of the cane that was given out, we believe, in 1996 and has not been returned.



The Millbury Housing Authority hereby presents the annual report for the fiscal year ending September 30, 2011.

CHAPTER 200-1

The Chapter 200-1 Program consists of twenty-five Cape Cod houses located on Memorial Drive. These houses were originally built to house veterans after World War II. While veterans are given a preference under this program, the units also provide safe, decent, sanitary housing at affordable rents for families of low income regardless of veteran status. The units continue to be completely occupied.

The Housing Authority pays a designated fee "in lieu of taxes" on these properties and pays the ongoing rate designated for sewer usage.

CHAPTER 705

The Housing Authority currently houses eleven low-income families under this program. Five families are housed in the scattered site properties owned by the Housing Authority and six families live in a three duplex site located on Burbank Street.

The Housing Authority pays sewerage use and real estate taxes on all of its 705 properties.

MRVP PROGRAM

At the end of September 2011 there were three individuals or families participating in the Massachusetts Rental Voucher Program. Participants in this program are entitled to a fixed voucher payment, made directly to their landlord. The voucher payment is based on the household size, income, composition and the geographical location of the rental unit. These vouchers continue to be mobile allowing participants to use the vouchers anywhere in the state.

CHAPTER 667-C

This program is made up of one hundred forty-six units of low income housing for the elderly and handicapped. Thirty-two of the units are located on Pearl Street, sixty units are located on Colonial Drive and another fifty- four units are located at 95 Elm Street. All units continue to be fully occupied.

CHAPTER 667-4

The Chapter 667-4, Congregate Housing Program, located on Colonial Drive, consists of five apartments with a total of twenty-three bedrooms. This program is designed to provide affordable housing together with supportive social and health services to help individuals maintain independent living and prevent early and unnecessary rest home or nursing home placement. It provides companionship yet offers privacy to its participants. At the end of September 2011 there were twenty-three residents living in the Congregate facility.

A separate application must be filed for this program. Applicants must first meet the same financial and age requirements as our conventional housing programs to be eligible. The Millbury Housing Authority continues to act as sponsor for the Congregate Housing Program under a grant from the Executive Office of Elder Affairs.

It is with sadness that I must report that the Adult Day Health Care facility that has been so much a part of the Congregate Housing Program will no longer be housed in Millbury. Effective September 23, 2011 the operation of the Adult Day Health Care Program will be moved to Auburn. The new management of the Auburn VNA Health Network, Inc., formerly the Auburn District Nursing Association, Inc., managers of the program for several years, has opted to move it out of Millbury and into Auburn. Built in 1989 specifically to be part of the new Congregate facility being constructed on Colonial Drive, it has provided help and respite for many elders and disabled people, both Millbury residents and those from surrounding towns. We acknowledge with gratitude the fine staff that has provided extraordinary care and services to the participants over the twenty-two years that we were privileged to be involved with this program.

MAINTENANCE

Our maintenance program involves maintenance of forty-four buildings that include one hundred eighty-nine apartments. Housing Authority maintenance personnel maintain the common areas, grounds and parking lots in our elderly developments. Families in single or duplex housing units maintain their own grounds.

Our maintenance staff consists of three full-time positions: Allen Marcell, Maintenance Coordinator, Thomas Austin and Michael Michalak, Sr., all Maintenance Mechanics 1. The dedication and excellent work performance of our maintenance department is reflected in the condition of the Housing Authority's properties.

ADMINISTRATION

Management and maintenance of all Housing Authority programs and properties is administered by the Executive Director and approved by the Board of Directors. Office hours are 8:00 A.M. to 4:00 P.M. Monday through Friday.

The administrative staff consists of one (1) part-time office clerk, Linda Vernon, and (3) full-time employees: Administrative Assistant/Program Coordinator, Judith Flynn; Congregate/Service Coordinator, Lisa Bennes; and Executive Director, Janet L. Cassidy.

REPORT OF THE ASA WATERS MANSION TASK FORCE

To the Honorable Board of Selectmen, Town Manager, and the Citizens of Millbury:

We hereby submit our Annual Report for the fiscal year of July 1, 2010 through June 30, 2011.

