

The Board of Selectmen held 19 regular meetings and 12 special selectmen's meetings. Chairman E. Bernard Plante was absent for one meeting; Vice-Chairman Francis B. King was present for all; Clerk Kenneth I. Schold was absent for one meeting; Brian W. Stowell was absent for four meetings; Brian M. Ashmankas was present for all and newly elected member Sandy J. Cristo was present for all meetings.

The Town saw many retirements this fiscal year including Paula Aspinwall, Marie Boire and Dennis Piel retired from the Assessors Department, Jeff Dore from the Fire Department and Chief Matthew Belsito left Millbury to become the full-time Fire Chief in Sutton, as well as many teachers. Our heartfelt thanks go out to each of these dedicated employees. The Town also lost some very important people in Millbury this year including Richard Plante and Harold Ostrowski.

We had a lot of changes at the Municipal Office Building: Sanders Genna was appointed as Assistant Assessor, Mark Moore was appointed Chief of Police, Thomas Hall was promoted to Sergeant. We also hired two new Police Officers, Keith Gasco and Jacob Webb. There were also many new recruits for our fire department. We wish all of our new hires long and productive careers here in Millbury.

The Annual Town Election was held on Tuesday, April 24, 2012. Selectman Francis King was up for re-election, Selectmen Kenneth Schold decided not to run for another term; Frank Irr and Sandy Cristo ran for a seat. Francis King came in first place followed by Sandy Cristo.

The Annual Town Meeting was held on Tuesday, May 1, 2012. The town approved an almost \$35 million budget, funded a new street sweeper, finally accepted Cronin Brook streets and took the position of Chief of Police out of civil service.

The town was awarded 'Green Community' distinction and the Energy Advisory Committee was awarded a \$167,000.00 grant for energy projects, we are still in the process of determining the feasibility of a wind turbine at the Butler Farm to utilize the wind for electricity at the town buildings and a cell tower.

Student Government Day was again a great success with the students who chose to be Selectmen for the day; they learned that our decisions are not easy, it takes great balance and much thought to do what is best for the whole Town and not just one area or citizen.

In closing, we wish to express our appreciation for the cooperation and assistance given to us by the various departments within town government. We particularly wish to thank the unpaid and often unrecognized appointed officials who contribute to the mechanics of government and help make Millbury a better community.

The Selectmen holds its regular meetings on the second and fourth Tuesdays of each month. These meetings are televised live on local access channel 13 Charter and channel 26 Verizon. Concerned citizens are encouraged to attend.

#### REPORT OF THE BUILDING DEPARTMENT



The Building Inspector, Robert J. Blackman, is appointed annually by the Millbury Town Manager (Millbury Town Charter) to administer and enforce the Massachusetts State Building Code, 780 CMR, under the provisions of Massachusetts General Laws, Chapter 30A.

The Building Inspector and his assistants administer and enforce Appendix D, Zoning, of the Millbury Town By-Laws (Appendix D, Articles 1 through 5, inclusive, of the Millbury Town By-Laws).

The Wiring Inspector, Larry Morris and his assistant, Andy Waszkiewicz are appointed annually by the Millbury Town Manager (Millbury Town Charter) to administer and enforce the Massachusetts Electrical Code, 527 CMR 12.00 under the provisions of the Massachusetts General Laws, Chapter 143, Section 31, annotated.

The Plumbing/Gas Inspector, Gregory Gauthier and his assistant, Brian Gasco are appointed by the Millbury Town Manager (Millbury Town Charter) to administer and enforce the Massachusetts State Plumbing Code 248 CMR 2.00 and the Massachusetts Fuel Gas Code, 248 CMR 3.00 through 8.00 under the provisions of Massachusetts General Laws, Chapter 142, Section 13, annotated.

# **Administration Division**

Mr. McNeil serves as the Department's administrative connection to the general public, as well as various Commissions, Boards, and Associations that interact directly with public works. Mr. McNeil is assisted by Head Clerk Cindy Allard and Operation Manager Matt Stencel.

#### **Cemeteries Division**

The Cemetery Commission is responsible for the three town cemeteries; Central Cemetery located at the end of Waters Street, County Bridge Cemetery located at the intersection of Riverlin and Providence Streets, and Dwinell Cemetery located on Dwinell Road. The Cemetery also lost 2 great people that did a lot for the Cemetery, Richard Plante, past Cemetery Commissioner and Ray Ledoux, labor. Seasonal labor maintains the cemetery grounds. There were 36 burials at the Central Cemetery in fiscal year 2012. Burial rights to forty lots were sold totaling \$10,750.00 in revenue. The trust fund balances as of June 30, 2012 are as follows:

#### **Gas & Diesel Fuel Station**

The current gas & diesel fuel station is located at 137 Providence Street and is an underground storage tank (UST) scheduled for replacement with an aboveground storage tank (AST) for fueling our town's vehicle fleet. This project is forecasted for the spring/summer of 2013.

# **Highway Division**

The Division is responsible for all public ways and infrastructure within the Town. Seasonal work consists of sanding streets and plowing snow, sweeping streets, cleaning catch basins, repairing, replacing, and mapping drainage infrastructure, dam operation & maintenance, roadside mowing, maintenance of Veterans monuments, asphalt repairs, repairing and replacing signs, line painting and various other tasks as assigned. Also, DPW had contractors repair the roof on the highway garage located at 137 Providence St. Full-time staff includes Keith Caruso, Scott Elie, Joe Kosiba & Norma Madore. Mike Murray left the Highway Division for a position with the Millbury Housing Authority and the DPW welcomed newcomer Mike Cicale.

# Maintenance & Operations - Chapter 90 Projects Completed

Stowe Road drainage easement is currently being negotiated. The Town obtained a drainage easement on Auburn Road; construction is expected in spring of 2013. DPW reconstructed the following streets, Miles Street, Prospect Street, Highland Street, Lincoln Avenue, Leone Avenue, Budreau Avenue, Lindy Street, Park Street, and Walling Avenue.

#### Parks & Playgrounds

The Parks Division, staffed by Lead Carl Ward and several seasonal employees, maintains the Washington Street Park, the Greenwood Street Park, the Jacques Park and the East Millbury Park, the Route 146 Soccer Field, as well as the Tot Lot on Millbury Avenue. This consists of five ball fields and soccer fields. They also maintain the Town Common, Town Library and the Asa Waters Mansion grounds. This year Millbury graciously hosted State Little League Semi-Final and District Final games. Our popular Farmers market was held weekly on the Town Common throughout the summer. The result of this Division's dedication and effort is several beautiful and useful areas for the residents to enjoy recreation, athletics, and assembly.

#### **Sewer Division**

The Sewer Division continued to study to reduce the infiltration and inflow of groundwater and storm water runoff into the sewer lines. The Sewer Division also replaced the Grafton Street Pump Station.

The Millbury Sewer Division was led this year by Matt Stencel the new Operation Manager and our long serving and dedicated Sewer Superintendent Brad Lange retired after almost 40 years. Mr. Stencel is assisted by Lead Foreman James Piscitelli and sewer workers Frank Stachura and Eric LeClaire. This team is responsible for the maintenance and operation of over 50 miles of sewer lines and 15 pump stations which serve 3,452 customers. The average daily flow is approximately 1,000,000 gallons per day.

# **Snow and Ice**

The Department responded to an early snow in October followed by an unseasonably warm winter with little snow, but sanded, salted, plowed what snow was had from around Town with Town staff and private contractors.

#### **Solid Waste Management - Transfer Station**

This Division is staffed by Lead Foreman Bob Roy and worker Bill Berthiaume. All trash is collected and hauled to the Wheelabrator facility by the Transfer Station staff. This has resulted in a cost savings to the Town of approximately \$50,000.00 per year. The metal recyclable program continues to be a profit making venture for the town with just over 80 tons of steel removed and over \$16,000.00 collected. Recycling is mandatory and residents also have clothing recycling vendors available to them onsite. A total of 2,927.00 tons of trash was hauled to Wheelabrator by the Town Transfer Station in FY 2012.

#### **Street Lighting**

The Department coordinates maintenance and repair of faulty street lights with NGRID around Millbury.

#### **Tree Warden**

Tree Warden Ron Despres is responsible for public shade trees and works very hard to maintain the tree canopy throughout the town which is beneficial to all residents. The Tree Warden identifies dead and diseased trees and coordinates their removal. Stump grinding is completed by outside contractors once a backlog has accumulated.

#### **Assignment of Fields**

The Parks Commission is responsible for the assignment of town fields for various sports leagues. A field assignment meeting for spring/summer use is held in late winter and is followed by the regularly scheduled meeting in March at which time the assignments are made. The field assignment meeting for the fall is normally held during a regularly scheduled summer meeting of the Parks Commission. This year the parks were home to baseball, softball, basketball and soccer teams. Washington Street Park hosted the State Little League Semi-Final and District Final games.

## July 4th Road Race

Every year on the 4<sup>th</sup> of July, the Parks Commission sponsors a road race for all age groups. The race begins at the High School and ends at Windle Field. The first 100 participants are given a free T-shirt and trophies are awarded.

#### **Millbury Town Common**

#### APPROVAL NOT REQUIRED PLANS

There were two (2) plans filed under Chapter 41, Section 81P of the General Laws, Approval Not Required, during Fiscal Year 2012. These plans represent perimeter surveys, division of land with adequate frontage on public streets as required by the Millbury Zoning Bylaws, easement descriptions, or lot-line modifications.

