
## Helping you and your family stay safe with these important safety tips

## **Carbon Monoxide Safety: Awareness** for every month of the year



Be sure to clear snow and ice from gas meters, vents and overhead areas where falling snow and ice could damage the meter, regulator or piping. Snow and ice buildup can damage equipment and cause a gas leak. Blocked vents can cause carbon monoxide to back up into a home or building and result in carbon monoxide poisoning for those inside.

Carbon monoxide is a silent killer. It can't be seen, heard or smelled. The safest way to protect your family is to install carbon monoxide detectors throughout your home.

Be sure every floor of your home is equipped with a carbon monoxide detector. These life-saving devices alert you to leaks. If you suspect carbon monoxide poisoning, go outside immediately and call 911.

Symptoms of carbon monoxide poisoning are similar to the flu (headaches, weakness, confusion, nausea, etc.).