The severe ice and snow throughout the winter of 2010-2011 will go down in the history books as recording breaking snowfalls, cold temperatures, and ice buildups blanketed Millbury, while the month of June brought ravage tornadoes to the region. Fortunately the rugged integrity of this 1826 structure allowed the Mansion to survive through it all. During the course of this fiscal year we once again funded many improvements to this historical site including exterior painting of the eastern and southern facades, reglazing of original windows, repairs and painting of original shutters, and electrical upgrades. The Great Room floor was refinished, and various interior painting projects were completed. The original chimney was refurbished which included the removal and replacement of damaged brickwork in the stack. Many of these exterior maintenance projects were made possible from a grant through the John H. Chafee Blackstone River Valley National Heritage Corridor with matching funds provided by Millbury Savings Bank and the Friends of the Asa Waters Mansion. Most notably, as a result of an extensive capital campaign, we were able to raise atop the Mansion the fully restored widow's walk in the fall of 2010.

We hosted numerous events in conjunction with the Friends of the Asa Waters Mansion including our annual Christmas festival which showcased the restored antique sleigh that graces the grounds during the holiday season. Many teas, educational programs, and group tours were conducted throughout the year. In the spring we hosted a "First Ladies Tea" in addition to the numerous children's teas organized throughout the year featuring story books and guest readers. We received a Grant from the Millbury Cultural Council to help fund a special Veterans Day commemorative program which we are organizing for 11-11-11.

Through their efforts the Friends of the Asa Waters Mansion once again contributed to the beautification of the Mansion including the grounds and gardens. The flowers create outstanding backgrounds for family and group pictures, truly evidenced in the spring when the Mansion and its grounds are set aside for Millbury High School prom photos. We were pleased that once again a local second-grade class planted "Sara's Garden" in honor of a member of the original Waters family. As a service to our community The Friends of the Asa Waters Mansion continued their long time commitment generously volunteering their time to staff bereavement receptions this past year.

Our Director, Catherine Elliott, remains active in aggressively promoting the Mansion into new markets. She continues to serve on the Blackstone Valley Chamber of Commerce Tourism Association. The Mansion has become a primary area of interest for visitors to this region evidenced by the increase in the volume of guests journeying to the Mansion as a tourism destination.

Through all the growth and increased activity we continue to adhere to our unwavering goal of allowing Millbury Community Service Organizations to utilize the Mansion free of charge. We are pleased that at least one half of the Mansion's utilization continues to

be gratis for town organizations. We are proud to have the Millbury Women's Club and the Millbury Historical Society utilize the Mansion as their headquarters, and are pleased that a great number of Millbury's Bicentennial committee meetings are conducted within the Mansion. We are extremely grateful to the community for their continued financial donations, along with gifts of 19th century furnishings and collections to showcase throughout the Mansion. We are extremely proud that the architectural beauty of the Mansion was featured in a Massachusetts State Calendar during this fiscal year. As the fiscal year drew to an end we received notification that Carol A. Vulter, one of the founding members of the Asa Waters Task Force and current Co-President of the Friends of the Asa Waters Mansion, was to receive an Unsung Heroine Award by the Massachusetts Commission on the Status of Women for her years of volunteerism in support of the Mansion and numerous organizations and commissions within the town of Millbury. Nominated by Task Force Chair Sandy Cristo, Carol received this most deserved award at a ceremony at the Massachusetts State House in May, 2011.

The Asa Waters Task Force and the Friends of the Asa Waters Mansion collectively work together to keep the Mansion a treasure for the Town of Millbury. We thank the citizens and business community for their continued support of our endeavor in "watching an old building with care."

BUTLER FARM RE-USE COMMITTEE

To the Honorable Board of Selectmen and the Citizens of the Town of Millbury, we respectfully submit our Annual Report for the fiscal year ending July 31, 2011.

Before we begin our Annual Report The Butler Farm Re-Use Committee would once again like to Thank the many people who have supported us over the past year.

Accomplishments of The Butler Farm Re-Use Committee during the fiscal year were:

