Dear Millbury Residents,

Thank you for taking the time to participate in our Annual Town Meeting. In this booklet are your Finance Committee recommendations for the coming Fiscal Year 2015, beginning on July 1, 2014.

Items for your consideration as part of the Warrant for Annual Town Meeting are:

- 1. A balanced yearly operating budget that remains at the Prop 2 ½ Levy Limit. The following Articles deal with financial matters:
  - a. Article 4 Operations Budget (Starts on Page 23)
  - b. Articles 5 through 12, and Articles 14 through 24, and Article 47 Sundry Financial Items
- 2. Five (5) major capital programs for consideration, where debt exclusions to Prop 2 ½ were on the Millbury Ballot on 29 April 2014,
  - a. Article 13 BVT Program Expansion
  - b. Article 25 HVAC for Town Hall
  - c. Article 26 SCBA for Fire Department Personnel
  - d. Article 27 Fuel Tank Replacement DPW Garage
  - e. Article 28 Transfer Station Reconstruction and Equipment
- 3. Major Capital Project for Sewer Enterprise Fund,
  - a. Article 29 Sewer System Repair as part of RT146 reconstruction project over W. Main Street.
- 4. Acquisition and/or acceptance of land parcels Articles 30, 34 and 48.
- 5. Acceptance of Roadways Articles 32 and 33.
- 6. Planning Board Business
  - a. Zoning Map Changes Articles 35 and 36,
  - b. Zoning By-law Changes Articles 37 through 43,
  - c. Priority Development Sites Article 44.
- 7. Citizen's Petitions Articles 31, 45 and 46.

### **Levy Limit**

Millbury will remain at the Levy Limit indefinitely with the current department spending profiles found within the details of this budget, where Massachusetts State Aid has not recovered. Next year's state aid support level will be 8.2% below the amount that was received in FY2009, six (6) years ago.

### Medium and Long Term Debt

Millbury's debt position at this time can be construed as being in good condition. Medium and long term debt at present is \$28.2Million where \$17.3Million of the total relates to the recently completed major sewer expansion and Upper Blackstone connection projects. (Note: The \$17.3Million of Sewer Enterprise debt is being paid by Millbury sewer users through yearly sewer rates.) A little more than 60% of the total debt will expire within the next ten years. This condition, accompanied by strong and effective financial controls and reporting has resulted in a recent upgrade in the Town's bond rating, the second increase in 3 years. This clearly allows for borrowing at significantly favorable rates.

The debt authorizations for your consideration on the five (5) major capital projects would be outside Proposition 2 ½ Levy Limit constraints with respect to property tax increases. If all five (5) major capital projects were approved, the total increase in yearly property taxes for an average valued home (\$212,500) in Millbury would be \$53.13, where \$51.01 of that amount would cease within 5 years. The property tax increases for each project individually are found in the Reason Section below each respective Article in the Warrant.

**ARTICLE 2**: To choose all other necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing and to meet, on Tuesday, May 6, 2014 at 7:00 P.M. in the Memorial High School Auditorium, 12 Martin Street in said Town, to act on the following articles to wit:

**ARTICLE 3:** To hear the reports of several Town Officers and Committees, or take any action thereon.

**ARTICLE 4:** To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate, or transfer from available funds, such sums of money as may be necessary to defray the expenses and charges of the Town of Millbury in Fiscal Year 2015, the period of July 1, 2014 through June 30, 2015, including, but not limited to: the salaries of Town Officers, costs of public education, debt and interest payments, expenses of the Sewer Enterprise Fund, and providing municipal services; or take any other action thereon.

Recommendation for Article 4 begins on Page 23.

**ARTICLE 5:** To see if the Town will vote to transfer the sum of Seven Hundred Eight Thousand Eight Hundred Seventy-Eight Dollars and No Cents (\$708,878.00) from available certified free cash to reduce or stabilize the Fiscal Year 2015 Tax Rate, or take any action thereon. (Town Manager)

Recommend the transfer of the sum of Seven Hundred Eight Thousand Eight Hundred Seventy Eight Dollars and No Cents (\$708,878.00) from available certified free cash for the purposes of Article 5.