#### SPECIAL PERMITS/SITE PLAN REVIEW

There are numerous situations and proposals that require a Special Permit or Site Plan Review. The town's zoning bylaw lists the criteria for making these decisions, based on the Board's analysis of extensive technical and public input. Below is a summary of the various special permits and site plan review permits applied for during the fiscal year, and the Board's decisions:

Accessory Dwelling Special Permits: Two (2) applications were filed under this section of the Zoning Bylaw, and were approved, with conditions, for one additional dwelling unit on Hayward Glen Drive and one additional dwelling unit on Sullivan Place.

*Sign Special Permit:* One application for a sign special permit was approved: Millbury Federated Church, 20 Main Street.

Site Plan Review/Stormwater Management Permits: Six (6) applications were approved, with conditions: 6 Latti Farm Road, to construct and operate an educational/training facility; 1 – 5 Elm Street, to construct a Dunkin Donuts restaurant with a drive-thru window; 130 Westborough Street, for the processing and recycling of stone, masonry, and concrete; 29 McGrath Road, to construct a solar farm; 71/73A McCracken Road, to construct a church on two parcels; 16 South Main Street, to permit the operation of a bank branch and the upgrade of the existing VFW function hall.

#### **SUBDIVISIONS**

One (1) application was approved for a Definitive Subdivision, under the Sequin process, which required a frontage waiver from the Planning Board: 3 Colton Road, creating one additional building lot.

The Millbury Conservation Commission is responsible for administering the Massachusetts Wetlands Protection Act, M.G.L. Chapter 131, Section 40, as it relates to issues in the Town of Millbury. All public hearings and public meetings concerning the filing of a Notice of Intent (NOI), an Abbreviated Notice of Resource Area Delineation (ANORAD) or a Request for Determination of Applicability (RDA) continue to be advertised, generally, in the Millbury-Sutton Chronicle.

In March 2010, the Conservation Commission completed the acquisition of a 15-acre, archeologically-sensitive, undeveloped parcel that, together with a non-contiguous 10-acre forested parcel, serve as the newest additions to the Brierly Pond Conservation Area. The conservation area now consists of nearly 100 contiguous acres of protected open space within walking distance of two of Millbury's oldest village neighborhoods, Old Common and Bramanville, and one of its newest, Brierly Pond Village. In order to raise the \$240,000 necessary to purchase the property, the Conservation Commission partnered with the Metacomet Land Trust, the Millbury Improvement Initiative and the Friends of Millbury Open Spaces, which is an ad-hoc group of volunteers who coordinated the fundraising campaign. Grant monies were received from the MA Division of Conservation Services LAND Grant Program, an anonymous foundation, GWCF Water & Land Stewardship Fund, Fields Pond Foundation, and the Heritage Partnership

Program. To supplement the grant monies, the project partners obtained nearly \$30,000 in donations from local businesses and residents. The Millbury Department of Public Works and a local contractor, Mike Bernard, also donated materials and labor to construct a new gravel parking area at the new trailhead off of Old Common Road. The Conservation Commission is in the process of developing a detailed map to be used for future development of this parcel for passive recreation.

The Conservation Commission continues to encourage all to use the Town's Conservation areas for passive recreation such as hiking and bird watching. The Police Department should be notified if any hunting or use of A.T.V. vehicles is noticed on these lands. Civic groups and individuals volunteering to help maintain or establish new trails are always welcomed and greatly appreciated.

The Conservation Commission can be reached by dialing 508-865-5411 at the Municipal Office Building. If no one is available, you may leave a message on our answering machine. The Commission normally meets on the first and third Wednesday evening of each month beginning at 7:00 p.m. One meeting a month is generally scheduled in July and August. Comments and inquiries from the public are always welcome.

#### MILLBURY PUBLIC LIBRARY

The Millbury Public Library wishes to thank all our patrons, friends and the Town of Millbury for a very busy and successful year. Thanks also to the Friends of the Millbury Public Library, The Millbury Cultural Council, Mary B. Grogan Grant, Rosemary Davis Grant, Beginning Years Family Network with YMCA and those who have donated to the library financially and through book donations.

The Library has been repainted and landscaped thanks to the Worcester County Sheriffs' Department. They provided labor and the Library supplied the materials and lunch.

The Children's Department is always full of activity. The Library presents Storytimes on Wednesday and Thursday mornings, thanks to our senior aide, Rose Cathcart because we have no Children's Librarian. The children listen to stories, sing songs and create crafts. The crafts are learning projects involving cutting, stringing beads, gluing or using crayons.

The children also come to the Library for our Messy Fingers program. Messy Fingers is a hands-on, minds-on science program for preschoolers and their parents at the Millbury Public Library. Kids will explore, discover, learn, have fun, and usually get messy in the process. It is a science program for children age three to six. #### Public Health Preparedness

In 2003, the Public Health Emergency Preparedness Cooperative (CDC PHEP) grant of the US Centers for Disease Control and Prevention was announced, strengthening an emerging priority of health and medical preparedness for local Boards of Health across the nation. Since the inception of the CDC PHEP grant, the Region 2 Public Health Emergency Preparedness Coalition, a regional coalition of 74 communities in Central Massachusetts have been meeting twice per month to plan for major infectious disease events, such as an influenza pandemic. The Board has developed a plan in conjunction with Town Public Safety, Public Schools and Emergency Management officials, a system whereas local government has the ability to appropriately distribute/administer vaccines within 24 hours of a large scale infectious disease outbreak.

The Board of Health was able to host three seasonal flu clinics and vaccinated 330 people.

#### **Tobacco Use**

#### Cigarette Smoking

Mortality from lung cancer is 25 percent higher among males in Millbury compared to the state of Massachusetts. Mortality from lung cancer is 41 percent higher among females in Millbury compared to the state of Massachusetts. The rate of hospitalizations for lung cancer is 72 percent higher among females in Millbury compared to the state of Massachusetts. The rate of hospitalizations for lung cancer is not significantly different among males in Millbury compared to the state of Massachusetts. An estimated 1,898 smokers live in Millbury (19.3% of adults, age 18+). The adult smoking rate is 20 percent higher in Millbury than statewide (19.3% in Millbury compared to 16.1% statewide). The rate of smoking during pregnancy in Millbury is 35% higher than for the overall state of Massachusetts (10% in Millbury compared to 7.4% statewide).

#### MassHealth Tobacco Cessation Benefit

Since coverage of the tobacco cessation began in July 2006, 180 MassHealth smokers from Millbury have used the benefit - an estimated 62.5% of MassHealth smokers living in Millbury. Statewide, more than 75,000 MassHealth smokers (41%) have used the tobacco cessation benefit since July 2006.

#### **OuitWorks**

Health care providers referred 36 smokers living in Millbury to the QuitWorks program to help them quit smoking. In addition, 83 people from Millbury called the Massachusetts Smokers' Helpine to quit smoking (fiscal years 2004 to 2009).

#### Illegal Tobacco Sales to Minors

The rate of illegal sales to minors (those under age 18) is 44 percent lower in Millbury (4.5%) compared to the state of Massachusetts (8.1%) based on data from FY 2010.

Many tobacco products on the market appeal to youths. Some cigarette-sized cigars contain candy and fruit flavoring, such as strawberry and grape.

Many of the newest smokeless tobacco products do not require users to spit, and others dissolve like mints; these products include snus – a spitless, dry snuff packaged in a small teabag-like sachet and dissolvable strips and lozenges. Young people find these products appealing in part because they can be used without detection at school or other places where smoking is banned. However, these products cause and sustain nicotine addiction, and most youths who use them also smoke cigarettes.

#### Worcester Regional Tobacco Control Collaborative

Given these concerning statistics, the Millbury Board of Health entered into agreement with Worcester Regional Tobacco Control Collaborative (WRTCC) which is a collaborative of nineteen Boards of Health in Central Massachusetts, of which Worcester is the lead agency. The Town of Millbury and the following communities are served: Auburn, Boylston, Charlton, Dudley, Grafton, Holden, Leicester, Marlborough, Northborough, Oxford, Shrewsbury, Spencer, Southbridge, Sturbridge, Sutton, West Boylston, Webster and Worcester. This collaborative maintains the integrity and autonomy of its Board of Health members while the city provides assistance and guidance in all tobacco related issues.

The WRTCC is responsible for conducting youth access to tobacco compliance checks of all tobacco retail facilities in the nineteen cities and towns in the collaborative. In addition, the WRTCC conducts point of purchase audits for all communities within the collaborative and is also responsible for enforcing MGL 270, section 22, "Smoke Free Workplace Law." Nearly 600 fewer Massachusetts residents have died from heart attacks each year since legislators banned smoking in virtually all restaurants, bars and other workplaces.

Massachusetts law prohibits the sale of any tobacco products to those under the age of 18. Additionally, Massachusetts Attorney General's regulations require retailers to ask for photo identification from anyone attempting to purchase tobacco who appears to be under 27 years of age. The federal Synar Amendment requires all states to conduct random, unannounced compliance checks with local retailers where underage youths may attempt to purchase tobacco.

There is a direct correlation between the rates of youth access and the funding of programs that educate retailers and enforce the law. The impact has been recognized on the local level. Illegal sales of tobacco to minors fell by fifty percent in Massachusetts in Fiscal Year 2007 after funding was restored to local programs responsible for preventing youth from buying tobacco. Tobacco use by youth and young adults causes both immediate and long-term damage. One of the most serious health effects is nicotine addiction, which prolongs tobacco use and can lead to severe health consequences. The younger youth are when they start using tobacco, the more likely they'll be addicted.