- 1. The Butler Farm is now being studied for an installation of a wind turbine. A Wind Survey test tower was erected in the spring and will remain for one year of testing.
- 2. The Town planner is in negotiations with a cell tower company. A tower will be erected on the Butler Farm property incorporating the Town radio tower.
- 3. M.E.M.A. Millbury Emergency Management Association has installed a generator to be used in an emergency with a power outage to run their Communications equipment.
- 4. Remodeling of the bathroom was completed this year. Complete with all new fixtures and flooring. New flooring was also, installed in the entry way and kitchen.
- 5. A new driveway was installed with drainage from Singletary Road entrance halfway to the Farm House.
- 6. The Committee is still working and researching the History of the Butler Farm and will decorate the interior with pictures found of the Farm. A History will be published when it is completed.
- 7. Butler Farm Fall Work Day lead by Ernest Bernard one of our Committee members was held. Approximately 30 volunteers came out to help. Bushes were cut, brush was cleared, leaves raked and weeds removed from around the property.
- 8. The landscaping and lawn mowing of 5 acres, is being done on a weekly basis by Norm Gonyea and Ernest Bernard. Many more trees and bushes have been removed away from the house and around the grounds.
- 9. The Committee once again offered a Community Garden to residents of the Town of Millbury. The Garden Committee is co chaired by Fran King and Karen Bott. The Garden plots offered were 10'x20' and could be doubled to accommodate any resident. The Garden space is limited so we offer plots on a first come first serve basis. This year every plot was assigned. Due to the high interest the Committee plans on expanding the Garden in 2012 to accommodate more Gardeners. The Committee will have the gardens tilled and limed before winter. In the spring the Committee will till and offer garden plots to the residents of Millbury. We will announce that plots are available on a first come first serve basis giving last years gardeners first refusal.
- 10. The walking trails are being groomed and are being used by residents to walk and exercise their dogs. We ask that residents be courteous and pick up after their pets while on the property. Thank You.

- 11. A new updated accurate map of the trails is being created and will be available to the public upon arriving at the Farm. The maps will be located in the map box in front of the garage. This map box was installed by a Boy Scout from a past Eagle Project.
- 12. Various types of Carpentry work has been done to the Farm House, including new cellar windows.







BICENTENNIAL COMMITTEE

As most of you are reading about our efforts in 2011, we will be getting ready to embark on our yearlong celebration of Millbury's 200th year of incorporation. Our kickoff for the celebration is Saturday, June 16th, 2012 with a concert by the Massachusetts Symphony Orchestra at Windle Field from 7:00 to 9:00 pm.

In order to get to this point, the MBC (Millbury Bicentennial Committee) Board met eight times during 2011 as we continued to plan for the events that we hope will generate interest, involvement and excitement as we celebrate a 200th like no other. As noted in our annual report last year, most of the detail work for this celebration has been done by the four main committees of the MBC. They have met monthly and have worked diligently in organizing and preparing for our 200th birthday.

The Finance/Fundraising Committee headed by Rob Morton, Executive Vice-President of the Millbury Savings Bank, has done incredible work in helping us get closer to our goal of raising \$300,000. At the end of 2011, we had raised in contributions and in pledges over \$250,000. Our hope is that we will have raised the entire \$300,000 by the time our celebratory year commences. This amount reflects the significant pledges of Millbury's businesses and organizations to the tune of just over \$200,000. In addition, we have raised nearly \$18,000, from individual contributions and nearly \$10,000 from other businesses and groups in Millbury as well. We held our Third Annual Wine Tasting in October, 2011 bringing in approximately \$5000.00 in net profit. In June, Paul DiCicco chaired our Golf Tournament at the Blackstone National Golf Course raising close to \$6,000.00. The sales of our commemorative items have been helpful as well. We continue to sell The Limited Edition MBC Vaillancourt Santa, of which only 200 are being produced, for \$150.00. Don't wait until we've sold out. Commemorative Coins for this event were introduced in the Spring of 2011. The combination set of the 1976 (200th national bicentennial) Sterling Silver and the MB 2013 (our 200th bicentennial) nickel with antique silver plated coins has sold out. We have more of the bronze set and the single pure silver Millbury Bicentennial coins on sale. These are available at our town financial institutions. In addition, the clothing apparel with the MB logo on them, as well as wooden cutouts of Millbury buildings, glassware, ornaments, continue to be on sale at Ray's True Value. Reproductions of the Millbury Centennial book (1813-1913) are still available as well. During the year's celebration, we will introduce other commemorative items as well. In July, 2011 we released the MBC Thermometer in the Center of Town. (Thanks to Tom Lee for its construction and to the National Bank for allowing us to use their land for its display.)

Our Media Committee, chaired by Paul Raffa, continues to update our brochures, produce articles for the newspapers, Millbury Public Access channel, and social networking through emails, enewsletters, facebook, etc. We continue to seek members to help out with technology, to refine the website and simply to get the word out. The Millbury Bicentennial website is www.millbury2013.com.

The Events Committee, chaired by Ron Marlborough and Lynn Winston, has been organizing several events which will highlight our celebration. (A listing of all events,

dates and locations on back page of report.) The Classical Concert Committee has finalized our first event which will be held on Saturday, June 16th at Windle Field. Lynn Winston and Bill Kane have made arrangements with the Massachusetts Symphony Orchestra to help start off our festivities for the year. At the conclusion of the event, there will be a firework display, as well.