(Reason: These funds will be used to reduce the tax rate in order to help stay within the constraints of Proposition  $2\frac{1}{2}$ .)

**ARTICLE 6:** To see if the Town will vote to authorize any or all of the following capital improvement projects and purchases as follows:

1. Raise and appropriate or transfer from available funds the sum of One Hundred Thousand Dollars and No Cents (\$100,000.00) to be expended by the Director of Public Works with the approval of the Town Manager to supplement Chapter 90 funds for repairs to sidewalks and road repairs, or take any action thereon. (Director of Public Works and Town Manager)

Recommend that \$100,000.00 be raised and appropriated for the purposes of Article 6.1.

(Reason: The \$100K will complement approximately \$450K in expected Chapter 90 funds in FY2015 for town road repairs.)

2. Raise and appropriate or transfer from available funds the sum of Fifty Thousand Dollars and No Cents (\$50,000.00) to be expended by the Chief of Police with the approval of the Town Manager to replace computers in the Police Department patrol vehicles, or take any action thereon. (Chief of Police and Town Manager)

Recommend that \$50,000.00 be raised and appropriated for the purposes of Article 6.2.

(Reason: These funds will be used to purchase and install MDT Terminals for police cruiser phone systems.)

3. Raise and appropriate or transfer from available funds and or borrow the sum of \$60,000 to fund for the School Department districtwide technology equipment, or take any action thereon. (School Committee)

Recommend that \$60,000.00 be raised and appropriated for the purposes of Article 6.3.

(Reason: These funds will be used to purchase equipment and represent the final part of a three year technology upgrade program.)

**ARTICLE 7:** To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$96,036.00 for expenses and revenue generated from the Municipal Medicaid Reimbursement Program to the FY 2015 School Department Budget or take any action thereon. (School Committee)

Recommend that \$96,036.00 be raised and appropriated for the purposes of Article 7. (Reason: Medicaid reimbursements go into the General Fund and this article is necessary to reimburse the School Department for the expenses in administering the program.)

**ARTICLE 8:** To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate or transfer from available funds the sum of Ten Thousand Dollars and No Cents (\$10,000.00) to be expended by the Director of Planning and Development with the approval of the Town Manager to cover the initial costs of updating the Town's Master Plan in accordance with M.G.L. Chapter 41, Section 81-D, or take any action thereon. (Director of Planning and Development and Town Manager)

Recommend that \$10,000.00 be raised and appropriated for the purposes of Article 8. (Reason: The Town's Master Plan was last updated in 1998. This update will incorporate changes in economic development philosophy over the past 15 years.)

**ARTICLE 9:** To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate or transfer from available funds the sum of Eight Thousand Dollars and No Cents (\$8,000.00) from available funds to pay for a required update of our OPEB liability, or take any action thereon. (Finance Director)

Recommend that \$8,000.00 be raised and appropriated for the purposes of Article 9. (Reason: The update of the Other Post Employment Benefits liability is required every two years.)

**ARTICLE 10:** To see if the Town will vote to transfer the sum of Five Hundred Dollars and No Cents (\$500.00) from Account #02.945.5200.02062.2012.560 to be used by the Town Manager to settle claims for personal property damage or incidental personal injury claims that may be brought against the Town, or take any action thereon. (Town Manager)

Recommend that \$500.00 be transferred from Account #02.945.5200.02062.2012.560 for the purposes of Article 10.

(Reason: This account must be closed out at the end of this fiscal year as it was set up as the result of action at the fiscal year 2012 Annual Town Meeting. The identified funds will be used for the same purpose as before and will not result in any increase in taxes.)