#### Communicable Disease Surveillance

Infectious diseases constitute a continuing threat to the public's health. They cause illness, suffering, and death, and place an enormous financial burden on society. Although some infectious diseases have been controlled by modern technological advances, new diseases are still emerging. Under Massachusetts General Laws (MGL), Chapter 111, suspected and/or confirmed cases of diseases dangerous to the public's health are reportable to the local Board of Health and/or the Massachusetts Department of Public Health (MDPH). Reporting disease occurrences enables the public health staff to monitor trends, detect and control outbreaks, and evaluate prevention activities. The Sutton public health nurse regularly collects important information on all reported diseases as part of routine epidemiological disease investigations. The following is a summary of reported diseases in Millbury 2011-2012:

#### Environmental Health

The Board monitors food offered for consumption to ensure it is wholesome, free from adulteration, properly labeled, identifiable, and manufactured at an approved source. All food establishments receive mandated inspections to determine compliance with the provisions contained within the Chapter X, of Minimum Sanitation Standards for Food Establishments.

The Board must also uphold and achieve compliance with the Massachusetts Sanitary Code, Minimum Standards of Fitness for Human Habitation. This program consists of responding to complaints, issuance of orders or citing violations with a focus on unkempt property, housing violations, rodent control issues, as well as investigations of any public health nuisance. The Board of Health has investigated more than 133 housing and nuisance complaints, of which agents have had to respond at least twice to each complaint, for the initial and then follow-up(s).

#### Regional Public Health Services:

In July 2011, the Town entered into a pilot agreement with the City of Worcester to provide supervisory, policy and inspectional services on behalf of the Millbury Board of Health. Simultaneously, the City of Worcester entered into similar inter-municipal agreements with the towns of Shrewsbury and Leicester to begin formulating a regional public health district. These successful collaborations demonstrated efficiencies in the public health system when like minded communities work together towards a common goal. Larger public health systems (like what is being created) have efficiencies of scale and are better staffed, resulting in better performance and enhanced ability to address community health needs. Part of this past year's regionalization efforts were to continue to explore other municipalities that may be interested in these common goals in order to increase these economies of scale.

Then in December 2011, the City of Worcester working in partnership with the towns of Shrewsbury, Holden, Leicester, Millbury, and West Boylston was awarded a grant in the amount of \$325,000 over four years from the Massachusetts Department of Public Health to advance its ongoing regionalization efforts. Collectively, these Boards of Health will be known as the Central Massachusetts Regional Public Health Alliance and will service a population of 265,899 residents.

This grant will allow the "Alliance" to provide a range of public health functions and services for these six communities and to begin the development of a formal regional health department. Goals of the Alliance are to establish an accredited public health department that demonstrates cost-savings and efficiencies, and measures and monitors health status and risk to identify health priorities. Additionally, these funds will be used to address gaps in the capacities of health departments to protect and promote public health through food protection, sanitary code enforcement, disease prevention and response, and policies and programs aimed at smoking, obesity, health disparities, underage drinking, and other health threats.

Lastly, the Board is charged with enforcing various Massachusetts Department of Environmental Protection Regulations such as Title V and CMR 310 which includes septic plan review, air, water and noise nuisance control and hazardous materials control. Locally, there are numerous Town by-laws and Board of Health Regulations that the Board must ensure compliance with such as body art and tanning facilities.

The Board of Health upholds all code enforcements regarding TitleV.

## MILLBURY REDEVELOPMENT AUTHORITY ANNUAL REPORT 2012

To the Honorable Board of Selectmen, Town Manager and the Citizens of Millbury:

The Millbury Redevelopment Authority was created at the annual Town Meeting, March 2, 1963, Article 34 and 36 and comprised of five members, four elected and one state appointed.

The Board held 6 meetings and the attendance was as follows:

#### 4. WHAT IS A REDEVELOPMENT AUTHORITY?

Most of the Redevelopment Authorities operating in Massachusetts were originally created to take advantage of the federal Urban Renewal Program, serving as vehicles for carrying out the federal mandate to eliminate blight from inner cities. Although the federal program no longer exists, Redevelopment Authorities continue to play a role in the Commonwealth's revitalization under C.121B.

M.G.L. Chapter 121B allows municipalities, through their Redevelopment Authorities acting as urban renewal agencies, to eliminate and redevelop substandard, decadent or blighted open areas for industrial, commercial, business, residential, recreational, educational, hospital or other purposes. With the goals of revitalizing such land uses and encouraging new growth, Redevelopment Authorities have the power to:

- Establish rehabilitation and design standards;
- Assemble and dispose of land, including the taking of real estate through eminent domain;
- Relocate businesses and residents occupying urban renewal sites;
- Demolish and/or rehabilitate substandard structures;
- Participate in real estate development and commercial revitalization;

- Issue bonds, borrow money and invest funds;
- Receive grants and loans;
- Accept gifts or requests.

Redevelopment Authorities are particularly effective in large scale and complex redevelopment projects and in land assembly. Redevelopment Authorities are exempt from M.G.L. Chapter 30(b), the Uniform Procurement Act, when they are engaged in the development and disposition of real property in accordance with an urban renewal plan. This exemption, coupled with the ability to use eminent domain powers, makes Redevelopment Authorities powerful tools for commercial revitalization, industrial park development, infrastructure improvements, facilities renovation and brownfield site remediation. The development and approval of an urban renewal plan is necessary for a Redevelopment Authority to undertake specific projects.

A Redevelopment Authority, as an independent body politic and corporate, is not an agency of a municipality and therefore, does not answer directly to the chief executive. This affords the Redevelopment Authority more autonomy in planning and implementing redevelopment and revitalization projects. A housing authority may undertake urban renewal projects if there is no Redevelopment Authority in the city or town.

Meetings were held to discuss ongoing project to raise funds for the placement of sidewalk clock on the lower common, donations have been received, and many more are needed.

Projects undertaken by the MRA are not funded with tax payer dollars, solely funded by donations, gifts of money or property, fund raisers and the generosity of our citizens, business's, developers and organizations that take pride in our community.

At our November 14, 2012 meeting a motion was made, seconded and passed unanimously to create a secondary board titled The Millbury Redevelopment Authority Resource Advisory Board, this board was created to advise the MRA on finances, promotions, advertising, procurements and any other issue that may be beneficial to the MRA, at our January 16, 2013 meeting two applicants were appointed by unanimous vote to the Resource Advisory Board. Bylaw amendment for this board may be seen on the town web site.

I hereby submit my Annual Report of the Millbury Police Department for the Fiscal Year ending June 30, 2012.

The Millbury Police Department is committed to providing the highest level of public safety to the community of the Town of Millbury thorough the use of effective management practices while adhering to defined legal and constitutional boundaries. We strive to assist, cooperate and work efficiently and effectively with other town departments, as well as state and federal agency, to successfully meet the needs of the Town and its' residents.

The Millbury Police Departments staffing has been reduced to 1990 levels while the work load has increased. The department has lost personnel and is expected to lose additional personnel over the next year thorough retirements. The department currently has two new recruits in the police academy with an anticipated December graduation. The cost to hire, equip and train new police officers is expensive monetarily, especially in these economic times. In order to meet the needs of the Town in these economic times I have implemented changes within the department to move forward in creative ways to meet the needs of the Town.

- ➤ The department has up-date the Police Department website (www.Millburypolice.com) so I encourage the residents to visit the site;
- ➤ The department has established a citizen/officer complaint form and procedure. The forms are located at the Town Clerks Office in the municipal building, the Police Department Lobby and the department website;
- ➤ The department has installed for the community a prescription pill box in the Police Department Lobby for the disposing of unwanted and old prescription pills, no questions asked. The Police Department is open 24 hours a day 7 days a week;
- ➤ The department has leased a 2004 Harley Davison Motorcycle for the year through donations from local business and we hope to maintain that patrol concept;
- ➤ The department has trained two officers in CPR and first Respond. We intend to offer free CPR training to the Community in the coming year;
- ➤ The department and the Millbury School system are planning to establish a School Resource Officer the next fiscal year;
- ➤ The Millbury Police dispatchers are all trained in Emergency Medical Dispatch. The expense of this training was paid through a state grant;

- ➤ The Alarm By-law policy for the Town residents and businesses has changed to address deficiency in the previous by-Law, reducing the cost to resident and business, and providing a more user friendly method of complying with the policy;
- ➤ The department has designated an officer to monitor sex offender registration;
- > The department has designated, by appointment, an officer to firearms licensing on the evening shift to help the community;
- ➤ The department has assigned a detective to the 4-12 shift to meet the needs of the community;
- ➤ Assigned officers for drug investigations;
- > Assigned officer for grant writing;
- ➤ Officer assigned and received specialized training for accident reconstruction;
- > Designated an officer as the department public relations officer;
- ➤ Departmental officers assigned to Cemlic, Central Massachusetts Law Enforcement Council:
- ➤ The creation and implementation of department Rules & Regulations and Policy & Procedures that were long past due;
- ➤ The Millbury Police Department has purchased and installed a new telephone system that provides an anonymous tip line, automated answering service, department and personnel directory as well voice mail.

#### **PERSONNEL SUMMARY**

The department has seen significant personnel changes during the past fiscal year, beginning with the retirement of longtime Chief of Police Richard Handfield at the beginning July 1, 2011, then the return of Sergeant Donald Desorcy to patrol duties from three months as Acting Chief, at which time began my duties as Chief. This created a vacancy within the supervisory ranks. In February, Officer Thomas Hall was appointed to the rank of Sergeant on a provisional basis.

Officer Keith Gasco and Officer Jacob Webb were interviewed this year, hired, and are currently in the midst of the 22-weeks of training at the Boylston Police Academy. We welcome all of our new members to the department. Overall, the department staffing has decreased since 2008 from 20 sworn members to 15 sworn members, excluding myself.