In cooperation with the Millbury Fireman's Muster, the MBC is organizing a Balloon Festival for August 24-26, 2011. Cyndi Burr and Jamie Rembiszewski are chairing this event. They have coordinated with a balloon meister who will bring in as many as 15 balloonists which can accommodate flights and tethered experiences. All of this will run in conjunction with the Millbury Firefighters' festivities at the end of August. In the Fall, we have two weekend events scheduled. The first is in conjunction with the Millbury Improvement Initiative, chaired by Cyndi Burr. On Saturday, October 13th, the 50th class reunion (class of 1963) will sponsor a Sock Hop at the Millbury High School gymnasium and on Sunday, October 14th, the annual Auto Festival will be held at Windle Field. On the following weekend, there will be a Revolutionary War Reenactment here in Millbury mainly on property owned by the Pearson family in West Millbury. On Oct. 20 and 21, over 600 reenactors are expected to represent both the American and British forces. Our thanks to Paul Raffa for chairing this event and for the cooperation of local reenactors in making this happen. Pay attention for more details.

The Ball Committee, headed by Matt Mulhane and Armand White, met bimonthly during the year. Its subcommittees have been discussing and deciding on the food, the decorations, the entertainment, the invitations, the tickets, the program, and the many other features that will make up the gala Ball for our 200th anniversary. Keep Saturday, April 6, 2013 at Mechanics Hall in Worcester open. The Ball Committee is working very hard to keep this event at a reasonable expense for such a large and important opportunity for celebration. It will be a semi-formal event, although those who are able are encouraged to come in period costume. Stay tuned as more and more details come forth.

Our final activities that we're organizing presently include a Birthday Party on a Saturday in June, 2013 (TBD). This event is still in the planning stages with Brian Ashmankus as chairman. It would include several events in the center of town during the course of the day with a birthday celebration in the evening including a birthday cake contest and a large birthday cake celebration at the Asa Waters Mansion. On Sunday, June 23, we will hold our bicentennial parade. Bill Kane and Ron Marlborough are already pursuing bands. Ideas for floats, organizations, and other activities for the parade will be addressed early in 2013, but if you have any of these ideas or suggestions, please forward them to members of the parade committee. Another suggestion that is being discussed is using the bicentennial to bring former residents back to Millbury for that weekend by setting up class reunions or family reunions. If there is sufficient interest, the MBC can help in making this happen.

Much of our celebration will help bring Millbury's history, its 200 years as Millbury, to everyone's attention. We often look at history in terms of world, national or even state

events. Millbury's history is more compelling than most of us know. The History Committee chaired by Carole Chiras and Frank Gagliardi and their committee are working in bringing our history to everyone's attention. They have put together a tour of West Millbury that will begin in July, 2012. By van, you will have a chance to get a guided tour of the Millbury Common, the headwaters of the Blackstone River and Ramshorn Pond, the Grass Hill area, the Mill Street and mill houses, Singletary Lake and Brierly Pond, and the Bramanville section of town. A walking tour of Millbury Center is in the works as well. And, Millbury will have its own book thanks to Chris Sinacola who is in the process of putting together a pictorial history of Millbury with Arcadia Press. This book should be available for sale in the Fall of 2012. In addition, the committee is working with the schools in Millbury in producing curricula related to Millbury and its history.

Another separate committee was formed during the course of the year as well. The Photography Committee headed by Armand White will help to preserve the memories of Millbury and its bicentennial. If you enjoy taking pictures or videos, either join this committee or make your photos/videos available to the committee. Although we expect thousands of pictures, it's our hope that we can compile a memory DVD of our celebration. Please understand that the quality of the picture as well as the importance of the event will determine its inclusion in any final product. In short, help preserve the memory of this year by sharing your pictures with us.

As you can see, there is much in the works and there's more to do to make this celebration one for the memories of all Millbury residents past, present and future. The bottom line is that we can all make this a singular event in our lives, one for the ages. Now is the time to step forward and volunteer to help make these events and others the means of making Millbury the community that we know it to be. We continue to encourage participation of church groups, school and student driven activities, civic organizations, and the myriad of businesses and organizations that involve our youth through our senior citizens. Although we will celebrate our 225th and 250th anniversaries, the opportunity to remember the 200th has a luster of its own. Get involved, participate, help make this a time to celebrate now, but one to remember in the future.