**ARTICLE 11:** To see if the Town will vote to transfer the sum of Five Thousand Dollars and No Cents (\$5,000.00) from account # 02.945.5200.02068.2013.560 to pay for the costs of disposal of abandoned property, or take any action thereon. (Town Manager)

## Recommend that \$5,000.00 be transferred from Account #02.945.5200.02068.2013.560 for the purposes of Article 11.

(Reason: This account will be closed out at the end of this fiscal year as it was set up as the result of action at the fiscal year 2013 Annual Town Meeting. The identified funds will be used for the same purpose as before and will not result in any increase in taxes.)

**ARTICLE 12:** To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Twenty Thousand Dollars and No Cents (\$20,000.00) to fund an Elders Community Services Program for the purpose of providing a payment voucher for services rendered for the departments, boards and committees of the municipality to resident property owners who have attained the age of sixty (60) years, to be used to reduce the real estate property taxes for the property in which the elderly owner resides; said program shall be subject to the following conditions, in addition to any and all eligibility requirements promulgated by the Board of Selectmen, after receiving the recommendations of the Council-On-Aging: (a) participation in the program shall be limited to elderly residents of the town who own property and are willing and able to provide services to the town; (b) program participants shall receive compensation at a rate of \$7.50 an hour for each hour of service rendered for a total not to exceed One Thousand Five Hundred Dollars and No Cents (\$1,500.00) in any calendar year; (c) program participants must agree in writing prior to participating in the program to receive compensation in the form of a voucher to be presented to the Treasurer/Tax Collector to be applied to the real estate obligations of the participant for the property in which the participant resides; (d) the Treasurer/Tax Collector shall comply with the wage, tax and payroll deduction requirements of the state Department of Revenue and the federal Internal Revenue Service, prior to compensating program participants or applying the net amount of wages earned to the real estate tax obligations of the participants; and (e) program participants who meet the eligibility guidelines established for the program by the Board of Selectmen shall be selected for participation in the program on a first-come-first-served basis, or take any action thereon. (Board of Selectmen and Council-On-Aging)

Recommend that \$20,000.00 be raised and appropriated for the purposes of Article 12. (Reason: This continues to be a successful program, which benefits both the town and its elderly participants. By contributing their time and expertise as community service for the town, the elderly are able to reduce some of their real estate expenses.)

ARTICLE 13: To see if the Town will vote to approve the \$2,900,000 debt authorized by vote of the Blackstone Valley Regional Vocational School District Committee on April 17, 2014, for costs adding to, equipping, reconstructing and making extraordinary repairs to the regional school, including the payment of all other costs incidental and related thereto, with the Town's apportioned share of debt payments computed in accordance with the Regional Agreement and commencing in fiscal year 2016. The approval of this debt shall be contingent upon a vote of the Town to exclude the Town's allocable share of this debt from the limitations of Chapter 59, Section 21C of the General Laws, also known as Proposition 2 ½, or to take any other action thereon. (Blackstone Valley Tech School Committee)

Recommend the approval of \$2,900,000 debt authorized by vote of the Blackstone Valley Regional Vocational School District Committee on April 17, 2014 for the purposes of Article 13.

(Reason: These funds will be used to renovate and expand the BVT campus to reduce future Chapter 74 out-of-district tuition costs; an ever growing need to accept more applicants for viable career paths; plans to establish three new CTE programs – Veterinary Assisting, Engineering Technology, and Legal and Protective Services; and the obligation to advance the District's long-term blueprint and strategic plan. The yearly increase in property tax for an average valued home in Millbury will be approximately \$2.12, beginning in 2016, decreasing slightly each year over a 20 year period.)

**ARTICLE 14:** To see if the Town will vote to appropriate the sum of Fifty Thousand Dollars and No Cents (\$50,000.00) from the Retained Earnings of the Sewer Enterprise Fund to the Sewer Stabilization Fund for maintenance of currently constructed sewer system; or take any action thereon. (Town Manager and the Board of Sewer Commissioners)

Recommend the sum of \$50,000.00 be appropriated from the Retained Earnings of the Sewer Enterprise Fund to the Sewer Stabilization Fund for the purposes of Article 14. (Reason: These funds will be used for capital items and maintenance activities on the currently constructed system.)