#### **TRAINING**

With the recent reduction in-service training provided by the state, the department now has to do more training in-house. Sergeant Stephen McFaul and Officer Matthew McGrath have been certified to teach CPR/First Aid, which is required annually. Officer Jason Burdett, has been assigned as a firearms instructor. All of the dispatchers and officers trained to dispatch have been certified in emergency medical dispatch (EMD) procedures. This is due to the required implementation of EMD procedures by the Commonwealth. The training was paid for through a state grant.

#### **DEPARTMENT STATISTICS**

The Millbury Police Department, through the computer dispatch and records system, compiles various data resulting from: arrests, accidents, citations, incidents/investigations, and summonses. The database contains both criminal and non-criminal statistics. Data related to criminal offenses or incidents is reported to the Massachusetts State Police and FBI under the National Incident-Based Reporting System (NIBRS). This category of crime statistics are more commonly known as incident-based reporting (IBR) offenses and represents a general summary of crime data.

## **NIBRS/IBR Offenses (FBI Reportable)**

The following are crime totals which were reported to the FBI under the Incident-Based Reporting (IBR) system during the period of 7/1/2011 - 6/30/2012. There was a total of 1493 reportable crime during FY12, up from 1411 during FY11. Below is a summary of IBR reportable crimes:

#### **General Activity**

A more specific compilation of data, (not all of which is reportable under NIBRS), results from the combination of: arrests, accidents, calls for service, citations, incidents/investigations, and summonses. The statistics below represent data from the 2009, 2010, and 2011. The statistics below list the yearly activity totals, (within the entire town), balanced against the mall activity. This demonstrates, more accurately, the impact the mall has on a police force which has decreased since 2008.

#### Calls for Service

Calls for service are the calls generated which make up the daily log. A call may come in by phone, E911, the radio, or someone walking in to the lobby. Calls for service, even if it does not involve a crime, can be time consuming for both the officer and dispatcher, as citizens may have police or records related questions. The overall yearly and mall calls have remained fairly consistent over the past few years; however, arrests, incident reports, and criminal complaints which result from a call for service, have risen in past years. Calls for service represented approximately 12.3% - 13.4% of the calls over the past three years. I wrote a no trespass policy to address issues at the mall in 2010 that helped reduce the incidents at the mall since it's' implementation.

#### Arrests, Incidents, Criminal Complaints

Arrests statistics compiled based on in-custody arrests. In other words, an arrest number is assigned when a person is taken into physical custody, booked, and bailed or brought to court. There were 236 arrests during 2011. Over the course of the last three years, the number of arrests has ranged from 236 - 257. The arrests occurring at the mall have represented 28.8% to 38.5% of the yearly arrests.

Incident reports, commonly referred to as an investigation, are generated for a variety of different activity. Incidents may completed for range of activity including, but not limited to: documentation of a non-criminal event, an incident causing serious injury or death, suspicious activity, criminal activity with no suspect or where the victim chooses not to go forward with charges, or a crime with an identifiable suspect. If the investigation results in a crime with identifiable charges, a victim willing to pursue the matter in court, and/or sufficient probable cause to substantiate the charge, officers complete a criminal complaint/summons.

There were 688 incident reports completed in 2011. Over the course of the last three years, the number of incidents has ranged from 668 – 748. The incidents occurring at the mall have represented 25.4% to 33.7% of the total yearly incidents during the last three years.

If charges are warranted as a result of an incident report, a criminal complaint/summons arrest is the method used to bring charges in court. Often a complaint is the method of charging someone with a crime, rather than an arrest. This may be due to a combination of factors including: the charge not permitting an arrest by statute, officer discretion based on the person's record, and the present activity and staffing level during the shift at the time.

There were 358 complaints issued in 2011. The number ranged between XX and XX during the last three years. Activity at the Shoppes at Blackstone Valley has comprised between 42.2% and 55.6% of the total yearly criminal complaints.

#### Traffic Enforcement

There were 290 accidents in 2011. Over the course of the last three years, the number of accidents has ranged from 272 - 308. The accidents occurring at the mall have represented 13.6% to 14.8% of the total yearly accidents during the last three years. There were 2136 citations issued in 2011. Over the course of the last three years, the number of citations issued has ranged from 398 - 2136.

The amount of citations issued at the mall, represents between 1.6% to 3.0% of the total yearly citations during the last three years. Although the mall represents a large portion of calls

for service and crime, the majority of accidents, citations, and traffic enforcement have taken place within town and outside of the mall.

The yearly calls for service and arrests throughout the town have remained fairly consistent. The allocation of work has tremendously. In the years prior to the mall opening, officers simply had the town, (mostly residential make-up with several highways), to patrol and respond to calls. During the last ten years, since the Shoppes at Blackstone Valley opened, the percentage of time officers are dedicated to working on arrests, incidents, summons, bookings and paperwork related to the mall has soared, staffing levels have decreased, as well as the time officer have to perform discretionary traffic enforcement and patrols that would otherwise have been performed between calls for service.

#### **SUMMARY**

In summary, the categories of criminal and non-criminal activity listed above are beneficial in indentifying crime trends, what time of the day or night criminal activity is occurring, the impact on various shifts, amount of resources utilized in different areas of town in response to crime, and for tactical decision-making and strategic planning.

Buildings such as schools, nursing homes, residential complexes, and numerous business facilities are inspected by the fire department throughout the year.

#### **REVENUE**

Money collected from permits, fees, reimbursements, donations, and inspections totaled \$16,228 for the period of July 1, 2011 to June 30, 2012. This includes \$400 collected in fees for services rendered on the Massachusetts Turnpike and \$200 in false fire alarm fees. There were 355 open burning permits sold at \$10 each and 13 Agricultural Permits issued at no charge during the 2012 burning season. All fees are turned in weekly to the Treasurer's Office. The Fire Department received \$2,300 in donations.

#### **DEPARTMENT TRAINING**

There were 53 training sessions conducted this year. Training included but was not limited to the following: Special RIT training, Driver Training, Search & Rescue, Pump Operations, Foam Training, Vehicle Extrication, Containment and Fire Suppression, Haz-Mat Training, Open Water & Ice Rescue Training, and tours of local businesses. Millbury also used Auburn's training tower on several occasions to conduct "live" burn and search & rescue drills.

The Fire Department sent Recruit Tyler Mitchell to the Massachusetts Firefighting Academy's Call/Volunteer Training Program and Recruit Christopher Pageau to District 7's Recruit Training Class. Both successfully completed a demanding 20-week course that consisted of every Tuesday and Thursday evenings for three hours and every Saturday for approximately four to six hours. Recruit Mitchell graduated in December, 2011. Recruit Pageau graduated in June, 2012. Both are now regular members of the Millbury Fire Department. #### **ACCOMPLISHMENTS**

The following are just a few of the Fire Department's accomplishments over the past year: Under the guidance of Capt. Robert Silver, Explorer Post #13 continues to thrive. The Explorers participated in the fall Boy Scout Camporee held in Douglas and the spring Camporee held in Oxford. They participated in the fireman's muster at the Field Day and assisted with the many appearances and events that the fire department is involved with. In April, the group also assisted the Town of Brimfield with a major clean-up project to remove/dispose of brush and debris left as a result of a tornado. The Explorers also conducted a live burn at the Butler Farm to help clear brush on the property. This was a great training exercise that also gave them experience dealing with fire. The group also responds with the Ladies Auxiliary to help out at large fires or incidents. Several Explorers have gone on to become Millbury firefighters. Asst. Chief Richard Hamilton, retired FF. Michael Krumsiek and a number of Millbury firefighters help with the training and guidance of these young people. The Explorers have become an asset to the Millbury Fire Department.

The Townspeople again supported us by voting to acquire a new tower truck to replace our 1977 Mack Aerialscope. Delivery is expected in September, 2012. The new tower is a much needed addition to our complement of vehicles and it allows the Fire Department to be equipped to handle today's needs as well as our future needs.

Despite the best efforts of Asst. Chief Jeffrey Dore and Asst. Chief Richard Hamilton, the Fire Department was not awarded an *Assistance to Firefighters Grant* (AFG) for the replacement of our self-contained breathing apparatus (SCBA). The units are more than 14-years old. We will try again for grant money to replace our outdated SCBA when the AFG application period opens.

The Fire Department is continuing its Driver Training Program. This is based on the most current emergency driving program available and involves eight-hours of classroom instruction, on-road training, and a competency driving test. It is headed up by FF. Bob Lahair and FF. Steve Brock. This year, training also had to be conducted on Rescue 1--straining the time and patience of both men. Thank you to both individuals for your hard work and dedication to this program.

Rescue 1 was delivered in September, 2011. The vehicle is a fine addition to our fleet and will serve the Town of Millbury for years to come. Feel free to stop in and look over our newest addition-it is your truck and you are welcome to come by when the station is open.

The Board of Fire Engineers also brought their business office at Fire HQ into the 21<sup>st</sup> century. The last "update" was done in the 1970's. Long overdue for a makeover, the Board got assistance from the Worcester County Sheriff's Community Program. The group did minor repairs and applied a fresh coat of paint. Old filing cabinets were painted, new curtains put up, new carpeting installed, and a new meeting table purchased, creating a modern and inviting office space. A special thank you to Asst. Chief Dore, Asst. Chief Hamilton, Cindy Belsito and R.A.R. Enterprises for all their help with this project.

These are just a few of our Department's accomplishments. We have and will continue to work extremely hard to grow and move the Department forward.

The Council on Aging office, Senior Center and Drop in lounge are located at 1 River Street. We are in our 39<sup>th</sup> year serving those 60 years and older.