We continue to work and develop meaningful educational opportunities for all students at all levels despite the fiscal challenges affecting all school districts.



Despite the lack of adequate federal, state and local fiscal resources for the Millbury Public Schools, the administration and staff, with significant community support, continued to move the district forward in many ways during the 2010-2011 school year. Many of the successes were the result of three continuous years of planning, preparing and analyzing well, the academic needs of all students, the facility needs of the three school buildings to optimize student learning and the most appropriate distribution of staff, despite lay-offs, to maintain student/teacher ratios and effective engagement and instructional practices.

School districts throughout the country have faced the same challenges for the past three years, given the economic downturn, beginning with the 2008-2009 school year. Many of the state analysts believe that this recent fiscal downturn has been as financially challenging, if not more so, than the early 1980s, when Proposition 2 ½ went into effect in Massachusetts. As an educator and administrator during both periods, I would agree. However, what makes the Millbury Public Schools unique is the thoughtful planning about how best to utilize dwindling resources, the implementing of utility cost-efficiencies that are fixed costs in any school budget, and repeatedly examining the most effective and efficient use of every dollar. Every decision, regarding programs, buildings and how best to use the district's fiscal resources met the most important standard in the district, which was "will students benefit from the decision?"

The district's major success during 2010-2011, occurred because of the district's position that increased academic achievement for every student is the most important goal. In Millbury, implementing that goal, combined with its numerous actions, drove the success of the *Elmwood Street Elementary* and *Raymond E. Shaw Schools* to meet the federal standard of achieving Adequate Yearly Progress. Succinctly stated, both schools have reached the specific goal set by the federal government for the Millbury Schools in 2011, which puts the district on the path of having its students reach the advanced or proficient categories of the Massachusetts Comprehensive Assessment System (MCAS) by the year 2014. However, the efficient work regarding improved teaching and learning must continue in order to move all students to the categories of Proficient or Advanced so that they will read, write and perform mathematical tasks to remain competitive in the worldwide employment market, demanding 21st century skills and remain life-long learners.

This primary goal of improving literacy skills across the district was defined and embraced by all administrators and staff. A District Literacy Team was formed first, with Building Literacy Teams to follow. Much of the professional development on this topic has been provided by the Keys to Literacy Company, as improved literacy skills became the district's number 1 three year-long goal. The individual building plans supported the District Literacy Plan which established goals for content teachers to apply a specific set

of research based vocabulary and comprehension instructional strategies in their classrooms, analyzing word structures and teaching word parts, teaching strategies for

using context to determine word meaning and selecting district-wide literacy assessments.

Another success was realized, when the Millbury Community voted to approve a Warrant Article for \$135,000 to provide ADA accessible doors at the Shaw School. At this time, the Raymond E. Shaw School educates a number of disabled students, both in wheelchairs and those with limited mobility. Navigating through the heavy internal doors at Shaw has never been an independent task for any disabled student. This request had been withheld by the school department, in previous years, because of competing requests for limited dollars. The students, their families and the entire district greatly appreciated the support of the residents for their overwhelming approval of this Warrant Article. Work will commence during the fall of 2011 to install the internal doors and all necessary electrical upgrades associated by January 2012.

Once again, the Millbury Parents Club raised \$40,000 to support programs within the schools. Given the economy, fundraising for any organization is a daunting task, but the Parents Club persevered, planned and recruited volunteers to assist in raising money to pay for buses during class field trips. Transportation is the most costly part of any field trip and without this level of support, grade levels would not be able to participate in field trips that are a distinct part of the curriculum at a particular grade level. It goes without saying that the school district also recognizes that parents and extended families, give of themselves and reach into their wallets to support the Parents' Club's fundraising events. A mere *thank you* is certainly not enough to express the district's appreciation.

A number of additional successes were realized in individual schools. The examples that follow represent the type of programs, services and activities that engage students to succeed, learn new skills, remain focused while in school and ultimately, lead to graduation.

Elmwood Street Elementary School

A Community Service Learning Grant funded the 2nd year of a Cultural Fair, established by teachers, Ms. Kate Ryan and Mr. Norm Chalupka. Selected 3rd grade students study the cultural aspects of a country of their choosing and present to parents and guests, the different aspects of that particular culture. The program has become so popular and not all 3rd graders are able to participate because of limited teaching staff available to work with students after school. However, further examination will occur to determine how the school may be able to expand the program to include more 3rd grade students.