**ARTICLE 15:** To see if the Town will vote to rescind the excess borrowing authorization from the 2013, STM article #8 in the amount of \$103,588.00. Original authorization was for \$103,588.00, or take any action thereon. (Finance Director)

### Recommend Article 15 be accepted as written.

(Reason: The Department of Revenue (DOR) advised that expenditure for books should be part of a yearly operational budget and not through the incurring of debt.)

**ARTICLE 16:** To see if the Town will vote to transfer the sum of One Hundred Twenty Two Thousand Eight Hundred Fifteen Dollars and No Cents (\$122,815.00) from account #01.710.5910.00000.0000.571 Retirement of Debt Account to account #37.220.4970.37003.0000.422, Capital Project Account or take any action thereon. (Finance Director)

Recommend the sum of \$122,815.00 be transferred from account #01.710.5910.00000.0000.571 Retirement of Debt Account for the purposes of Article 16. (Reason: The payment of debt for the Fire Department Rescue Squad is required to be paid from the Capital Project Account. Article 16 allows the transfer of adequate funds into the proper payment account.)

**ARTICLE 17:** To see if the Town will vote to transfer the sum of Two Hundred Fourteen Thousand Dollars and No Cents (\$214,000.00) from account #01.710.5910.00000.0000.571 Retirement of Debt Account to account #37.220.4970.37003.0000.422, Capital Project Account or take any action thereon. (Finance Director)

Recommend the sum of \$214,000.00 be transferred from account #01.710.5910.00000.0000.571 Retirement of Debt Account for the purposes of Article 17. (Reason: The payment of debt for the Fire Department Ariel Scope is required to be paid from the Capital Project Account. Article 17 allows the transfer of adequate funds into the proper payment account.)

**ARTICLE 18:** To see if the Town will vote to appropriate from Certified Free Cash the amount of Twenty Two Thousand One Hundred Eighty Five Dollars and No Cents (\$22,185.00) to account #37.220.4970.37003.0000.422, or take any action thereon. (Finance Director)

Recommend the sum of \$22,185.00 be appropriated from Certified Free Cash for the purposes of Article 18.

(Reason: These funds will be used to balance off initial payments for the Fire Department Rescue Squad and move them into proper payment accounts.)

**ARTICLE 19:** To see if the town will vote to authorize revolving funds for certain town departments under Massachusetts General Laws Chapter 44, Section 53 E ½ for the fiscal year beginning July 1, 2014, or take any action thereon. (Town Manager)

(Reason: The \$650,000 balance in this account was previously authorized at Town Meeting to cover expenses for the major sewer project that were not allowed to be borrowed at a discounted rate. The balance is the result of the project coming in significantly under original projections. The funds are being moved to an account where they can be used in the future.)

ARTICLE 25: To see if the Town will vote to appropriate a sum of money to repair and/or replace the HVAC system on the municipal office building and to meet said appropriation by authorizing the Town Treasurer/Collector, with the approval of the Board of Selectmen, to borrow a sum of money; to issue bonds or notes of the Town therefore, under the provisions of Massachusetts General Laws, Chapter 44, Section 7, or any other enabling authority, and to pay all necessary legal and bond preparation costs associated with the issuance of said bonds or notes; provided, however, that this vote shall not take effect until the Town votes to exempt from the limitations on total taxes imposed by Massachusetts General Laws, Chapter 59, Section 21C, so-called Proposition 2 ½, amounts required to pay the principal of and interest on the borrowing authorized by this vote; or take any action thereon. (Energy Committee and Town Manager)

Recommend an amount Three Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$300,000) be appropriated and borrowed for the purposes of Article 25.

(Reason: The borrowing of these funds will allow for the repair and/or replacement of the HVAC system on the municipal office building. The yearly increase in property tax for an average valued home in Millbury will be approximately \$10.63 for a period of five (5) years.)