The days and hours of operation are as follows: Monday through Friday 8:00 A.M. to 4:30 P.M., and Wednesday evening from 5:30 P.M. to 8:30 P.M. The Town's elder population is 2,783.

The following programs and services are being offered:

Intergenerational Programs (Helping Hands, M.O.V.E. Program), Socialization (cards, bingo, & games) Information, Referral and Client Advocacy, Fuel Assistance Program, Legal Aid, AARP Free Tax Program, Periodical Informational/Educational Programs, Friendly Visitors Program, Day trips, Evening Activities, and I.D. Cards for Senior Citizens.

Nutrition Program: Through a grant from Elder Services of Worcester, we provide a hot lunch program at the Senior Center, Monday thru Friday at 12 noon. We delivered approximately 75 meals per day to the homebound. We provided a total of 13,137 congregate meals and 14,857 home delivered meals. We also deliver holiday, snow days and evening meals to those who qualify. The sponsor for our MOW Drivers is the Millbury Savings Bank.

Our health services include: Podiatrist Clinic, Health Education Clinic,

Hearing Aid Clinic; Osteoporosis Forums, Flu Shot Clinic, along with our weekly Stay Well Clinic, Exercise Classes, Yoga and Tai Chi are also offered.

Social Activities; There are many social activities that the Council on Aging provides: Cards, bingo, crafts, walking club, sing-a-long, whist, craft store, movies, and Wii bowling, Bridge and

monthly birthday parties. Summer concert were provided in the garden, and were co-sponsored by Mike and Lucille Maguire and Selectmen Bernie Plante, Fran King.

We also worked with the Blackstone Valley Tourism to encourage more events such as the "Chain of Lights". Our evening activities and weekend events are extremely successful and it gives the younger elder population some wonderful things to do and to keep them active.

We also provide day and over night trips, other miscellaneous activities that take place away from the Center.

Transportation: Through the efforts of the Friends of the Millbury Seniors we provided during the past year 14,857 one way rides to the elderly and handicapped of Millbury. Our service also, provides rides for all ADA Clients, (Americans with Disabilities). Our service area is one town out in each direction (Auburn, Grafton, Sutton and Worcester).

Grants Received: The Council on Aging was successful in obtaining several grants, this past year. They were \$17,990.00 from the Executive Office of Elder Affairs for program services for year 2010 at the Senior Center, \$25,000.00 from Millbury Savings Bank for a Fuel Assistance program. Through the effort of our Friends of the Millbury Seniors, are also providing the funding for the plantings and upkeep of the Victorian Garden. We also utilized the Community Service Program from the Sheriff's Dept. to assist us with the Garden. The Friends group is the sole support of the Transportation Program.

The COA is the Co-sponsor with the Board of Selectmen for the Elder Community Work Off Program. Currently we have 24 individuals working in 12 Town Departments. The warrant article was for \$20,000 allowing individuals to earn up to \$1,500 in credits on the property tax bill for a fiscal year.

To the staff: A sincere thanks for doing outstanding jobs and implementing the programs and services at the Senior Center. Special thanks to all the wonderful volunteers who do an outstanding job at a whole variety of different things, we are 108 strong.

The Council on Aging Board and I sincerely thank all Town Departments, Town Agencies, Churches, Merchants, Civic Groups and all the Townspeople for their continued support.

#### MILLBURY HOUSING AUTHORITY

The Millbury Housing Authority hereby presents the annual report for the fiscal year ending September 30, 2012.

#### **CHAPTER 200-1**

The Chapter 200-1 Program consists of twenty-five Cape Cod houses located on Memorial Drive. These houses were originally built to house veterans after World War II. While veterans are given a preference under this program, the units also provide safe, decent, sanitary housing at affordable rents for families of low income regardless of veteran status. The units continue to be completely occupied.

The Housing Authority pays a designated fee "in lieu of taxes" on these properties and pays the ongoing rate designated for sewer usage.

#### **CHAPTER 705**

The Housing Authority currently houses eleven low-income families under this program. Five families are housed in the scattered site properties owned by the Housing Authority and six families live in a three duplex site located on Burbank Street.

The Housing Authority pays sewerage use and real estate taxes on all of its 705 properties.

#### **MRVP PROGRAM**

At the end of September 2012 there were three individuals or families participating in the Massachusetts Rental Voucher Program. Participants in this program are entitled to a fixed voucher payment, made directly to their landlord. The voucher payment is based on the household size, income, composition and the geographical location of the rental unit. These vouchers continue to be mobile allowing participants to use the vouchers anywhere in the state.

#### CHAPTER 667-C

This program is made up of one hundred forty-six units of low income housing for the elderly and handicapped. Thirty-two of the units are located on Pearl Street, sixty units are located on Colonial Drive and another fifty- four units are located at 95 Elm Street. All units continue to be fully occupied.

#### **CHAPTER 667-4**

The Chapter 667-4, Congregate Housing Program, located on Colonial Drive, consists of five apartments with a total of twenty-three bedrooms. This program is designed to provide affordable housing together with supportive social and health services to help individuals maintain independent living and prevent early and unnecessary rest home or nursing home placement. It provides companionship yet offers privacy to its participants. At the end of September 2012 there were twenty-one residents living in the Congregate facility.

A separate application must be filed for this program. Applicants must first meet the same financial and age requirements as our conventional housing programs to be eligible. For an

application or program information, call the Millbury Housing Authority at 508-865-2660 or Lisa Bennes, Congregate Coordinator, at 508-865-2960.

The Millbury Housing Authority continues to act as sponsor for the Congregate Housing Program under a grant from the Executive Office of Elder Affairs.

#### **MAINTENANCE**

Our maintenance program involves maintenance of forty-four buildings that include one hundred eighty-nine apartments. Housing Authority maintenance personnel maintain the common areas, grounds and parking lots in our elderly developments. Families in single or duplex housing units maintain their own grounds.

Our maintenance staff consists of three full-time positions: Thomas Austin, Michael Michael M. Sr., and Michael Murray. The dedication and excellent work performance of our maintenance department is reflected in the condition of the Housing Authority's properties.

#### **ADMINISTRATION**

Management and maintenance of all Housing Authority programs and properties is administered by the Executive Director and approved by the Board of Directors. Office hours are 8:00 A.M. to 4:00 P.M. Monday through Friday.

The administrative staff consists of one (1) part-time office clerk, Linda Vernon, and (3) full-time employees: Administrative Assistant/Program Coordinator, Judith Flynn; Congregate/Service Coordinator, Lisa Bennes; and Executive Director, Janet L. Cassidy.

#### **ELIGIBILITY REQUIREMENTS**

**Age Limit:** - (Elderly) 60 years of age or older

(Disabled) No age limit

**Asset Limit:** - The asset limit for admission is as follows:

- (a) When net family assets are \$5,000 or less, the actual income from assets is used:
- (b) When net family assets are more than \$5,000, the greater of the following is used:
  - (i) actual income from assets; or
  - (ii) imputed income from assets based on the passbook rate established by HUD.

#### **ASA WATERS MANSION TASK FORCE**

To the Honorable Board of Selectmen, Town Manager, and the Citizens of Millbury:

We hereby submit our Annual Report for the fiscal year of July 1, 2011 through June 30, 2012.

During the course of this fiscal year we once again worked with the Friends of the Asa Waters Mansion to fund many preservation projects for this historical site including interior painting, plastering the kitchen ceiling, various plumbing and electrical upgrades, and the fabrication of several new mahogany spindles for the bandstand. We were able to complete the painting of the garage which was funded with a grant from the John H. Chafee Blackstone River Valley National Heritage Corridor with matching funds provided by Millbury Savings Bank and the Friends of the Asa Waters Mansion. The National Heritage Corridor also financed the design of two historical interpretive signs to be placed on the grounds of the estate which highlight the importance of the Waters family, Waters' armory and its role in the War of 1812.

Numerous events were hosted in conjunction with the Friends of the Asa Waters Mansion including our annual Christmas festival, various historical programs, and group tours conducted throughout the year. We continued the tradition of hosting themed children's teas and a variety of formal high teas. We received a Grant from the Millbury Cultural Council to sponsor a special Veterans Day commemorative program for 11-11-11 "George Washington: How He Won the Unwinnable War." In the spring we created an educational program titled "Mrs. Waters Grand Luncheon" featuring an historical interpreter as Mrs. Waters in the 1800's, and hosted a successful "Home Shopping Gala" fundraiser. The fiscal year came to an end as we welcomed a capacity crowd for "We the People" honoring the 225th anniversary of the United States Constitution.

Through their efforts the Friends of the Asa Waters Mansion once again contributed to the beautification of the Mansion including the grounds and gardens. The flowers create outstanding backgrounds for family and group pictures, truly evidenced in the spring when the Mansion and its grounds are set aside for Millbury High School prom photos. We were fortunate to have one of our Junior Volunteers, Timothy Born, beautify the entrance on School Street by creating a scenic Welcoming Garden which resulted in Tim's achieving his Eagle Scout status.

As a service to our community The Friends of the Asa Waters Mansion continued their long time commitment generously volunteering their time to staff bereavement receptions this past year.

Our Director, Catherine Elliott, remains active in aggressively promoting the Mansion into new markets. She continues to serve on the Blackstone Valley Chamber of Commerce Tourism Association. The Mansion has become a primary area of interest for visitors to this region evidenced by the increase in the volume of guests journeying to the Mansion as a tourism destination.

Through all the growth and increased activity we continue to adhere to our unwavering goal of allowing Millbury Community Service Organizations to utilize the Mansion free

The Millbury Public Access Cable Television Advisory Committee works with Charter Communications and Verizon Communications to establish improve and maintain cable services to residents. The committee posts and updates notices on the community bulletin board. Channel 11, 12, and 13 for Charter Customers and Channels 24, 26, 28 for Verizon Customers. Millbury Public Access is funded solely by grants from Charter and Verizon; we do not use tax money to fund our organization.