Under the direction of Mrs. Kate Tetzel, Music Teacher, the 3rd grade also performed a play entitled "Massachusetts, My Home", which provided historical events from the Pilgrims in 1621, through the period of 1775 and the Sons of Liberty in Boston, up to 1930, depicting a Farm in Deerfield.

The Elmwood School offered a Whole School Literacy Challenge, in conjunction with the Worcester Sharks and their mascot, FINZ. Each grade level was assigned a different

reading challenge for three months and awards were given to the Top Reader in each grade.

Kindergarten and 1st grade concerts and 2nd and 3rd grade plays were a highlight for parents and families, but more importantly, demonstrated the talents of so many students and built the foundation for the arts in future years. These activities/events are many of the best examples to engage students in learning.

Disability Awareness Day has become an annual event, under the direction of Mrs. Karla Belliveau, special education teacher. All homerooms were invited into the gymnasium and progressed through stations to participate in a simulation of disabilities, such as blindness, hearing loss, limited mobility and or communication differences. Not only did students learn of the challenges that face so many of their friends and classmates, but they also learned the importance of tolerance and fully accepting those who may learn, move or communicate differently.

And of course, a wonderful time was had by all at the annual Halloween Parade which draws parents, grandparents, siblings, aunts and uncles and neighbors!

Raymond E. Shaw School

Due to the kindness of the Millbury Parents' Club, field trips to the State House and the YMCA were provided to grade 4 and to grade 5 to attend Mechanics Hall and see the Freedom Train. Additionally, Old Sturbridge Village and a Native American Storyteller presented to grade 4. Camp Bournedale, a science exploration and adventure program was well attended by the 6th graders, as their customary right of passage before moving on to the Junior High School.

Monthly Student Assemblies were held, providing students an opportunity to be recognized for displaying DREAM Pledge behavior. In addition, students continued to meet with high levels of success, in assuming responsibility for their own behaviors, with the support of the Positive Behavioral Intervention Systems (PBIS) Program embedded within each and every Shaw School day.

The Shaw chorus and band performed at the Asa Waters Chain of Lights Celebration, providing all participating students with a larger venue in which to demonstrate their talents and enthusiasm for the holiday season.

Shaw Night was a big hit at the Millbury High School Football Game, offering tremendous support to the players and cheerleaders and at the same time introducing another dose of Woolie Pride spirit to students in grades 4-6.

In keeping with the district's Literacy initiative, the Literacy Door Decorating Contest was held in June and has already become a huge success, after only two years! Each classroom chooses a book and the class, not the teacher, decides on a theme and

determines how to decorate their classroom door, depicting that theme. The fact that this activity was also a contest contributes to the enthusiasm.

Millbury Memorial Junior/Senior High School

Due to the generosity of the Blackstone Valley Education Foundation grant of \$500, the school store opened for the first time, in conjunction with the new Marketing course at the high school. Students were able to earn 3 college credits if they achieved a B or above and then could use the credit at Quinsigamond Community College.

The Millbury High School student art work was again chosen to be used for the team shirts at the Shrewsbury American Cancer Relay for Life.

The Robotics Team qualified and competed in their first national tournament, the VEX Robotics World Championships in Florida. Also in the Science department, an increased number of students enrolled in AP Biology and AP Chemistry, while the majority of the Graduating Class of 2011 enrolled in more than the required 3 years of science.

The Freshman and Varsity Math Teams once again competed in the Worcester County Math League. The Freshman Team was comprised of thirteen 7th and 8th graders, but no Freshman and 8th grader, Cherry McKenna was the top finisher, placing 90th out of 300 participants.

Two students, Charles Surette and Katherine McKenna attended Massachusetts Student Government Day at the State House to shadow some of the elected officials and learn how bills are voted on Beacon Hill. In addition, Millbury Student Government Day, under the direction of Mr. Jeff Lyon, Social Studies Department Head, provided an opportunity for 50 students to shadow town and school officials and learn some of the responsibilities and tasks for which those officials are responsible.

The Best Buddies Program at the Junior/Senior High School became fully chartered. Programs such as the Best Buddie Prom, cookouts and trips to shows at the theater have become embedded in the curriculum.

Once again, due to the long-standing generosity of the Millbury Parents' Club, every 7th grade student attended a live stage production of Charles Dickens' classic, A Christmas Carol, at the Hanover Theater in Worcester.