(Board of Fire Engineers and Town Manager)

## Recommend an amount Three Hundred Forty Five Thousand Dollars (\$345,000) be appropriated and borrowed for the purposes of Article 26.

(Reason: The borrowing of these funds will allow for the replacement of self-contained breathing apparatus for Fire Department personnel. The yearly increase in property tax for an average valued home in Millbury will be approximately \$12.75 for a period of five (5) years.)

ARTICLE 27: To see if the Town will vote to appropriate a sum of money to fund for the Department of Public Works the repairing and replacing of underground storage tanks, fuel station and associated equipment and to meet said appropriation by authorizing the Town Treasurer/Collector, with the approval of the Board of Selectmen, to borrow a sum of money; to issue bonds or notes of the Town therefore, under the provisions of Massachusetts General Laws, Chapter 44, Section 7, or any other enabling authority, and to pay all necessary legal and bond preparation costs associated with the issuance of said bonds or notes; provided, however, that this vote shall not take effect until the Town votes to exempt from the limitations on total taxes imposed by Massachusetts General Laws, Chapter 59, Section 21C, so-called Proposition 2 ½, amounts required to pay the principal of and interest on the borrowing authorized by this vote; or take any action thereon. (DPW Director and Town Manager)

## Recommend an amount Three Hundred Sixty Four Thousand Eight Hundred Dollars (\$364,800) be appropriated and borrowed for the purposes of Article 27.

(Reason: The borrowing of these funds will allow for the repairing and replacing of underground fuel storage tanks and associated equipment at the DPW garage. The yearly increase in property tax for an average valued home in Millbury will be approximately \$12.75 for a period of five (5) years.)

ARTICLE 28: To see if the Town will vote to appropriate a sum of money to fund for the Department of Public Works adding to, equipping, reconstructing and making extraordinary repairs to the transfer station including recycling compactors and associated equipment and to meet said appropriation by authorizing the Town Treasurer/Collector, with the approval of the Board of Selectmen, to borrow a sum of money; to issue bonds or notes of the Town therefore, under the provisions of Massachusetts General Laws, Chapter 44, Section 7, or any other enabling authority, and to pay all necessary legal and bond preparation costs associated with the issuance of said bonds or notes; provided, however, that this vote shall not take effect until the Town votes to exempt from the limitations on total taxes imposed by Massachusetts General Laws, Chapter 59, Section 21C, so-called Proposition 2½, amounts required to pay the principal of and interest on the borrowing authorized by this vote; or take any action thereon. Recommend an amount Four Hundred Fifty Thousand Dollars (\$450,000) be appropriated and borrowed for the purposes of Article 28.

(Reason: The borrowing of these funds will allow for an upgrade to the Millbury Transfer Station, including recycling compactors and associated equipment. The yearly increase in property tax for an average valued home in Millbury will be approximately \$14.88 for a period of five (5) years.)

**ARTICLE 29:** To see if the Town will vote to transfer from retained earnings of the Sewer Enterprise Fund a sum of money to complete repairs of the Town's sewer system in conjunction with the MassDOT Rt. 146 bridge reconstruction project over W. Main Street, or take any action thereon. (Director of Public Works and Sewer Commission)

Recommend that Four Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$400,000) be appropriated from the Retained Earnings of the Sewer Enterprise Fund for the purposes of Article 29. (Reason: These funds will be used for sewer reconstruction as part of the Route 146 Bridge Area project.)

  - 3. A RMD shall be located within a permanent building and may not be located in a trailer, cargo container, motor vehicle or other similar non-permanent enclosure.
  - 4. A RMD shall not have drive-thru service.
  - 5. Marijuana, marijuana-infused products, or associated products shall not be displayed or clearly visible to a person from the exterior of the RMD.
- 6. A RMD shall not display on the exterior of the facility advertisements for marijuana or any brand name. A RMD shall not utilize graphics related to marijuana or paraphernalia on the exterior of the RMD or the building in which the RMD is located.
  (Planning Board)