Public Access Television, also known as local origination programming, is a place where ordinary people can create content which is broadcast or cablecast through our cable systems. It is a First Amendment forum, where, the producer holds editorial control. Any Resident may have a program aired on a public access channel.

This year we added three new shows to the Millbury Public Access family:

**On The Light Side** – This show is hosted by Joe Coggans and it features guests from the local area, including politicians, and friends.

**Around Town Millbury** - This show is hosted by our own Lori Burrows and features local politicians, small business', and town events.

**Puzzled Parents** – hosted by Bruce Lavigne. This show is designed to help parents of autistic children find what interests children and keep them busy.

#### BUTLER FARM RE-USE COMMITTEE

To the Honorable Board of Selectmen and the Citizens of the Town of Millbury, we respectfully submit our Annual Report for the fiscal year ending July 31, 2012.

Before we begin our Annual Report the Butler Farm Re-Use Committee would once again like to thank the many people who have supported us over the past year.

Accomplishments of The Butler Farm Re-Use Committee during the fiscal year were:

- 1. The Butler Farm is still being studied for an installation of a wind turbine and is near completion. A new Cell Tower will be installed at the Farm in the very near future. This will help with the dead area in the west end of town. The Town of Millbury will also benefit from its revenue from the cell companies.
- 2. The Millbury Emergency Management Agency has started to install a generator to be used in an emergency with a power outage to run the communications equipment. This installation is almost complete.
- 3. Another eagle project has been done at the farm by Michael Bien of Boy Scout Troop109. This project was to clear trails, cut trees down on the access road to the EMA communications tower; upgrades were made to the EMA command center in the Farm House with computers and radio equipment. The command center is operational.
- 4. The Farm House was painted and two new replacement windows installed in the attic on the North side.
- 5. The Committee is still working on researching the History of the Farm and will decorate the interior with pictures found of the Farm. A History will be published when it is completed.
- 6. The landscaping and lawn mowing of 5 acres, is being done on a weekly basis by Norm Gonyea and Ernie Bernard. Many more trees and bushes have been removed away from the house and around the grounds.
- 7. The Butler Farm Re-Use Committee has added one Paul Fortin as a new member this year bringing our Committee up to 9. Paul has been a great addition to the committee. Paul helps with the day to day trimming and mowing of the Farm to help Norm and Ernie.
- 8. The annual clean-up day was held on November 5, 2011. Brush on walls and perimeter was cleared, leaves cleared from around the Farm House. It was a good turn out by many volunteers. We would like to thank the many volunteers who helped with our clean-up.
- 9. We offered a Community Garden to residents of the Town of Millbury. The Garden plots were 10'x20' and could be doubled to accommodate any resident. The Garden space is limited so we offer plots on a first come first serve basis. The Gardeners totaled 18 with 18 of 27 plots planted. The Committee will have the gardens tilled and limed before winter. In the spring the Committee will till and offer garden plots to the residents of Millbury. We will announce plots are available on a first come first serve basis giving last year's gardeners first refusal.

- 10. The walking trails have been groomed and are being used by residents to walk and exercise their dogs. We ask that residents be courteous and pick up after their pets. Thank You.
- 11. A new fence was installed by Miller Fence behind the garage. This fence is to Keep Unauthorized Motor Vehicles from going up the access road to the EMA Communication Tower.
- 12. A new updated accurate map of the trails is being created and will be available to the public upon arriving at the Farm. The maps will be located in the map box in front of the garage. This map box was installed by a Boy Scout from a past Eagle Project.
- 13. The parking area along Singletary Road has been cleared. This is a work in progress to someday have picnic tables so everyone can enjoy the scenery.

#### MILLBURY BICENTENNIAL COMMITTEE

Our celebration has begun! After four years of planning, the celebration for Millbury's Bicentennial opened with a spectacular concert by the Massachusetts Symphony Orchestra followed by an extraordinary display of fireworks on Saturday, June 16, 2012. The thousand plus people who came to Windle Field that night were regaled with a very enjoyable evening.

In July, the History Committee started its West Millbury Tours. Once a month through November, around 35 residents per tour were treated to a van ride with tour guides to traverse West Millbury and over 20 sites that have contributed to our history. Members of the Fire Department drove the vans and townspeople and visitors signed up ahead of time. More tours are scheduled for March through June. To sign up you need to call the Town Hall and get your name on the list, as long as room is available. So far, each tour has been filled.

The intended Balloon Festival for the end of August (in conjunction with the Fireman's Muster) had to be canceled because of the unfortunate death of the balloon-meister in May.

The month of October held numerous bicentennial events. In partnership with the Millbury Improvement Initiative and the Class of 1963 reunion, a sock hop was held at the Millbury High School gymnasium. Later in the month (after a rain postponement), the annual antique car show took place at Windle Field.

In mid-month (October 20 and 21), Millbury held a Revolutionary War Reenactment thanks to the support of the Pearson family and local re-enactors from Sutton and Millbury who spent months working with the Bicentennial Committee to plan and spread the word. Nearly 400 reenactors from all over New England, New York, and Pennsylvania covered the fields off Backstrad Road. Thanks to the help from the Pearsons, Scales, Boy Scout Troop 109, Assumption School children in addition to nearly one hundred 100 individual volunteers from Millbury, this event was very successful and delighted nearly 1800 people.

At the end of October, the Millbury Historical Society conducted a ghost tour of the Central Cemetery as part of Millbury's bicentennial. Eight characters were resurrected and described their role in Millbury's past. The 600 people who visited the cemetery that night were enthralled with riveting performances and the entire program. A job well done!

During the course of the year, the Millbury Bicentennial Committee continued to meet monthly as did all the committees. In particular, the Finance and Fundraising Committee continued its fundraising efforts through the Capital Fund Campaign, the Direct Mail Drive, and the Annual Wine Tasting (held this year on November 3<sup>rd</sup>). Bernie Plante orchestrated an Octoberfest to raise additional revenue bringing in over \$12,000 for the Millbury bicentennial. Fran King once again donated proceeds from his annual Chili Competition as well. As a result of Rob Morton's leadership and his committee, we expect to reach our goal of \$300,000 by early spring with the final pledges from the Capital Fund Campaign. The efforts of our businesses, organizations and individual contributions have surpassed expectations in an extraordinary way. Would you expect any less from this community? Simply put, the people of Millbury continue to support its community in incredible ways. Thank you!!

Commemorative and promotional items for the Bicentennial continue to be on sale at Rays' True Value and a variety of venues during the year. For example, we have promoted the bicentennial celebration at the Firemen's Muster, Block Party, Chain of Lights each year in addition to other opportunities. New items were introduced this year: the pictorial history of Millbury by Chris Sinacola published by Arcadia press, the Bicentennial plate designed by Pam Gover, a wooden plaque with Millbury Bicentennial 1813-2013, and a framed picture collage of nearly 30 historical sites of Millbury. Recently, the Media Committee has joined with the Millbury Historical Society through social networking. Facebook friends have exceeded 800 and continue to grow as old pictures from Millbury's past are displayed each day. This has generated a tremendous amount of interest as many are reminded of their past or their families' past. Continuing to celebrate our bicentennial, the Millbury-Sutton Chronicle began displaying an older picture of Millbury with a current photo of the same location, thanks to photographer, Edd Cote in October.

The Events and History Committee continue their work as we enter the 2013 year. With several activities already described, these committees continue working on the climax of our year's celebration. The Ball Committee is busy finalizing plans for the Bicentennial Ball on April 6<sup>th</sup> at Mechanics Hall in Worcester. Tickets went on sale in December. Nearly two-thirds of the tickets available were sold before the end of 2012. Although period costumes are encouraged, semi-formal attire is required. Peppers' will cater the event and Decades by Dezyne is the band. The Committee has worked very hard to offer a gala ball for all to remember.

In addition, there will be an ecumenical service at a time, location and date to be determined. Also, there will be a golf tournament on Sunday, May 19<sup>th</sup> at the Raceway Golf Course in Thompson, CT. The Millbury Veterans Council has received permission to have a military flyover during the Memorial Day parade in honor of our bicentennial.

A new event replaced the balloon fest. This is the Short Film Festival which is being planned for June 10<sup>th</sup> at the Elm Draughthouse through the generosity of Jim Perry who will host the event. People are encouraged to create and to submit films for this competition. There are age brackets and guidelines along with an application available through the town website (<a href="www.millbury-ma.org">www.millbury-ma.org</a>) or the bicentennial website (<a href="www.millbury2013.com">www.millbury2013.com</a>).

The Birthday Party committee has been finalizing plans for a huge event scheduled for Saturday, June 15<sup>th</sup>. There will be numerous organizations and groups performing at different locations in the center of town, an open house at the Post Office, dedication of a bicentennial tree, performances by the Blackstone Valley Chorus and the Millbury High School Band, a visit by President James Madison, president when Millbury was incorporated, a birthday cake contest (applications available at the above websites) and the winners of the raffle for the patriotic quilt made by Judy Kane and the Michael Graves painting for the bicentennial sponsored by both the Millbury Women's Club and the Millbury Bicentennial Committee. The site for the concerts, presidential visit, cake contest and raffle is the Asa Waters Mansion, Millbury's historical gem.