The many concerts and plays were certainly fabulous entertainment for the community. Under the direction of Mr. Dan Ferreira and Mr. James Rollins, a variety of unique and challenging selections were provided, where increased student skill was definitely highlighted. The High School production, You're a Good Man Charlie Brown, under the direction of Mr. Dan Ferreira and Mr. Ryan Sullivan, was entertaining and well performed. The Junior High Play, The Wizard of Oz, under the direction of Jane Kerins and Nicol Boria, featured much of the enthusiasm of junior high school students and the talents that will be greatly welcomed by the theater arts department at the high school.

No one can imagine the number of hours, the long evenings and weekends and the intensity of the work with students by the teachers and staff that are needed to produce the quality of the productions for which Millbury Junior/Senior High School is known.

A first time, and hopefully annual event, occurred at the High School in March, 2010. Millbury was asked to host the Destination Imagination Regional Annual Tournament. Three Millbury Teams competed against 68 teams at various age levels. Significant preplanning occurred in order to accommodate the number of teams and their need for preparation and demonstration space. The organization provided by the regional DI staff was exceptional and allowed all participants and attendees to fully enjoy the full day event.

The Millbury High School Athletic programs and athletes continued to make their mark on Central Massachusetts. The Girls Soccer Team, coached by Andy Burnett won the SWCL East League and advanced to the District Championship game. The Girls Volleyball Team, coached by Mike McKeon won the SWCL Championship. The Girls Basketball Team, coached by Steve Reno, won the SWCL East League, the 5th consecutive District Championship and then advanced to the 4th consecutive State Championship.

As you will note from this partial list of events and activities, students are provided with many opportunities to focus their talents and become involved in activities for just pure interest. The events listed above are only a sample of the effective and important programs that engage students and in some cases, maintain their interest in remaining in school.

The last portion of this report is intended to inform the community about the significant reductions made in the school budget, from 2009 - 2012. Because of the recent economic conditions, the school district has needed to reduce the personnel, supplies/materials and professional development line-items by \$1,065,100. These are the only line-items that do not reflect fixed costs, such as transportation, utilities and fuel and out-of-district school tuitions. During the 2009-2010 fiscal year, the total school budget increased by \$48,000, however, because of the increase in fixed costs, other line-items, such as personnel, instructional supplies/materials and professional development were reduced by \$491,200.

As a result, the district has incurred the losses represented below:

The school district has not been able to restore any of the 14.3 FTE positions lost, nor have any dollars been added to the supplies/materials or professional development lineitems. In addition, all administrators voluntarily declined the increases in their contracts, for three consecutive years, during the fiscal years 2010 - 2012 and by doing so, saved the district \$84,500.

Simply stated, the school district cannot continue to absorb similar losses in future years and maintain appropriate student/teacher ratios in classrooms and the quality and variety of academic classes and services that the parents and community have enjoyed in the past.

Fiscal Year 2011 Annual Report

GATEWAY TO SUCCESS: At Valley Tech, students are given every opportunity guiding them toward a bright future and career path. A comprehensively motivated group of individuals comprise our staff and administrators, blended seamlessly with a group of highly motivated students, make it possible for Valley Tech to enjoy a strong reputation for success. Along with continued support from the community, including households and businesses, the invaluable experience and knowledge base of the instructional staff, and dedicated group of leadership team members feed the ever-growing hunger for knowledge of Valley Tech students and promote a true desire for everyone to learn on a daily basis.

In Fiscal Year 2011 (FY11) (July 1, 2010 – June 30, 2011), students, staff, and administrators continued to advance a reputation of achieving data verified accomplishments. This report details and highlights several of those accomplishments, while reinforcing that Valley Tech constantly looks toward the future to promote 21st century workforce advancements via the pinnacle of improvement techniques.

Economic woes continue to plague the Commonwealth and our nation, but Valley Tech remains committed to providing quality education to a growing population. This is achieved by aggressively pursuing all possible non-taxpayer revenues. Valley Tech's FY11 budget, unanimously approved by each of its 13 member towns, reflected an overall increase of just 2.68 percent. During this year, future planning established the FY12 budget with an overall increase of just 1.99 percent.