The Parade Committee has been finalizing the applications for bands, floats, doll carriages, antique cars, bicycles, motorcycles, as well as for the many organizations and groups in Millbury, etc. for several months. They have received commitments from over 20 bands from all over New England including the Spirit of America as well as the Mummers from Philadelphia. The theme for this bicentennial parade is "Celebrating Millbury's Rich History". The parade will take place on Sunday, June 23<sup>rd</sup> at 1:00. The exact route will be announced early in 2013.

The final planned celebration for the bicentennial is July 4<sup>th</sup> fireworks display in partnership with the Millbury Lions Club. If you thought the June 16, 2012 fireworks were incredible, you won't want to miss this year's Millbury Bicentennial Fireworks.

Many more volunteers are needed for our June events. Please contact the town hall or members of the Millbury Bicentennial Committee if you wish to help celebrate our 200<sup>th</sup> birthday.

Despite the lack of adequate federal, state and local fiscal resources for the Millbury Public Schools, the administration and staff, with significant community support, once again, continued to move the district forward in many ways during the 2011-2012 school year. Many of the quantifiable successes were the result of continuous years of effectively forecasting, planning, preparing and analyzing well, the academic needs of all students; the facility needs of the three school buildings to optimize student learning and the most appropriate distribution of staff, despite continued lay-offs, to maintain student/teacher ratios and the effective delivery of instructional practices.

School districts throughout the country have faced the same challenges for the past four years, given the economic downturn, beginning with the 2008-2009 school year. However, what makes the Millbury Public Schools unique is the thoughtful pre-planning about how best to utilize dwindling resources, the implementing of utility cost-efficiencies that are fixed costs in any school budget, and repeatedly examining the most effective and efficient use of every dollar. Every decision, regarding programs, buildings and how best to use the district's reduced fiscal resources met the most important and stringent standard in the district, which was "how will students benefit from the decision?"

In FY 2012, the school district lost \$458,432 when the federal ARRA grant was no longer available, as anticipated; \$1,952 in the Safe and Drug Free Schools grant; \$4,524 in the federal Special Education Allocation and \$7,888 in the Kindergarten Enhancement grant. All of these grants, except the Safe and Drug Free Schools grant, have funded and continue to fund professional and paraprofessional staff. The Millbury Public School District employs 285 individuals and the loss of any resources to fund staff, directly impacts the level and quality of services to students.

For the fourth consecutive year, FY 2009 – 2012, the school district's budget funded by local dollars was reduced. A total loss of \$230,800 was incurred during 2011 – 2012, resulting in the loss of 1 ful1-time elementary teacher and a .5 kindergarten aide; a portion of the Shaw choral music teacher; 1 full-time High School guidance counselor, a portion of the HS engineering teacher; and a .5 custodian and .5 maintenance worker. The reduction of 4.1 FTEs represented -\$ 202,300. The Central Office and building administrators saved the district \$28,500 during this same year, by voluntarily declining their COLA increases, outlined in previously agreed contracts. The total reduction of local funds, from FY 2009 – 2012 equaled \$1,065,100.

During that same period of time, the enrollment of the public schools decreased by 38 students from 1,869 on October 1, 2011 to 1,831 in 2012; reflecting the loss of 58 students at the Junior/Senior High School; an increase of 21 students at the Raymond E. Shaw School and the loss of 1 student at the Elmwood Street Elementary School.

The district continued to achieve gains, as many students in grades 3-10 increased their levels of academic achievement on the MCAS Assessment from the previous year. The Department of Elementary and Secondary Education implemented changes in the MCAS Accountability System by categorizing schools and school districts into 1 of 5 Levels, with Level 1 being the highest achieving schools. Both the Elmwood Street Elementary and the Raymond E. Shaw Schools achieved Level 1 status for the 2011 – 2012 year. State-wide, 80% of the schools qualified as Level 1 or Level 2 schools. Much of the demonstrated success is a combination of the Reading Intervention time and strategies implemented at both schools, data meetings and analysis to determine student gaps in skills and supplemental mathematics' resources being used to strengthen math skills.

Millbury Memorial Junior/Senior High School qualified as a Level 2 school, with more work to be done at the Junior and Senior High grade levels.

One of the most important district-wide initiatives was the development of the *Millbury Educator Evaluation Plan*, modeled after the Department of Elementary and Secondary Education *Model Plan*. Every school district was required to design and implement a *Plan*, in accordance with legislation recently passed in Massachusetts. The purpose of the *Plan* is to strengthen professional practice and enable educators to assume responsibility for their professional and personal growth, with the end result being increased academic achievement for every student. As a Race-to-the-Top school district, Millbury was required to implement its *Plan*, by September 1, 2012, ratified by the Millbury Teachers' Association and approved by the Millbury School Committee. Over a 2 year period, every professional educator (183 individuals) will be evaluated, in accordance with the 5 step cycle, including the Superintendent, Business Manager, Director of Curriculum, Principals, Assistant Principals and all teachers and caseload specialists. The 5 step cycle commences with a self-assessment; analysis, goal setting and plan development; implementation of the plan; formative assessment/evaluation and the summative evaluation.

In order to reach the September 1, 2012 deadline, a collaborative approach between the Millbury Schools' administrators and the Millbury Teachers' Association, resulted in a committee of 18, working from March through August, 2012 to ensure that all required components were included, that implementation across all three schools would be consistent and that the features important to Millbury educators were worded to reflect best practices.

The long-awaited ADA accessible doors at the Raymond E. Shaw School were installed during the winter holidays, allowing students and visitors in wheelchairs and with limited mobility, the ability to navigate through the hallways independently. The cost of \$135,000 was graciously approved by the Millbury voters through a Warrant Article at the spring 2011 Annual Town Meeting.

Another success was realized when the Millbury Community voted to approve a Technology Warrant Article for \$105,000 to support the replacement of domain and file servers. The school district greatly appreciated the voters' support at the Town Meeting.

Once again, the Millbury Parents Club raised \$40,000 to support programs within the schools. Given the economy, fundraising for any organization is a daunting task, but the Parents Club persevered, planned and recruited volunteers to assist in raising money to pay for buses for class field trips and specialized events. Transportation is the most costly part of any field trip and without this level of support, grade levels would not be able to participate in field trips that are a distinct part of the curricula. It goes without saying that the school district also recognizes that parents and extended families, give of themselves and reach into their wallets to support the Parents' Club's fundraising events. A mere *thank you* is certainly not enough to express the district's appreciation.

A number of additional successes were realized in individual schools. The examples that follow represent the type of programs, services and activities that engage students to learn new skills, remain focused while in school, succeed and ultimately, lead to graduation.

#### **Elmwood Street Elementary School**

Several teachers participated in Community Service Learning grants. This year's grants included planting flowers with 3<sup>rd</sup> graders and nursing home residents and Teaming Up for Tee-Ball. In addition, selected 3<sup>rd</sup> grade students studied the cultural aspects of a country of their choosing and presented to parents and guests, the different aspects of that particular culture at an evening Cultural Fair, showcased at the Millbury Public Library. The program is one of the most popular at Elmwood.

The Woolie Card Program enjoyed a great deal of success, as students in K-3 earned Woolie Cards at random, for demonstrating excellent academic effort for the month. Students were honored at a ceremony with a certificate and parents were invited to celebrate their accomplishments.

Students in  $2^{nd}$  and  $3^{rd}$  grade worked with the computer teacher to publish a school newspaper, quarterly. They developed their ideas, wrote, edited and in some cases, illustrated their stories for the paper. This was only one of the many events that was great fun, but was also used to develop literacy skills. Another was that all  $1^{st} - 3^{rd}$  grade students participated in *Walk to Read*. During this activity, they were grouped according to reading skills and received intensive instruction for one hour each day at their reading level. As students acquired skills, they were moved to another group, conducive to their reading ability.

Once again, the Elmwood School offered a Whole School Literacy Challenge, in conjunction with the Worcester Sharks and their mascot, FINZ. Each grade level was assigned a different reading challenge and awards were given to the top readers in each grade.

Disability Awareness Day has become an annual event, under the direction of Mrs. Karla Belliveau, special education teacher. This year, a NEADS dog was invited in to work with its handler and demonstrate how service dogs assist disabled individuals in the many tasks of daily living and working.

And of course, a wonderful time was had by all at the annual Halloween Parade which draws parents, grandparents, siblings, aunts and uncles and neighbors!

#### Raymond E. Shaw School

Due to the generosity of the Millbury Parents' Club, field trips to the YMCA for grade 4 and Camp Bournedale/Discovery Days for grade 6 were planned to support the curricula in those grades. In addition, the Parents' Club also funded programs of interest that were brought to students, such as Native Cultures in grade 4, the Slater Mills in grade 5 and a presentation about the Pyramids and Pharaohs in grade 6.

In keeping with the district's Literacy initiative, the Literacy Door Decorating Contest was held in June and had already become a huge success, after only three years! Each classroom chose a book and the class, not the teacher, decided on a theme and determined how to decorate their classroom door, depicting that theme. The fact that this activity was also a contest contributed to the enthusiasm.

Mr. Steve Cotler, author of the book <u>Cheesie Mack</u>, visited for two days and met with each homeroom to discuss writing strategies and character development, while supporting the district's Literacy initiative.

Positive Behavioral Intervention Strategies (PBIS) continued with two family events. Students vs. staff volleyball occurred in the fall and the students vs. staff basketball game was held in the spring. PBIS also promoted the Pep Rally and the Student of the Month Assemblies. PBIS is a nationally known, research-based program that teaches students to accept responsibility for their own behaviors. The success rate at the Shaw School has been impressive, as evidenced by the Homework Initiative. With the support of the PBIS systems, 50-60% of the entire school (grades 4-6) completed 100% of the homework each month and 75-85% of the school completed 90% or more of the homework.

Data meetings continued to occur three times during the year. Teams of grade level teachers and administrators analyzed a variety of assessments, such as the DIBELS, DAZE, MAP, Fountas and Pinnell, and the Quick Phonics Screening, along with the MCAS to make decisions regarding student instruction and intervention strategies. This level of decision-making is having a tremendous positive development on the acquisition of skills for students.

#### Millbury Memorial Junior/Senior High School

Millbury Memorial Junior/Senior High School is always a very busy and exciting learning environment.

The new marketing class was so successful that \$500 of the profits were used to allow students to practice what they learned by establishing new enterprising ventures, such as selling stuffed Woolies, Millbury High School labeled water bottles and labels designed and researched by the students.

The Robotics Team, comprised of 7 students, once again, participated in the World Championship held in Anaheim, CA.

Forty-five students were involved in Student Government Day and learned more about the positions held by 30 school and town officials. During Student Government Day in Boston, students Delaney McWalters and Emily West were selected to travel to the city to debate state government issues.

The 7<sup>th</sup> graders were treated to the Charles Dickens production at the Hanover Theatre. The Junior High School Play, Cinderella, a different and creative version, was written by a Massachusetts native and was superbly performed by junior high students.

Millbury Junior/Senior High School, once again, hosted the regional tournament for Destination Imagination in March, for the second consecutive year. Three Millbury teams rose to the top and advanced to the state level of competition.

Four freshmen participated in the Blackstone Valley Education Foundation's Student Leadership Academy; developing and implementing Community Service Projects as part of the Academy. A Community Service Learning Group hosted two successful Blood Drives and also made blankets that were donated to a local hospital. They also sponsored another well-received Immigration Celebration.

As his Eagle Scout Project, Peter Boll cleaned and reorganized the Drama Club's storage basement. The High School has been cited by the Fire Department in the past, for the condition of that room and the possibility that it might contribute to a fire. Now the room is safe and the drama coaches are thrilled to be able to select costumes and props easily. Congratulations Peter; it looks great!

The Football Team won their Thanksgiving Game against Grafton, under the coaching direction of the new head coach, Ray Richards. The boys' and girls' Soccer Teams competed in the district tournaments. The girls' Basketball Team won the SWCL tournament and also went to the district tournament. The Volleyball Team tied for the SWCL title and also competed in the district tournament. The spring Track Team realized huge results, as the girls' team won the SWCL title and Molly McCausland represented Millbury at a New England tournament where she placed 3<sup>rd</sup> in the Javelin Throw.

The events listed at each school are only a small portion of the many opportunities available to all students. Although academic achievement for every student is the school district's priority, all of these activities assist students in developing confidence, leadership, skills and a sense of self and team. These enhancements to the curricula are what motivate some students to remain in school. #### Fiscal Year 2012 Annual Report

#### A Letter from the Superintendent-Director: Year in Review

Fiscal Year 2012 (FY12) (July 1, 2011 – June 30, 2012) was a particularly exciting year at Valley Tech as we advanced along the path toward our long-term improvement goals. In doing so, we remain steadfast in our mission to improve the quality vocational technical education we provide to future generations of the Blackstone Valley Vocational Regional School District.

Within this report you will find ample and measurable evidence that we are committed to improvement for the future and that students are eager to rise to the challenges we provide. Time and time again students have proven that they are exceedingly able to raise the bar through the practical application of their academic and career and technical skills in the classroom and beyond. In addition to their scholastic achievements, our students display depth of character as is evidenced by their sportsmanship on the athletic fields and volunteerism in the community. We take great pride in their numerous accomplishments, and hope you do as well.

Recognizing that it is a challenge to educate the leaders of tomorrow in a facility that is anything less than state-of-the-art, we continued to make cost controlled improvements to our building and grounds in FY12. These repairs were undertaken in a strategic manner as we pride ourselves on our ability to remain fiscally conservative to ensure that these projects are brought to completion without having to ask for a mere penny of additional operation resources from our 13 member towns. The District aggressively pursues all pertinent non-taxpayer revenues available in order to self-fund these projects to improve the quality of education provided.

Valley Tech's FY12 budget, unanimously approved by each of its 13 member towns, reflected an overall increase of just 1.99 percent. Future planning established the FY13 budget with an overall increase of just 2.77 percent. We remain committed to providing quality education to a growing population with an eye on the bottom line investment made by each of our member towns. Your yearly financial commitment, the ongoing support from our 13 member towns, and your dedication to the system are key factors in our success as we promote 21<sup>st</sup> century skills in the Blackstone Valley.

Throughout my 18-year career as superintendent-director at Valley Tech, there have been numerous reforms to the education system in our nation. With a promise to remain cognizant of those changes for the continued advancement of vocational technical education in the Blackstone Valley, we shall continue to strive to be the best for our students - creating pathways allowing them to realize their full potential.

Dr. Michael F. Fitzpatrick Superintendent-Director STUDENTS RESPOND TO HIGH EXPECTATIONS: The results from the spring 2011 administration of the Massachusetts Comprehensive Assessment System (MCAS) tests to members of the Class of 2013 showed that for the eleventh straight year Valley Tech students maintained noteworthy gains in reaching proficiency on the MCAS. Federal legislation requires all students to reach Advanced or Proficient in Mathematics and English Language Arts by the year 2014. Ninety percent in Math and ninety-one percent in English Language Arts reached that level on the first attempt in Valley Tech's Class of 2013. The data reflected a one percent increase in Math and two percent increase in English Language Arts proficiency over Valley Tech's Class of 2012. The percentages of students who scored at Advanced or Proficient levels are well above the state averages of seventy-seven percent in Math and eighty-four percent in English Language Arts. On the Science and Technology/Engineering test, which the DESE has made a third requirement to receive a high school diploma, Valley Tech's Class of 2013 reached a proficiency percentage of eighty-four, well above the state average of sixty-seven percent

Recently released results of spring 2012 Advanced Placement (AP) testing illustrated that the number of students achieving qualifying exam scores has grown by 128% since 2011 and AP enrollment for the upcoming school year is anticipated to increase by 90% demonstrating the ability of our students to reach new levels of success and Valley Tech's continued dedication to a rigorous curriculum.

The members of the second post-secondary Practical Nursing class at Blackstone Valley Regional Vocational Technical High School took their biggest steps toward a career in healthcare in June 2012: a walk across the stage to receive their certificates and pins. The 23 students who graduated attended the 16-month, three evening a week and one weekend a month program, many of them while working full-time completing 60 weeks in the program, providing 1,090 hours of instruction, more than 945 hours of nursing course work and over 540 hours of clinical practice.

Sending a total of eight students to the National SkillsUSA Championships in Missouri, Valley Tech recorded podium finishes for the ninth time in the last ten years with two students securing gold medals and one student capturing a bronze medal. Coreen Stanovich, a junior from Northbridge, won the gold medal in the Food and Beverage Service competition. Jillian Dumont, a 2012 Practical Nursing Program graduate from Blackstone, won the gold medal in the Practical Nursing competition. Marissa Bunnewith, a 2012 graduate from Millbury, won the bronze medal in the Commercial Baking competition.

**NUMBERS REFLECT FISCAL ACCOUNTABILITY:** The District's operating budget for FY12 was developed with ongoing sensitivity to the financial challenges faced by our 13 member towns and was therefore designed to maximize stakeholder investment. The total budget was held to a modest 1.99% increase.

The District's FY12 total operating budget was \$19,327,282. The two primary revenue sources are derived from the House-1 Chapter 70 State Aid estimate of \$7,614,352 and state-required Minimum Contribution calculations for the 13 member towns totaling \$8,881,138.

In the operation portion of the budget but outside DESE Net School Spending areas, the District budgeted \$684,906 for transportation costs and \$720,637 for retiree medical coverage; however, planned capital asset acquisition was once again deferred. The transportation portion of the assessment is offset by the House-1 Chapter 71 Transportation Aid estimate of \$577,094. In addition to the state-required Minimum Contributions, member towns unanimously supported

the school's operating budget with shared assessments for operations, student transportation, and retiree medical.

The State reduced its initial Chapter 70 State Aid and Chapter 71 Transportation Aid estimates by \$16,666 and \$9,820 respectively; however this reduction was offset by \$130,977 in Ed Jobs Funds. Additionally, staffing efficiencies, student work project endeavors, competitive procurement practices and other green school initiatives provide realized savings that replenish the District's unreserved fund balance. In FY12, these efforts generated \$300,000 of direct offsets to member assessments. Finally, Valley Tech secured approximately \$1.1 million in grants and private donations to provide additional educational investments and vocational instructional equipment.

CLASS OF 2012: The graduating Class of 2012 included the following students from Millbury: Steven Bowker, Electrical; Eric Bouthillette, Plumbing; Marissa Bunnewith (NHS/NTHS), Culinary Arts; Nicholas Choiniere, Manufacturing Technology; Cory Gagliardi, Carpentry; Travis Haak, Information Technology; Paige Heckman, Culinary Arts; Grace Jacobson, Painting and Design Technologies; Nicholas Langevin, Manufacturing Technology; Jacklynn Leavens, Automotive Technology; Chelsea Lewis, Cosmetology; Liam MacLeod (NHS/NTHS), Culinary Arts; Madison Mewhiney, Graphic Communications; Damon Miranda, Carpentry.

**VALUABLE LEADERSHIP:** Valley Tech's School Committee, comprised of 13 dedicated individuals, proves invaluable in overseeing District operations. Committee members are elected to four-year terms in biennial voting across the District. Our students benefit from their experience and expertise representing an array of industry occupations, which contributes to the success of Valley Tech and always improves the school.