Valley Tech, your vocational technical system, is proud to serve the needs of the Blackstone Valley and feed a quality labor force for the future. Our rigorous academic curriculum integrates student competencies with the advanced skill of the vocational technical instruction to create a well-rounded education.

administration of the Massachusetts Comprehensive Assessment System (MCAS) tests to members of the Class of 2012 showed that for the tenth straight year Valley Tech students made noteworthy gains in reaching proficiency on the MCAS. Federal legislation requires all students to reach Advanced or Proficient in mathematics and English language arts by the year 2014. Eighty-nine percent in math and eighty-nine percent in English language arts reached that level on the first attempt in Valley Tech's Class of 2012. The data reflected a five percent increase in math and three percent increase in English language arts proficiency over Valley Tech's Class of 2011. The percentages of students who scored at Advanced or Proficient levels are well above the state averages of 75 percent in math and 78 percent in

English. On the science and technology/engineering test, which the DESE has made a third requirement to receive a high school diploma, Valley Tech's Class of 2012 reached a proficiency percentage of 82, well above the state average of 65 percent.

Recently released results of spring 2010 Advanced Placement testing yielded a record number of Valley Tech students achieving qualifying exam scores. This demonstrates Valley Tech's continued dedication to a rigorous academic curriculum and the ability of our students to reach new levels of success.

Valley Tech opened its post-secondary Practical Nursing program in September 2009, following full approval from the Massachusetts Department of Elementary and Secondary Education. On January 13, 2011 the members of the first Practical Nursing class at Blackstone Valley Regional Vocational Technical High School took their biggest steps toward a career in the medical field – a walk across the stage to receive their certificates and pins. The 19 students who graduated attended the 16-month, evening program three days a week and their monthly clinical experiences, many of them while working full-time.

At the prestigious National SkillsUSA Championships in Kansas City, Missouri, Valley Tech recorded podium finishes for the eighth time in the last nine years with two students securing gold medals and four students capturing silver medals. All seven of the 2011 student representatives from Valley Tech placed in the top 10 for their respective competitions. Daniel Serafin, a 2011 graduate from Millbury, won the gold medal in the Plumbing competition. Stephanie Rivard of Northbridge took the gold medal in the Technical Drafting competition. Valley Tech's Community Service team, under the direction of English and History Team Leader Rosemary Quirk, won the silver for its school year-long campaign promoting respect in the school and in the community with its project entitled Respect Y.E.S! (Yourself, Environment, Society). The three-person team included Elizabeth Belanger of Northbridge, Mollie Letendre of Hopedale, and Melissa Burdick of Northbridge. Marissa Bunnewith of Millbury won the silver medal in the Commercial Baking competition. Andrew Cardin of Sutton finished 4th in the nation in Welding.

NUMBERS REFLECT CONSERVATIVE APPROACH: The District's operating budget for FY11 was developed with sensitivity to the continued financial challenges faced by our 13 member towns and designed to maximize stakeholder investment. It accommodated a 4.80% increase in students to be served, yet was held to a 2.68% overall increase.

The District's FY11 total operating budget was \$18,949,245. Chapter 70 Aid was expected to contribute \$7,631,018 and Minimum Contributions from the 13 member towns totaled \$8,592,069.

In the operation portion of the budget but outside DESE Net School Spending areas, the District budgeted \$623,086 for transportation costs and \$799,372 for retiree medical coverage, and deferred the acquisition of capital assets. This was offset by \$615,512 in regional student transportation funds received from the Commonwealth. In addition to their state-required Minimum Contributions, the member towns unanimously supported the school's operating budget with shared assessments for operations, student transportation, and retiree medical.

In response to the ongoing financial crisis, the State reduced its initial Chapter 70 State Aid estimates by \$301,139; however this reduction was offset by a \$28,598 increase in Chapter 71 Transportation Aid, \$39,350 in ARRA-State Fiscal Stabilization Funds, and \$193,718 in Ed Jobs Funds. In addition to staffing efficiencies, the District is diligent in seeking out competitive pricing for the purchase of supplies, technology, and other contractual services. These efforts allowed the District to utilize \$236,500 of unreserved fund balance as a direct offset to member assessments. Finally, Valley Tech secured approximately \$1.2 Million in grants and private donations to provide additional educational investments and vocational instructional equipment.

Gonynor, Cosmetology; Daniel E. Grant, Auto Body; Amanda L. Gunnard, Cosmetology; Eli W. Lemoine, Manufacturing Technology; Zachary J. Miller, Plumbing; Mathieu V. Schwartz, Graphic Communications; Daniel J. Serafin, Plumbing; Patric J. Yaghoobian, Electrical.

VALUABLE LEADERSHIP: Valley Tech's School Committee, comprised of 13 dedicated individuals, proves invaluable in overseeing District operations. Committee members are elected to four-year terms in biennial voting across the District. Our students benefit from their experience and expertise representing an array of industry occupations, which contributes to the success of Valley Tech and always improves the school.
